2024 General Competition Requirements

Introduction

1. The Colorado State Fair Authority (“Authority”) reserves to itself the final and absolute right to interpret these competition requirements, to fairly and impartially settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to any competition or event on the fairgrounds; and the right to amend or add to these competition requirements as its judgments may determine. The Authority reserves the right to cancel events or change scheduling if necessary. See each division for any specific or special competition requirements.
2. The following terms, conditions, and requirements are general in nature. They apply to all divisions and all competitions at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”).
3. Additional and specific competition requirements are set forth within each individual Division’s competition requirements sections.
4. Every exhibitor entering any competition at the CSF must comply with the requirements set forth below and any additional or specific requirements set forth for each competition unless specifically noted otherwise.
5. Submission of an entry to the CSF expressly binds the exhibitor to all terms and conditions contained in any and all parts of the Colorado State Fair Premium Book and the Colorado State Fair Authority Rules as adopted at 8 CCR 1208-1 (“Authority Rule” or “Authority Rules”).
6. Submission of an entry to the CSF further expressly binds the exhibitor to the expectations of conduct and the penalties associated with failure to so comply, established in the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct (“Code of Conduct”), which each exhibitor must sign. The Code of Conduct articulates an exhibitor’s express agreement to conduct himself or herself in compliance at all times with the expectations of the Authority as outlined in the Code of Conduct and express agreement that he or she understands that any action that contradicts

the agreements promised in the Code of Conduct may result in the exhibitor's removal from the Authority's grounds.

Requirements:

1. Competition is open to the world except where otherwise specified.
2. The Authority is not responsible for any loss, damage, or injury to property while on its grounds.
3. When an exhibitor signs his or her entry form for the competition, he or she acknowledges and agrees to abide by all competition requirements.
4. Exhibitor hereby indemnifies the Authority, the state of Colorado, the Colorado State Fair Board of Authority ("Board"), and the Colorado Department of Agriculture from any and all legal proceedings in regard to a challenge to any competition requirement or Authority Rule.
5. Exhibitor acknowledges and agrees that entry into any competition organized and sponsored by the Authority does not guarantee competition. The Authority reserves the right to deny access onto the grounds to any person who exhibits symptoms of potentially communicable illness or who refuses to comply with federal, state, or local public health requirements and guidelines. The exhibitor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Authority, the state of Colorado, the Board, and the Colorado Department of Agriculture for any damages that may arise as a result of any such denial of entry or request to vacate the grounds.
6. The exhibitor acknowledges and agrees that entry into any competition organized and sponsored by the Authority is at the exhibitor's risk. In the event of any class or division cancelation, program cancelation, or fair cancelation, the exhibitor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Authority, the state of Colorado, the Board, and the Colorado Department of Agriculture in any action that may accrue.

Entries and Entry Forms

1. All entries must be made on regulation forms or the designated online entry system, be properly filled out, and be accompanied by all fees whenever required.
2. Entry forms and instructions for making entries are available upon request or may be found [online](#).
3. No entry will be entitled to a place on the grounds without fully completing the entry process.
4. The Authority assumes no responsibility for entry forms or online entry system errors.
5. Effect of Entry: Every exhibitor expressly understands and agrees that an exhibitor's completed entry form is his or her acceptance of all competition requirements, whether set forth in a general or a specific requirement. The exhibitor further agrees and understands that he or she will abide by the competition requirements throughout the duration of his or her time at the CSF. Additionally, the exhibitor agrees and understands that failure to comply with the competition requirements or any Authority Rule may subject him or her to penalties as determined by the Authority.
6. Entry Fees are non-refundable.

Exhibitor Admission

1. Every exhibitor attending the CSF must purchase either an All Age Wristband Exhibitor Wristband, a Youth Exhibitor Wristband, or a Daily Gate Admission. Wristbands can be pre-ordered through the appropriate department during the entry process.
 - a. All-Age Wristbands: \$45 each (good for the 11 days of CSF); wristbands are available to anyone of any age.
 - b. Youth Exhibitor Wristband: All Youth Exhibitors entered in a 4-H or FFA show will be able to purchase a discounted Youth Exhibitor Wristband for \$15. 4-H and FFA family members who are not entered or competing at the CSF will not be able to purchase this discounted wristband.
 - c. Daily General Admission Tickets: Exhibitors, animal owners, and or spectators can choose to purchase daily general admission by going to Gate 3, 5, or 9. Prices vary

throughout the 11 days; please see daily discounts and admission rates on the Authority's website. Daily admission can be purchased online at www.coloradostatefair.com.

2. The Authority reserves the right to limit entries to the facilities available and to cancel any division or class in which, in its judgment, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition. The Authority further reserves the right to return entries and any associated fees if any competition or class is canceled.
3. The Authority may disqualify and remove any entry that has been entered in violation of these general competition requirements or of any specific competition requirements.
4. Entries may not be removed before the time listed within each Division's competition requirements. No entry may be released without a properly executed release form. Release forms may be obtained from the appropriate Program Manager.
5. The Authority does not discriminate based on race, creed, color, sex, age, or other non-merit factors.
6. All premium checks for the current year must be cashed within six months of the date of the check's issue. Exhibitors have until December 31 of the year they competed at the CSF to claim checks returned to the Authority. Any checks not cashed will be void. No replacement checks will be issued after December 31 of the current year.

Disputes

The Authority reserves the final and absolute right to interpret all of the Authority's competition requirements and Authority Rules and to settle interpretation questions.

Determination Of Violations

1. The General Manager of the Authority ("General Manager"), the Director of Agriculture and Competitive Exhibits ("Director"), or the Program Manager of the division in which a violation of any competition term, requirement, or Authority Rule is reported to have occurred before, during, or after judging shall make an initial determination as to whether a violation occurred. At no time will any exhibition, judging event, or other ongoing event be delayed, stopped, or

interrupted due to any allegation of wrongdoing reported to the Authority or under investigation by the Authority.

2. In consultation with the Director and General Manager, the Program Manager shall, upon determining a violation has occurred, make a determination as to any appropriate penalty, or penalties, to impose upon the violating person(s). The penalties available include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. The exhibitor in question may be disqualified and forfeit all entry and other fees and all premiums, trophies, and awards from the Division.
 - b. Any or all premiums, trophies, and awards won by the exhibitor in any and all Divisions may be withdrawn and required to be returned to the Authority. All entry and other fees will be forfeited.
 - c. The exhibitor may be barred from competition at the CSF for a determined period, including a lifetime suspension, upon the concurrence of the General Manager, the Director, and the Program Manager.
 - d. The entry in question will not be sold in any sales at the CSF.
 - e. For any livestock already sold at the CSF, the Program Manager, in consultation with the Director and the General Manager, may determine to permit the exhibitor to receive the sale proceeds minus any amount that the Program Manager, in consultation with the Director and General Manager, determines representative of any costs attributable to the exhibitor. If the Program Manager, in consultation with the Director and General Manager, determines that no sale proceeds will be paid to the exhibitor, an Authority representative will make contact with the buyer to offer the buyer the following options:
 - 1) receive a full refund of the amount paid;
 - 2) donate the amount paid to the Colorado State Fair Foundation;
 - or 3) allow the Authority to retain the amount paid as a deposit for successive years' CSF sales.
 - f. The Program Manager, Director, or the General Manager may impose any other appropriate penalty.

Rights Of Appeal And Process Of Appeal:

- A. The following processes and rights of appeal shall be followed for actions pertaining to competitions at the CSF:
- B. Within 15 days of the point when the Program Manager, Director, or General Manager determines that a violation has occurred, the General Manager will notify the exhibitor in writing of the violation and the facts that support the violation. Such notification must be mailed to the exhibitor's address as recorded on his or her entry form (or hand-delivered if during any CSF).
- C. Such notification must also include a description of any penalty the Program Manager, Director, or General Manager may assess against the exhibitor.
- D. Within 15 days of receipt of written notification, the exhibitor may appeal the decision in writing to the Board. The written appeal must be delivered to the office of the General Manager within 15 days.
- E. Any written appeal must include any facts relevant to support the appeal.
- F. Within 15 days of receipt of the written appeal, the Program Manager, Director, or the General Manager may rescind his or her initial determination. The Program Manager, Director, or General Manager may subsequently make no further determination as to the reported violation. The exhibitor will have no further remedy available upon the rescission of the initial determination.
- G. Should the Program Manager, Director, or General Manager take no action on the appeal within 15 days from the date of receipt in the office of the General Manager, the appeal must be presented at the next regularly scheduled board meeting for the sole purpose of setting a date for a hearing on the appeal. The exhibitor will be notified in writing after the board meeting of the date of the appeal.
- H. The Board will appoint a hearing panel that will be comprised of the following:
 - a. A member of the Board who shall serve as the presiding officer;
 - b. An individual with expertise in the particular competition;
 - c. A person from the public;
 - d. An Authority senior employee other than the General Manager.

- I. Within 15 days of the conclusion of the hearing, the presiding officer shall submit to the Board and the exhibitor the hearing panel's findings and recommend a final determination as to the alleged violation(s) and penalties, along with a copy of the exhibitor's appeal.
- J. Upon receiving the presiding officer's recommendation at the next regularly scheduled board meeting, the Board will take action and adopt a final determination. The exhibitor will receive a copy of the Board's adopted findings and final determination.

Grievances/Protests

1. Whenever any person believes that an exhibitor has engaged in any activity that violates any competition requirements of the Authority or engaged in any unethical activity during the course of a competition, such person may provide his or her allegations of wrong-doing to the Program Manager or the Program Manager's designee for review. Any person making such a report must do so on a form provided by the Program Manager or the Program Manager's designee and as set forth in the remainder of this paragraph VI.
2. Any grievance must be personally presented to the Program Manager, Director, and to the General Manager on a form that may be obtained at the office of the General Manager.
3. Any grievance so submitted must be accompanied by a \$300 bond. This bond may be returned if the General Manager, Director, or the Program Manager, whoever reviews the grievance, determines that the facts described constitute a violation.
4. Any grievance must be presented within 24 hours of the occurrence of the alleged infraction for all livestock activities and prior to the official closing of the CSF for all other activities. In the event a grievance is presented after judging has begun on the item or activity in question, the judging will proceed, and the grievance will be handled as if the grievance had been presented following the judging.
5. Any grievance must be presented in writing and sworn to. The grievance must state the name and contact information of the grieving party, the name of the exhibitor who has allegedly committed a violation, the entry and class in question, the specific allegations giving rise to the grievance, the facts that support the allegations, and the specific terms and conditions from the competition requirements or elsewhere that govern the alleged misconduct.

6. Within 15 days of receipt of any grievance, the Director or the Director's designee shall notify in writing the person(s) submitting the grievance as to its determination of the validity of the grievance and any actions taken as a result of upholding the grievance. If the grievance is denied, the notification must state the reason or reasons for the denial.
7. Upon receipt of a properly presented grievance, the Program Manager and the Director will appoint a committee of three disinterested, qualified persons to review the protest and render a decision, which shall be considered final for purposes of appeal under these requirements.
8. The person(s) submitting the grievance will have the right to appeal consistent with the Due Process provisions set forth in Section V of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.

Exhibitors

Exhibitor Liability

Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury, or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him or her. Exhibitor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless, the Authority, the state of Colorado, the Board, and the Colorado Department of Agriculture from all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses, or liability costs, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description, brought forth from or on account of, injuries or death of any person including but not limited to workers, and the public, or damage to property resulting from the performance of the exhibitor or exhibitor's entries.

Barred Exhibitors

The Authority and the Fair Board, in cooperation with and as a member of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association and the NALS&RMA Rules & Infraction Database, reserve the right to refuse entry of any exhibitor who has been barred from any other show based on unethical practices, disqualified from competition at any major livestock show, from any state fair or

county fair, or has had premiums withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of a violation of any competition requirement.

Entry Errors

The Authority accepts entries as presented and does not check those entries for errors. Exhibitors are responsible for any errors in any entry form.

Mail & Packages

Parties wishing to have mail sent to them at the fairgrounds may have it addressed to the Colorado State Fair Authority in the care of the intended recipient: 1001 Beulah Avenue, Pueblo, CO 81004. Parties may retrieve their mail on-grounds at the Butler Supply Building, located on the south wall between Gates 1 and 2.

Returned Checks

1. Any exhibitor issuing a check for payment that is returned as insufficient funds or for any other reason for not clearing his/her account will be charged a \$35 service charge.
2. The exhibitor will have 5 working days to make payment, by cash or money order, in the amount of the check plus the service charge.
3. No exhibitor will be permitted to show until the non-sufficient check has been paid.
4. If any check is returned after an exhibitor has shown, all premiums will be held until the check amount is paid, including the \$35 service charge by cash or money order.
5. Those who do not reinstate their check within 60 days will be turned over to a state-authorized collections agency.

IRS and Colorado Department of Revenue Compliance

To comply with the Colorado Department of Revenue and the Internal Revenue Service tax-reporting requirements, a properly completed current IRS Form W-9 must be submitted for any premium

earning of \$600 or more or any monies derived from a sale. No monies won or earned at the CSF will be paid if the IRS Form W-9 form is incorrect.

Premium Checks/Refunds

1. Premium checks and sale checks will be issued only to the individual exhibitor whose name and Social Security Number have been accepted through the state of Colorado as it appears on the completed IRS form W-9.
2. Checks will not be issued to an exhibitor's relative, company, or fitter.
3. In case of a lost check, please notify the appropriate Program Manager immediately.
4. All premium checks must be cashed by December 31 of the current year. Any checks not cashed will be void.
5. No replacement checks will be issued after December 31 of the current year.

Special Awards

Any special awards that any business or individual contributes to any competition must be collected directly from the business or individual. The Authority is not responsible for the redemption of these awards.

Premium Awards

Awards and ribbons have no cash value. Premiums will be paid only from the records of the judges' sheets. Premium checks will be issued as soon as auditing, drug testing, if applicable, and processing can be completed. Sponsored awards may be added or changed.

Bedding

Exhibitors must be familiar with and comply with the specific competition requirements concerning bedding within each individual Division's competition requirements.

Camping

On-ground camping is limited to pre-paid reserved spots only. Camping or overnight stays are not allowed in the Authority's parking lots or barn areas.

Restrictions

Restriction On Authority Employee Participation

No Authority employee may participate as an exhibitor or sign an entry form as an agent of an exhibitor in any division or department in which the exhibitor is a division or department head, judge, or paid employee.

Prohibition On Exhibitor Judges

No person who is an exhibitor has an immediate family member who is an exhibitor, is in charge of an exhibit or division, is in charge of a group of exhibitors, or is a member of a group of exhibitors may act as a judge in any competition in which that person or that person's immediate family member is exhibiting.

Prohibition Of CSF Volunteers to be Judges

No volunteer within a CSF division may act as a judge in any competition within such division.

Prohibition Of Interference With Competitions

Direct criticism or interference with the judge, CSF or Authority staff, other exhibitors, association representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, Authority staff or agents, and other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by agent or representative, interferes with any judge during that judge's adjudication or behaves disrespectfully toward any judge or any Authority staff, then the Program Manager, Director, or General Manager may immediately remove said exhibitor from the judging area, may disqualify the exhibitor from further competition, may remove the exhibitor from the fairgrounds, may withhold any prizes that may have been awarded in any other event at the CSF and may be subject to a possible suspension from exhibiting at the CSF for a period of up to three (3) years.

Dogs

No dogs are allowed on the fairgrounds other than those on a leash for direct competition or service animals, as set forth in section 6.2 of the Authority Rules, 8 CCR 1208-1.

Motorized Utility Vehicles

Use of any motorized vehicle, including but not limited to, golf carts, motorcycles, mopeds, hoverboards, and scooters must be pre-approved by the General Manager who will base his determination on the applicant's demonstration of hardship without the ability to use such motorized vehicle prior to coming to the CSF.

Non-Motorized Vehicles

Use of any non-motorized vehicle, including, but not limited to, bicycles, skateboards, or scooters, is not allowed at any time.

Food and Advertising

Concessions And Advertising Privileges

All exhibits, concessions, or commercial privileges are at the sole discretion of the General Manager. Under no circumstances will any advertising matter be allowed to be placed upon buildings, trees, or other places on the grounds or otherwise distributed without the General Manager's permission.

Food And Livestock Handling

Due to the potential exposure to pathogens when handling livestock, including those related to zoonotic animal diseases, we advise all participants to refrain from eating in the livestock barns and thoroughly wash their hands after being in or handling livestock.

Distribution Of Food On The Fairgrounds

Food distribution or sale on the fairgrounds is restricted to persons and vendors with a fully executed vendor agreement with the Authority. The Authority reserves the right to confiscate any food items prepared for distribution or sale, including materials and accessories used to prepare such foods, and to impose discipline on any exhibitor so engaged, as outlined in Section IV, General Colorado State Fair Competition Requirements.

Exhibitor Code of Conduct

The Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”) is a family-friendly event. As an exhibitor (or as a legal guardian of an exhibitor) participating in competitive events at the CSF, you are responsible for properly representing yourself and your minor exhibitors. Those participants who do not adhere to the Colorado State Fair General Rules and Regulations, Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, and IAFE National Code of Showring Ethics are subject to consequences at the sole discretion of the Colorado State Fair Authority.

Violations of this Code of Conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Any disruptive or improper conduct, including unnecessary verbalized or printed profanity
2. Violence of any sort
3. Theft of any sort
4. Vandalism of any public or private property. Any unlawful use of drug or alcohol consumption or unlawful distribution of drugs or alcohol
5. Any verbal or physical acts of aggression or harassment directed towards another person, animal, exhibit, or personal property.
6. Any tampering with any competition’s events or entries.

The Colorado State Fair Authority (“Authority”) reserves the right to extend, withhold, or revoke an invitation to any exhibitor, or exhibitor and exhibitor’s legal guardian, who does not adhere to this Code of Conduct.

Acknowledgment:

I have read the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct above and agree to abide by these expectations. My failure to do so may result in the loss of privilege for me, or my minor exhibitor, to exhibit in any competitive event at the Fair. I understand that additional consequences may include the loss of premiums, the immediate dismissal from the fairgrounds, or the loss of the ability to participate in future events at the CSF.

2024 General Entry and Fine Arts Department Requirements

Entry Requirements

- A. One entry per class unless otherwise specified.
- B. Every entry shall be entered and exhibited in the name of the actual creator except in heritage classes.
- C. Unless otherwise specified, entry items must have been completed since the 2023 Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition entry form deadline.
- D. All items entered for the competition must be entered in the name of the person who created the entry.

Late Entries

- A. No late entries will be accepted. Entry drop-off (receiving) dates and times are different for each department. Please note those pertinent to you.

Entry Release (Pick up)

- A. Entries will be released from the same building they are received. Please bring your claim stubs to prove entry ownership when picking up entries. Claim stubs are required to release all entries. No entry shall be released without a claim stub.

Removal of Entries

- A. An exhibitor may not remove his or her entry from the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition once received.
- B. Accepted and placing entries must be on exhibit at the official opening of the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition or at any other time specified in the Premium Book and shall not be removed from the fairgrounds before the release date printed in the Premium Book, except

(at the discretion of the Colorado State Fair Authority management) in cases of positive evidence of sickness, accident and/or death, or other such circumstances that are in the best interests of the Colorado State Fair Authority as well as the exhibitor.

Entry Registration Dates

- A. Unless otherwise specified, entry forms must be submitted online from June 10, 2024, through July 17, 2024. Please see competition requirements for specific competition information. Paper entry forms will also be accepted 9:00 A.M. - 4:00 P.M., Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the General Entry & Fine Arts Office or through the mail.

Responsibility

- A. The Colorado State Fair Authority shall not be responsible for entries remaining on the fairgrounds after designated release times.
- B. All entries or display elements remaining on the fairgrounds after the designated release time will be treated as abandoned property and disposed of on or before December 1 of the same year.

No Guarantee

- A. The Colorado State Fair Authority cannot guarantee that any requests for an entry (e.g., electricity, a showcase, a pedestal, special lighting, special location, total space requirements, water source, computer services, or any other special requirements) can be provided.

Judging

- A. All judging before the opening day of the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (August 23, 2024) will be closed to the public.
- B. Judging for each department will occur after receiving ends and before the opening of the Fair unless otherwise specified.
- C. Only judges, pre-authorized staff, and volunteers will be allowed in the building during this time.

Disqualifications

- A. A complete entry is eligible in more than one Division and/or Class shall be entered and judged only in the Division and/or Class for which it best qualifies.
- B. The Colorado State Fair Authority or the judge may disqualify or transfer to the correct Class (at his/her discretion) any entry that is not a true representative of the Division or Class in which it is entered. It is not, however, the responsibility of the Colorado State Fair Authority or judge to transfer an entry to the correct Division and/or Class.

Award Winners

- A. Only award-winning entries will be displayed unless otherwise noted in specific department requirements.
- B. All entries will be held and released on the official posted release day after the Fair.

Shipping

- A. Entries may be shipped to the Fairgrounds and be received a minimum of 5 days before the specific department receiving date.
- B. All shipping must be fully prepaid.
- C. The package must also include a prepaid shipping label, postage, and packaging for return shipment.

Payment by Checks

- A. Checks will not be accepted as payment after July 17, 2024. Departments that are still accepting entries will accept cash or credit cards.

Location

- A. The General Entry & Fine Arts Office is in the northeast corner of the Palace of Agriculture. It is accessible through the front doors on the east side of the building.
- B. Entries are received based on the Department/Building in which they are entered. Please see individual Department requirements for those dates.

- C. Hay and alfalfa final placings will be judged on visual appraisal with consideration given to leafiness, color, and quality, absence of weeds, insects, and other foreign matter, as well as general appearance.
- D. No sheaves or bundles previously competed at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition ("CSF") may be entered. Only sheaves or bundles that have never competed at the CSF may compete.

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Competition and Entry Requirements

Entry

- A. Maximum of five entries per exhibitor.

Eligibility

- A. Open to all living residents of Colorado.
- B. Original artwork only. (Original art is defined as a unique or one-off piece – usually the first version – created directly by an artist’s hand or a tool controlled by their hand(s). A small, hand-pulled, numbered series of prints (lithographs, screenprints, woodcuts, etching, engraving, and lithographs) are considered original art. Giclees, inkjets, or other machine-printed items are not considered original art except when used to print an artist’s original digital creation onto paper or other substrates.)
- C. No seminar pieces may be entered. (A seminar art piece is defined as a piece of art created in an instructional setting with attendees all creating the same or similar pieces of artwork to learn a technique, style, or lesson.)
- D. Artwork must have been completed within the last two years.
- E. Artwork may not have been previously exhibited at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”).

- F. Artists must disclose if art or artwork was created using an Artificial Intelligence Generator.

Presentation Requirements

- A. All artwork must be unwrapped and installation-ready.
- B. Two-dimensional artwork must be suitably framed (i.e., no poster frames) and wired using strong screw eyes and wire.
- C. Artwork with clip mounts, missing wires, string, scotch tape, sawtooth hangers, or any other unstable hanging hardware will NOT be accepted.
- D. All artwork must be dry when submitted for the exhibition.
- E. Completed identification labels must be firmly attached to the back, upper left-hand corner of all two-dimensional works or the bottom of all three-dimensional works. (Labels can be found online or with an entry form.)
- F. Due to limited space, we discourage entries over 5x5x5 feet.
- G. CSF Management will decide on the proper artwork condition and location of each piece.

Fees

- A. Each piece (entry) requires an entry form and a non-refundable fee of \$11.00 for the Emerging Artist Division.
- B. Each piece (entry) requires an entry form and a non-refundable fee of \$15.00 for the Professional Division.
- C. Artists may purchase 11-day CSF wristbands at \$45.00 each. These purchases and payments should be included in the total when you submit your entry form.

Payment Methods

- A. Payments can be made by cash, check, or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, Discover, and American Express). Make checks payable to the *Colorado State Fair Authority* (“Authority”). Returned checks, or checks marked “insufficient funds” will be assessed a \$35.00 service fee.

Selection Process

- A. This is a *juried* competition. All artwork is juried. Only the works accepted by the jurors will be displayed in the Fine Arts Gallery during the CSF, August 23 - September 2, 2024.
- B. The jurors are solely responsible for selecting artwork to be exhibited and awarded under their authority.
- C. The jurors’ decisions are final.
- D. The jury process is closed and confidential.
- E. Award-winning artwork will be photographed for the annual catalog card, internet, and publicity purposes.

- A. Pick up (Release) of Not Accepted Artwork

- A. Not Accepted artwork may be picked up before Sunday, August 11, 2024. Pick-up hours will be posted online when results are posted on August 2, 2024.
- B. If exhibitors do not pick up their artwork by that date, the artwork will be stored until the completion of the Fine Arts Exhibition. It will be released on Wednesday, September 4, 2024, 10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. or Saturday, September 7, 2024, 10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. at the Fine Arts Gallery, CSF.
- C. All artwork must be claimed on this day unless prior arrangements have been made. Any item of art or artwork not retrieved within 90 days of September 4, 2024, becomes the sole possession of the Authority and may be sold or donated.

Release of Accepted Artwork

- A. Accepted artwork must be exhibited during the 11 days of the Fine Arts Exhibition and the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition, August 23 - September 2. No exceptions.
- B. Exhibition artwork will be released on Wednesday, September 4, 2024, 10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. and Saturday, September 7, 2024, 10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. at the Fine Arts Gallery, Colorado State Fair Authority.
- C. All artwork must be claimed on this day unless prior arrangements are made. Any item of art or artwork not retrieved within 90 days of September 4, 2022, becomes the sole possession of the Colorado State Fair Authority and may be sold or donated.

Sale of Artwork

- A. Colorado State Fair Authority retains a 25% commission on all art sales.

- B. The entry form must indicate the sale price of the artwork. Not-for-sale artwork must be identified as "NFS." Sale prices may not be changed once the entry form is submitted.
- C. Artists who sell artwork are required to complete a W-9 Form.
- D. Payment checks will be mailed by the last day of October of the same year.

Entry Procedures

- E. All items must have proper hardware and be fully unpacked and labeled before entering the receiving line. If your items are not ready for receiving, you will be sent back to the unpacking table before being allowed to proceed.

Electronically submitted Artwork

Definitions

These definitions exist for the purpose of this competition and will assist you in placing your artwork in the correct category.

Painting - Applying paint, pigment, color, or other medium to a solid surface. The medium is commonly applied to the base with a brush, but other implements, such as knives, sponges, and airbrushes, can be used.

Drawing/Printmaking - (Drawing) Using instruments to mark paper or other two-dimensional surfaces. Instruments include graphite, inked brushes, colored pencils, crayons, charcoal, chalk, pastels, erasers, markers, styluses, and metals (such as silverpoint). (Printmaking) The process of creating artwork by printing, mostly on paper, but also on fabric, wood, metal, and other surfaces. Printmaking processes can produce identical multiples of the same work and are created using a hand-processed technique.

Sculpture (3D)/Ceramics/Fiber Art - (Sculpture) Three-dimensional art. Sculpture processes include but are not limited to carving, assembling, welding, modeling, molding, and casting. (Ceramics)

Various hard, brittle, heat-resistant, and corrosion-resistant materials are made by shaping and then firing an inorganic, nonmetallic material, such as clay, at a high temperature. Common examples are earthenware, porcelain, and brick. (Fiber Art) Fine art, whose material consists mainly of natural or synthetic fiber and other components such as fabric or yarn. It focuses on the artist's materials and manual labor as part of the works' significance and prioritizes aesthetic value over utility.

Photography - The art, application, and practice of creating durable images by recording light, electronically using an image sensor or chemically using light-sensitive material such as photographic film. For the purpose of this competition, photographs taken with a digital camera are acceptable, but significant digital modification is not allowed in this category. Acceptable modifications include but are not limited to cropping, resizing, and slight (20% or less) color correction.

Digital Arts/Digitally-Manipulated Photography - (Digital Arts) Artistic practice that uses digital technology as part of the creative or presentation process, including art created using an Artificial Intelligence Generator. (Digitally-Manipulated Photography) Digitally editing a photograph more than 10%. Some examples of digitally manipulated photography are: using digital filters, manipulating color, saturation, tone, or vibrance more than 20% or in a manner that is not the natural or original color, pixelation, any photoshopping beyond basic edits (cropping, resizing, 20% or less color correction), erasure of elements in photograph, and recombination of images.

Mixed Media - Artwork in which multiple mediums or materials have been employed. Assemblages, collages, and certain sculptures are three common examples.

Jewelry/Metalsmithing - (Jewelry) Decorative items worn for personal adornments, such as brooches, rings, necklaces, earrings, pendants, bracelets, and cufflinks. Jewelry may be attached to the body or the clothes. Jewelry often contains precious metals in combination with gemstones or other materials such as shells. (Metalsmithing) The process of creating jewelry involves the manipulation of various metals. These manipulations include forming and shaping, sawing, doming, fold forming, drilling, soldering, texturing, stamping, and more.

Dahlia Show

More than one dahlia may be entered in a class as long as they are different varieties. Dahlias should be de-budded and show a pair of true leaves, not spur leaves.

Definitions

- Large Blooms - all Dahlias, which normally produce flowers that exceed 4 inches in diameter. Dahlias over 4 inches in diameter.
- Miniatures - all dahlias, which normally produce flowers that do not exceed 4 inches in diameter. Dahlias are smaller than 4 inches in diameter.

Types

- Formal Decorative Dahlias - ray floret flat, partially revolute, or partially involutes. Petals are uniform and regularly arranged, tending to recurve toward the stem.
- Informal Decorative Dahlias - ray floret twisted, curled, or wavy, imparting a petal that is not flat. Petals may be partially revolute with their arrangement irregular.
- Straight Cactus Dahlias - ray floret revolute for more than one-half their length; pointed, with a pronounced curvature of petals toward the center of the flower head.
- Semi-Cactus Dahlias - ray floret broad at the base, straight, incurved, or recurved with ray floret revolute for up to one-half of their length.
- Incurved Cactus - ray floret revolute for more than one-half their length; pointed, with a pronounced curvature of petals toward the center of the flower head.
- Laciniated - the split or laciniation should be in proportion to the ray floret length. There should be an overall twisting in the area of the split involute or revolute ray floret, to give an overall fringed effect.
- Ball - full double flowers, ball-shaped or slightly flattened at the face, the ray floret blunt, rounded or indented, involute for most of their length, full involute for about one-half their length, and normally displayed in a spiral arrangement.
- Miniature Ball - same as Ball Dahlias, differing in size.

- Pompon Dahlia - fully double flowers similar to Ball Dahlias but more globular and smaller in size; the ray floret involute for the whole of their length and fully involute for more than half their length.
- Water lily - bloom should be fully double and symmetrical, the side view should be flat to saucer-shaped in arrangement, and the layer of floret should be openly faced to give a delicate appearance. The center should be closed and dome-shaped, breaking gradually four to seven rows of fully developed outer florets. Outer floret should be broad and slightly cupped. Bloom position preferred 45 degrees.
- Peony - open-centered Dahlia with two or more rows of ray floret surrounding the disc flowers. Ray florets adjacent to the disc flowers may be smaller, twisted, and/or curled.
- Anemone - Dahlias with one or more rows of ray floret surrounding a center of elongated tubular disc floret. The disc floret should be fully developed and present adorned, pincushion appearance.
- Collarette - open-centered Dahlia with a single row of uniform, evenly-spaced, compound ray floret in a flat plain surrounding the disc flowers. The petaloids surrounding the disc are less than one-half the length of the ray floret.
- Single - open centered Dahlias with a single row of uniform evenly spaced ray floret in a flat plain surrounding the disc flowers.
- Mignon Single - same as Single Dahlia except with a diameter of up to two inches.
- Orchid - open centered Dahlias with a single row of uniform, evenly-spaced, ray floret in a flat plain surrounding the disc flowers. The ray florets are involute for two-thirds or more of their length and fully involute for at least one-third of their length.
- Novelty - Dahlias with characteristics differing from the present classifications. The two kinds of Novelties, one with open centers and the other with closed centers should be judged against all kinds.

C. Exhibitors who have won Youth Kitchen Royalty in the previous five (5) years, 2019 -2023, are not eligible to compete for Youth Kitchen Royalty in 2024. The Youth Kitchen Royalty Award will be determined based on the total ribbon points won. Points will be calculated as follows:

- 1. 1st place 3 Points
- 2. 2nd place 2 Points
- 3. 3rd place 1 Point

D. Colorado State Fair Authority will award the winning Youth Kitchen Royalty a Rosette, \$50.00, and a Plaque.

Canning Criteria

- A. All home-canned foods must be canned after July 22, 2022.
- B. All canned products shall be canned in clean, clear, standard brand name glass jars (no mayonnaise jars, etc.), perfectly sealed with new clean seals.
- C. Canned goods may be stored at home without rings, but rings are required for exhibit.
- D. Canned fruits and vegetables will not be opened but will be judged on appearance in the jar. Other canned items will be opened and tasted at the discretion of the judge.
- E. Labeling of jars should occur at home. Checking in your entries is not the time to label jars. All canned product entries must place the information label in the center of the side of the jar(s). Label sizes should be no more than:
 - a. 1½ inches x 2½ inches for pints and 1/2 pint jars
 - b. 2½ inches x 3½ inches for quart jars
- F. Labels must not cover the entire jar. No exhibitor names are allowed on labels. Entries must be labeled as follows:
 - a. Product Name

- b. Date Canned
- c. Altitude
- d. Hot or Cold Pack
- e. Time Processed
- f. Method of Processing (hot water bath/pressure canner—pounds of pressure)
- g. Method of Acidification of Tomatoes

G. Heat Process

- a. **Methods** used to heat process food must comply with current preserving guidelines as stated in the approved reference guides. The boiling water process for high-acid food and the pressure process for low-acid food are the only recommended methods to preserve food in jars for shelf storage.
- b. **Time** for correctly heat processing food varies depending on each specific recipe or food type. Processing time must be in agreement with the approved reference guides.

H. Product Appearance

- a. **Produce** should be free from blemishes, disease, and spoilage. Recipes prepared with stems, pits, and peels intact are acceptable if the recipe is in keeping with approved guidelines.
- b. **Liquid** must be clear and free from cloudiness and small particles unless the inherent characteristics of ingredients affect product clarity.
- c. **Color** of the finished product should be as close as possible to its natural characteristics or that of a cooked product.
- d. **Texture** is affected by heat processing; however, the finished product should not easily break down or appear overcooked.
- e. **Ingredients** should retain their shape and size based on the type and preparation method. Ingredients should be cut into uniform pieces and packed evenly into each jar, allowing adequate room for the liquid to circulate throughout the jar during processing.

Definitions

Duet - is a quilt constructed by one person and quilted by someone else.

Art Quilt- is a contemporary artwork of original design involving the creative expression and exploration of various

processes, such as dyeing, printing, painting, stitching, embellishing, quilting, and weaving. An Art Quilt does not follow traditional block lines.

Memory Quilt - are a way of remembering or celebrating family history, the life of a loved one, or an important event in life. Materials used can be clothing, photos, memorabilia, etc.

Applique Quilt - use applique as the primary feature. The definition of applique is the sewing of smaller pieces of fabric onto a large, whole piece of fabric. Applique quilts can include other quilting techniques in a secondary role.

Modern Quilts - are defined as functional quilts, that include bold colors, and are inspired by modern design. Minimalism, asymmetry, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work are often a part of modern quilt composition, as are improvisational piecing and solid fabrics.

Whole Cloth Quilt - The top layer of a whole cloth quilt is made from a single piece of fabric. No patchwork or

applique is used in the quilt design. The appearance of a whole cloth quilt relies on the quilting motifs that are chosen, and quilting stitches are usually intricate and closely spaced.

Baby Quilt - is defined as a small quilt made to fit easily in a crib or stroller.

Machine Quilting - quilting with any type of machine.

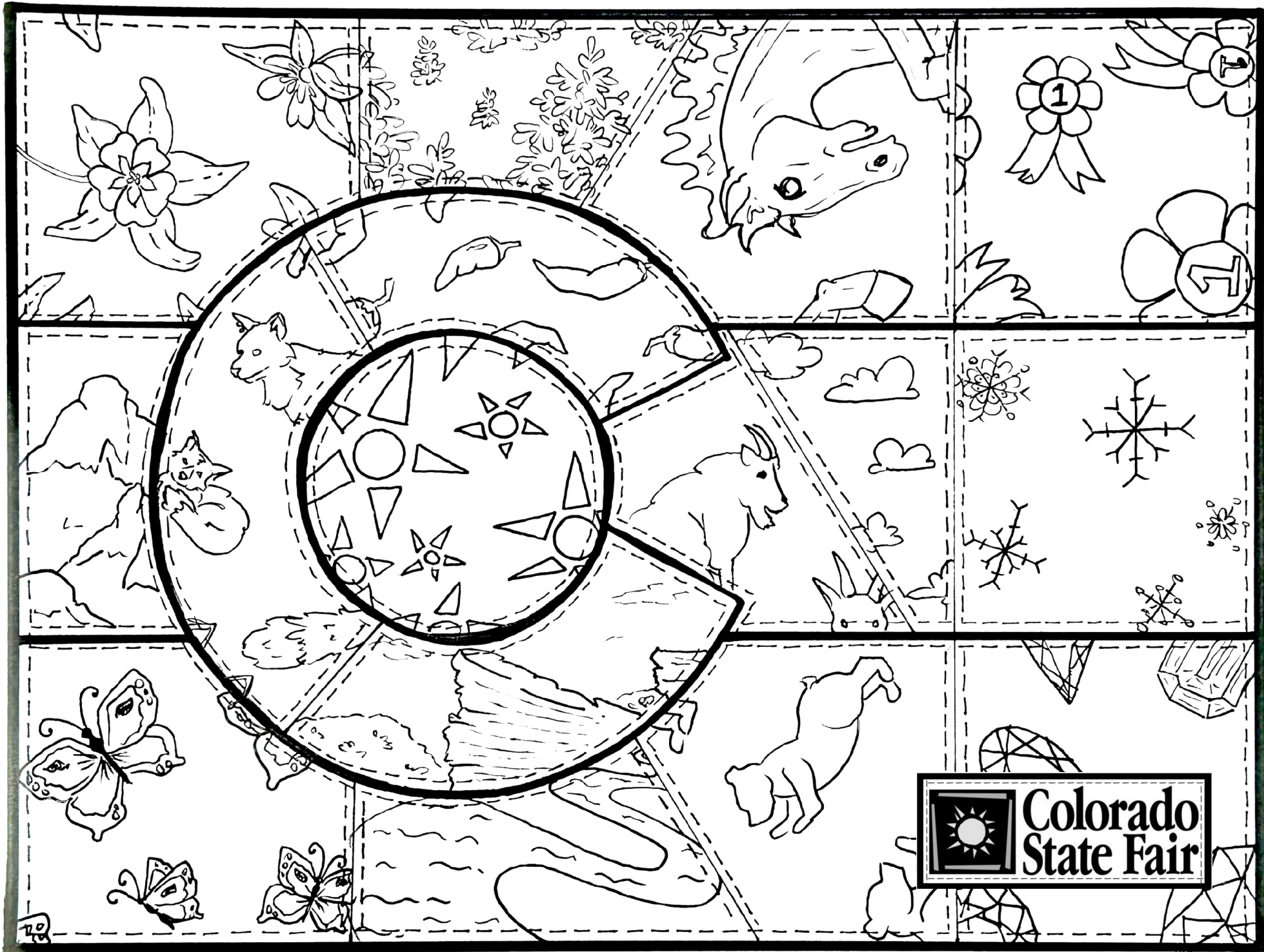

7. The poster design must reflect the 2025 Theme. Artists may add text or ensure open space in the poster design so that a graphic designer can add it later digitally. Text may be in separate areas of the poster. The text must include
 - a. 2025 Theme - Growing the Tradition
 - b. August 22 - September 1st
 - c. Optional: Colorado State Fair Logo
8. All poster submissions must be submitted electronically. Judges will judge from submitted electronic images. Submissions must be high-quality digital photographs or images of your poster. JPGs and .PDFs are acceptable.
9. Entry registration and digitally submitted poster images are required to enter.

Presentation Requirements for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place submissions

1. If a poster is created in a digital medium, it is the responsibility of the artist to print (or have printed) and incur all costs to print a high-quality, 300 dpi or higher resolution, poster to be displayed.
2. Posters on stretched canvas or other presentation-ready surfaces must have proper hanging hardware attached to the back (eye hooks and hanging wire). Posters on paper will be placed in a frame by the Colorado State Fair Authority.

Selection Process

1. This is a juried competition. All artwork is juried. Only the works the jurors accept will be displayed in the Fine Arts Gallery during the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition, August 23 - September 2, 2024.
2. The jurors are solely responsible for selecting artwork to be exhibited and awarded under their authority.
3. The jurors' decisions are final.
4. The jury process is closed and confidential.
5. Poster submissions will be judged by Colorado State Fair Authority's appointed judges.
6. The Colorado State Fair Authority does not guarantee there will be 1st place winner or that any poster will be used as the official poster or in marketing and publicity materials.
7. All 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners must bring in their posters on July 27, 2024, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. to the Fine Arts Building on the Colorado State Fair's grounds.
8. Award-winning artwork may be photographed and used for marketing and publicity purposes.

Additional Information

1. The winning artist will be recognized, and the posters unveiled at the 2023 Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition Fine Arts Reception on Thursday, August 24, 2023, 5 pm - 8 pm.
2. Winning artists must fill out a W-9 to receive the cash award.
3. The Colorado State Fair Authority reserves the right to purchase the 1st place poster for \$500.
4. All participants agree that entry into this competition constitutes an offer to sell original art for the agreed-upon price (the cash prize value) as outlined in these Competition Requirements. Participants further understand and expressly agree that all rights, title, possession, and claims of ownership of the 1st place poster imagery and its design transfer to the Colorado State Fair Authority, exclusively once the judging is final and placings have been announced.

Insurance Disclaimer

The Colorado State Fair Authority will use diligence to ensure the safety of all artwork after arrival and placement, but in no case will the Colorado State Fair Authority be responsible or liable for any loss or damage from any cause before, during, or after the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition. Artists are encouraged to insure artwork privately if they need such protection.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

2024 Horse Show Competition and Entry Requirements

Entries

Every entry shall constitute an agreement that the person making it, owner, trainer, lessee, agent, manager, coach, rider, relative, and the horse shall be subject to the 2024 General Competition Requirements, the 2024 General Horse Show Competition Requirements, and the requirements of each sanctioning association or organization. All entries must be made on official Colorado State Fair ("Fair") entry forms or through the CSF's online entry system. Exhibitors are responsible for their own errors and those of their agents when preparing entries. All fees are due at check-in to receive back numbers.

Entry Deadlines

All Online Entries will open on Wednesday, June 1, 2024, and will close as set forth below:

1. 4-H Horse Show: Pre-entries will close on Monday, August 11, 2024. All entries must be completed through the online entry portal. Online entries must be completed by 11:59 p.m. August 11, 2024, to be considered on time.
2. 4-H Late Entries: CSF will accept 4-H late entries from August 2 - 11, 2024, with a late fee of \$50 per exhibitor. Late entries must be completed online by 11:59 p.m. August 11, 2024.
3. All Other Horse Shows: Pre-entries and stall reservations will close Friday, August 11, 2024. All online entries must be completed by 11:59 p.m. August 11, 2024.
4. All Other Horse Shows Late Entries: CSF will accept late entries from August 12, 2024, through the day before the class entering is being held. A late fee of \$50 per horse will be charged for all new horses entered after the August 12, 2024, deadline. If adding classes to a pre-entered horse no late fee will be charged. The online entry portal will close on August 22, 2024. If you need to enter after the 22nd, you must do it at the show.

Post Class Entries

- Post-class entries will be accepted for all horses previously entered into other classes during that event.
- If the event has specific deadlines due to draws and an exhibitor enters after those deadlines, then the exhibitor must draw in the Horse Show Office for first or last in draw order.
- The only exception is for the cutting classes.
- If an exhibitor enters in a cutting class after the draw, that exhibitor will go last in that draw.

Entry Fees

- Except as set forth elsewhere within the individual Horse Show Premium Pages, all fees must accompany entries, stalls, and passes.
- Fees for each show are outlined on the specific Horse Show Premium Pages and online entry system.
- For any check returned to the Fair marked “NSF” or that does otherwise not clear the drafter’s bank, Fair reserves the right to charge a \$35.00 returned check fee in addition to the cost of registration and to require that any subsequent payment be made in cash, by money order, cashier’s check, or by credit card.

Substitutions And Cancellations

- Substitutions and cancellations must be approved through the Colorado State Fair Management (“Management”).
- All substitutions or cancellations must be in writing or emailed to csf.horseshow@gmail.com.

Vet Out

- Any vet out, i.e., removal of an animal from competition because of a veterinary directive, received after August 22, 2024, exhibitors will only have entry fees returned.
- Vet-outs before August 22, 2024, exhibitors will only receive entry fees, stall fees, and cattle fees returned.
- The Fair does not return payment for office fees, parking passes, or gate passes purchased before vet out.
- Exhibitors canceling entries without a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) forfeit all fees.
- Once a horse is on the Authority's Grounds, a vet out must come from an Authority-designated veterinarian.
- All vet-out certificates must be turned in to the Horse Show Office by the last day of the division in which the horse is competing.
- Riders and handlers may be substituted at any time, provided the change has been made in the Horse Show Office prior to the start of the class. The horse and exhibitor must meet all membership and horse eligibility requirements per the appropriate association.
- Refunds are at the sole discretion of Management.

Entry Numbers

- All entry data must be accurately completed before each horse will be assigned an entry number.
- Entry numbers must always be accurately displayed in the arena per appropriate association rules.

Order Of Go

- Orders of go will be computer-generated unless a physical draw is necessary. At any physical draw, the exhibitors must be present.
- The 4-H, AQHA, NRCHA, and NRHA Shows all have specific draw time deadlines. 4-H orders of go are available one per county per day for the 4-H Horse Show.
- All draws for each association show will be available on our Facebook group page: “Colorado State Fair Horse Show Updates”

Results

- All results are subject to verification and review.
- All Horse Show results are unofficial until Show Management and the sanctioning organization have reviewed and approved those results.

Stallions

Junior exhibitors will not be allowed to ride, drive, or handle stallions in any class except as provided for in the association requirements.

Premium Monies

- All exhibitors and/or horse owners eligible to win premiums must fill out a W-9 prior to receiving their back numbers.
- The W-9 must have that individual’s Social Security Number or other Tax Identification Number, name, and physical address that the exhibitor lists when filing his/her personal taxes.
- If an exhibitor chooses to receive premium monies in a corporate or ranch name, all tax information must be correct on the W-9 for the Colorado State Fair Accounting Department (Accounting Department) to accept the W-9 form.

- Every effort will be made to mail premium checks within 30 days after the conclusion of the Fair.
- If checks are not received by November 1st, please contact the Accounting Department.
- Checks must be cashed within six months of the date of issue.
- Exhibitors have until December 31 of the same year to claim checks returned to Show Management.
- No replacement checks will be issued after December 31 of the current year.

Refunds

Entry Fees are non-refundable.

Horse Show Office

The Horse Show Office will open on August 23, 2024, for 4-H check-in. Starting August 24, 2024, the Horse Show Office will open one hour before the start of the first class and remain open until thirty minutes after the last class of each day. All Horse Show Office business must be conducted during these hours.

Arena Procedures

The show arena is under the complete control of Management. Only qualified personnel will be allowed in the show arena during judging. Notice will be served to all exhibitors regarding the time classes will be held, and all horses must be ready and waiting at the show arena gate. A two-minute gate call will be highly enforced. No late exhibitor will be admitted once the gates are closed and the judge has started the class. Barn calls are made as a courtesy. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of the show's progression and be ready for his or her class when the class enters the arena. There will be no refunds for missed classes.

Attire

The tradition of the show ring is that an exhibitor be correctly attired for the class in question, that exhibitors be neatly dressed and horses properly groomed. Show Management may, at its discretion, bar an entry or person from entering the show arena if not properly presented. There will be no refunds for classes missed due to improper appearance.

Arena Promptness

Classes will run according to the published schedule. All horses and exhibitors must be ready and waiting to enter the arena promptly. Exhibitors are responsible for informing the gate steward of tack changes or conflicts that may cause the exhibitor to be late or miss the class. The gate will be held if the gate steward is made aware of an exhibitor delay or conflict. Classes may be split or combined at the discretion of Management.

Class Schedule:

Management reserves the right to rearrange classes if necessary to compensate for excessive entries or time shortages. Classes with a draw order will post the draw at the Horse Show Office and the back of the announcer booths of each arena. All exhibitors will work in the order drawn. Exhibitors not at the gate to work in their draw order will not be allowed to work in that class. Schedule or draw information given over the phone must be considered unofficial. The most recent information can be obtained from our website at www.coloradostatefair.com and our Facebook group page, "Colorado State Fair Horse Show Updates."

Stalling

Stall Reservations

- Stall reservations must be completed through the online stall reservation system.
- Exhibitors may reserve stalls after the deadline by paying a late fee of \$50.00 per owner.
- Payment for stalls is due at time of check-in. Stalls will be assigned by Management. Horses must be placed in the assigned stalls.
- No change will be permitted without permission from Management.
- There is no day hauling allowed; therefore, exhibitors must have a stall for every horse entered.
- Stall fees do not include first bedding.
- Stall fees are based on a per-day basis.
- All stall rates are listed on the online stall reservation form.
- If entering multiple shows, please submit one stall form for all shows.
- The deadlines to request stalls are as follows:

4-H Stall Deadline: August 11, 2024 (Must be completed online only.)

All Other Horse Shows: August 14, 2024 (Must be completed online only.)

Online Stall Reservation Form

- The Online Stall Reservation Forms are available online at www.coloradostatefair.com on each event page.
- Only submit one stall form for all shows entering.
- Exhibitors may pay by cash, money order, check, or credit card (Visa or MasterCard) at check-in.
- The online Stall Reservation Form must be completed by the appropriate deadline.

4-H Stall Requests:

- The 4-H Horse Show Exhibitors may request certain stalls, but Management cannot guarantee any stalls requested.
- The Show Management will assign all stalls for each County.
- Each Exhibitor will be stalled within their County Block.
- No changing of stalls is allowed unless an exhibitor has permission from Management.

All Other Horse Shows Stall Requests:

- All exhibitors who need to stall with a specific person, trainer, or agent must signify that on the online stall reservation form.
- Full payment is not required until check-in at the Horse Show Office.

Tack Stalls:

- Tack stalls are to be reserved just like horse stalls.
- They are the same price of a horse stall and are charged by the night.
- All tack stalls must be reserved through the online Stall Reservation Form.

Stall Assignments:

- Stall assignments will be available at the Horse Show Check-In Station upon arrival to the Fairgrounds.
- The Horse Show Check-In Station will be open 6:00 am to 9:00 pm.
- Arrival at any other times may result in a delay in receiving stall assignments and bedding.
- Please call ahead if you plan to arrive after 9:00 pm.
- Check-In call: (719) 241-4608.

Feed and Bedding:

- All Horse show exhibitors must purchase animal bedding through the Colorado State Fair Feed & Bedding Concessionaire.
- Outside bedding is not allowed in the horse show complex unless the exhibitor has received prior written permission from Show Management.
- Management will require that any foreign bedding be removed immediately from the Fairgrounds.
- Any person who fails to remove the outside bedding within one hour of notice will be subject to a fine of \$150.00, payable to the Colorado State Fair.

Rustic Ranch Supply:

- The official Colorado State Fair Feed & Bedding Concessionaire is Rustic Ranch Supply. They handle all feed and bedding needs for the Colorado State Fair Horse Show Department.
- Exhibitors will pay Rustic Ranch Supply directly for all bedding and feed needs. They accept cash, check, Venmo, and credit cards (a 3% fee is added for Venmo and credit card payments).

- Colorado State Fair will have all stall assignments at the check-in station at gate 7.
- Rustic Ranch Supply will only be open from 7 am to 9 pm on move-in days.
- They will be open at various times throughout the fair. Hours will be posted on the feed and bedding store door and the mini shed across from the B barn.
- Please call Rustic Ranch Supply directly at 720-470-2379 if you plan to check in after 9:00 p.m. or need to purchase outside of regularly scheduled hours. Someone will arrive to assist you.

Arrival and Release

- Arrival and release times are listed on individual premium pages for each show. Exhibitors must check this schedule carefully, as horses will be admitted on grounds only at these scheduled times.
- Exhibitors must obtain a release from the Horse Show Office to take horses off the grounds.
- Exhibitors are asked to remove horses after they have finished their show competition.

Parking Permits and Exhibitor Admission

Horse Show Exhibitor Parking Permits

- No exhibitor parking is allowed inside the Horse Show Complex.
- Exhibitor vehicles with parking permits will be allowed to park in the Horseman's Lot (as space permits) inside gate 6.
- If the Horseman's Lot is full, overflow parking is available in the South Lot. A free shuttle service is available for those parking in the South Lot.

Horseman's Lot Daily Parking Permits:

- Permits are \$20.00 per day and correspond to a specific assigned parking space number; the permit does not include gate admission.
- The 4-H shows, starting Thursday, August 24, 2024, will be limited to one per owner.
- Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in.
- Starting Monday, August 28, 2024, the association shows will be limited to one per owner.
- Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in.

Hangar Lot Season Parking Permits:

- Permits are \$45.00 each (good for 11 days of the Fair) and do not include gate admission.
- The Hangar lot is located across S. Prairie Ave. from the fairgrounds.
- Starting on Monday, August 28, 2024, the association shows will be limited to one per owner, with a maximum of three per owner.
- Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in.

Exhibitor Admission:

- Every Fair exhibitor must purchase a Horse Show Wristband or Daily Gate Admission.
- The Horse Show Office will sell exhibitor wristbands for all ages that are good for the entire 11 days of the Fair.
- All wristbands can be purchased at the Horse Show Office upon check-in.

Health Requirements:

- All horses entering the Colorado State Fairgrounds must be accompanied by a Health Declaration at the check-in station, which must be completed before entering the Horse Show Complex.
- Horses entering the Authority's Grounds are subject to examination by a Colorado State Veterinarian's Office representative.
- Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases may be immediately withdrawn from the show and held at the owner's expense.
- The animal will be held until it is released by a representative from the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office after any necessary treatment and additional hold times.
- Exhibitors must comply with any direction from the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office regarding removal from the Authority's Grounds.
- Health requirements may change before the start of CSF if there is a disease outbreak in Colorado or the neighboring states

Colorado Origin

Certificate Of Veterinary Inspection:

1. All horses must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection ("CVI").
2. CVIs must be provided to Show Management at the time of arrival.
3. CVI's must be dated no more than 7 days from arrival.
4. CVI's must identify each animal individually.

Equine Infectious Anemia

No test is required for Colorado-origin horses.

Vesicular Stomatitis (VSV)

As requested by the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office, annual notices on vesicular stomatitis will be issued before the event.

Equine Herpes Virus (EHV)

Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to take the temperatures of all their horses regularly and daily. Exhibitors should notify Show Management immediately to arrange an isolation stall for observation in the event of a sudden temperature increase. As requested by the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office, annual notices on EHV will be issued before the event.

Out Of State Origin:

Certificate Of Veterinary Inspection:

1. All horses must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection ("CVI")
2. CVI's must be provided to the Colorado State Fair Officials at the time of arrival.
3. CVI's must be dated no more than 7 days from arrival.
4. CVI's must identify each animal individually.

Equine Infectious Anemia:

A negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia (AGID or ELISA) is required. It must be provided to the Colorado State Fair Official at the time of arrival and dated no more than one (1) year from the date of arrival.

Brand Requirement

Colorado Origin

1. If your horse(s) is branded with your Colorado registered brand, you must have a brand card identifying you as the brand owner. If your horse(s) is not branded, you must have either:(1) the blue copy of a Colorado brand certificate identifying you as the horse's owner, or (2) a permanent travel card identifying you as the horse's owner.
2. If you travel over 75 miles to CSF from a location in Colorado, you must first get a brand inspection.

Out Of State Origin

1. All horses from mandatory brand inspection states must have a current brand inspection certificate. The original copy of the inspection certificate must be presented with the CVI at the time of arrival. All animals found improperly shipped will be held until released by the state of origin.
2. All out-of-state exhibitors coming into Colorado for the Fair from non-brand inspection states must provide legal proof of ownership by any of the following:
 - a. Legal bill of sale. The requirements of a legal bill of sale are:
 - i. Seller's name and address.
 - ii. Buyer's name and address.
 - iii. A complete description of livestock sold/purchased (the complete description should include the number of heads, color, sex, breed markings, registration numbers, and hot brands).
 - iv. Signature of seller.
 - v. Signature of the buyer and Name, address, and witness signature.
 - b. Registration Papers

Stalls/Tack Reservation Information

Weekend Stall and Tack Rate is based on the number of days. Example: An exhibitor can check-in and stall on August 21, 2024, and must check out of that stall or tack room by 9:00 p.m. on August 25, 2024. There is no day hauling available. Exhibitors must purchase a daily stall if only coming for one day. Horses are not to be tied to the outside of arenas or stalls.

- Tack stalls - All exhibitors need to purchase their own tack stall or find someone to share one with, exhibitors must share within their own county, and one person must pay for the tack stall in full to the Colorado State Fair (CSF). Splitting the cost of the tack stall when making a payment to the CSF is not permitted.
- Payment – No payment is due until check-in. Do not send payments ahead of time.
- Stall Assignments – Stalls are assigned by the Colorado State Fair Horse Show Management (Management). There will be no moving of stall assignments, not even within your county, following check-in. Please notify the Management if you see or hear of anyone placing horses or tack in the incorrect stall assignments.

Gate Admission and Parking Passes

Horse Show Exhibitor Parking Permits

No exhibitor parking is allowed inside the Horse Show Complex. Exhibitor vehicles with parking permits will be allowed to park in the Horseman's Lot (as space permits) inside gate 6. If the Horseman's Lot is full, overflow parking is available in the South Lot. A free shuttle service is available for those parking in the South Lot.

Horseman's Lot Daily Parking Permits

Permits are \$20.00 per day and correspond to a specific assigned parking space number; permit does not include gate admission. The 4-H shows starting Thursday, August 22, 2024, will be limited to one per owner per day.

Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in. The association shows starting on Monday, August 26, 2024, will be limited to one per owner. Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in.

Hangar Lot Season Parking Permits

Permits are \$45.00 each (good for 11 days of the Fair); they do not include gate admission. The Hangar lot is located across S. Prairie Ave from the fairgrounds. The association shows starting on Monday, August 26, 2024, will be limited to one per owner, with a maximum of three per owner. Parking permits can be preordered on the horse entry form and picked up in the Horse Show Office when the exhibitor checks in.

- **Exhibitor Admission:** Every exhibitor attending the Fair must purchase a Horse Show Wristband or Daily Gate Admission. The Horse Show Office will be selling exhibitors of all ages wristbands that are good for the entire 11 days of the Fair. All Wristbands can be purchased at the time of check-in at the Horse Show Office.
- **General Show Information:** Each exhibitor is required to read and adhere to the 2024 Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, 2024 Horse Show Competition & Entry Requirements, the 2024 State Fair 4-H State Championship Rules, 2024 Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, and the 2024 State 4-H rule book. Entries must be completed through the appropriate online entry system. All entry fees will be paid in full during the check-in process.

- Entry Forms must be filled out online, no payment is due until check-in at the Horse Show Office.
- 4-H Agent Verification: The Extension Agent in the county in which the Exhibitor is enrolled must verify all entries sent to the Colorado State Fair Horse Show Manager.
- W-9: Each exhibitor must correctly fill out a current W-9 and turn it in to the Horse Show Office.
- Premiums: In order for premium monies to be issued each class must have at least 3 exhibitors compete.
- Camping Reservations: All RV and Trailer camping reservations must be made through the Colorado State Fair Facility Management Office. Please contact (719) 404-2023 to make a reservation.
- Dormitory Reservations: Reservations for the Camp Tobin Dorm facility must be made by your county extension agent through the State 4-H Office.

3. The completed W-9 Form will be submitted at the CSF show office check-in.
4. Do not send payment, payment is due at check-in at the CSF horse show office.

Exhibitor Eligibility

1. Exhibitors competing in the Colorado State Fair 4-H State Championship Horse Show (4-H Horse Show) must be members in good standing of a Colorado 4-H Club. Exhibitors who are at least 8 years of age and have not reached their 19th birthday as of December 31st of the previous year are eligible (See Rule 2 in the 2024 4-H Horse Show Rule book).
2. The 4-H Horse Show is a 4-H show only and is not an open or FFA horse show. All entry forms will be verified by a 4-H Extension Agent to certify the exhibitor is a member in good standing and enrolled in the Colorado 4-H horse project.
3. All exhibitors are required to enter the level of which your county agent verifies you in. This includes the Novice, Limited, and Advanced divisions. Exhibitors can not enter a lower division from what they are currently leveled in, but exhibitors can choose to compete up a
4. New for 2024 Novice Division for 4-H members that have passed their level 1 test are eligible to enter the Novice Division, see below.
5. All exhibitors must have completed Colorado 4-H Horse Project Advancement Level II Western to be eligible to compete in the Western Division, Level II Gymkhana to compete in the Gymkhana division, Level II Ranch Horse to compete in the Ranch Horse Division and/or Level II English to compete in the English Division of the 4-H Horse Show.
6. Level III/IV Eligibility: 4-H members must have passed the appropriate Advancement Level III rating to enter Level III/IV Western Riding, Reining, Hunter Hack, and Individual Cow Work classes. Entrants in the Hunter Hack classes must have passed Level III Hunt Seat to ride over fences (i.e., Dressage/Saddle Seat Level III card holders are not

eligible to enter over-fence classes). Specific state and national contest rules must be observed in addition to the above rule.

7. All exhibitors are required to enter the level of which your county agent verifies you in. This includes the Novice, Limited, and Advanced divisions. Exhibitors can not enter a lower division from what they are currently leveled in, but exhibitors can choose to compete up a division. Example: A novice rider can enter the Limited division, or a Limited rider can enter the Advanced division.

- Western Classes offered at State Fair: Showmanship, Horsemanship, Trail, and Written Test

 - *Novice Exhibitors are Level 1 skills only. Novice exhibitors can choose to compete up a division.

Limited - Level 2 Skills

- Age Divisions: 8-13 & 14-18
- Western Classes offered at State Fair: Showmanship, Horsemanship, Trail, Western Riding, Reining, and Written Test
- English Classes offered at State Fair: Showmanship, Hunt Seat Equitation, Riding Control, Show Hack, and Written Test
- Gymkhana Classes offered at State Fair: Barrels, Flags, Poles, and Written Test
- Ranch Classes offered at State Fair: Ranch Riding, Ranch Trail, Individual Cow Work, Ranch Cutting, and Written Test

Advanced - Level 3 and 4 Skills

- Age Divisions: 8-13 & 14-18

- Western Classes offered at State Fair: Showmanship, Horsemanship, Trail, Reining, Western Riding, and Written Test
- English Classes offered at State Fair: Showmanship, Hunt Seat Equitation, Riding Control, Show Hack, Hunter Hack, and Written Test
- Gymkhana Classes offered at State Fair: Barrels, Flags, Poles, and Written Test
- Ranch Classes offered at State Fair: Ranch Riding, Individual Cow Work, Ranch Cutting, and Written Test

Horse Eligibility

1. Number of Horses: Exhibitors may bring a total of two horses regardless of how many divisions the exhibitor chooses to enter, except for the Working Ranch Horse Division. Exhibitors participating in the Working Ranch Horse Division are only allowed to enter and ride one horse throughout the entire ranch horse division.
2. Ownership and Identification: Ownership is not required to participate in the Colorado State Fair, but the exhibitor must have a valid lease for any horse he or she is showing if the exhibitor does not own the horse or horses the exhibitor is showing. However, the exhibitor must have provided a majority of the management, care, and training of the horse during the current 4-H year.

The county agent's signature on the entry blank verification must attest to this fact. All horses entered in any division must be included in the Exhibitor's Horse Project Record Book and declared (completed identification certification on file at the County Extension Office) as a project horse in 4-H online as of May 1st of the current year.

No substitution of horses will be permitted under any circumstances unless the substitute horse meets the above requirements.

3. Horses Shared by Siblings: Horses may be shown by siblings if they show or are entered in different age divisions or classifications. Please see the 2024 Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rule Book regarding requirements for exhibitors using the same horse, rule 4C. The 4-H Horse Show will follow the Colorado 4-H Rule Book regarding the rule addressing this matter.

4. No stallions are permitted to compete in the 4-H Horse Show.

Class Divisions

1. The show is divided into four-point counting divisions: English, Western, Ranch Horse, and Gymkhana. Exhibitors may compete in any or all divisions. Exhibitors may not switch divisions after the 4-H Horse Show registration deadline. Individual classes in each division are divided by age in such a manner as to equalize class size best. Ages are determined as of December 31 of the previous year.
2. Classes with fewer than three entries may be combined at the discretion of Management.
3. In ALL divisions, the written test and showmanship are considered regular classes and will be counted toward High Point and All-Around awards.

Written Test

1. Completion of State 4-H Written Test is mandatory for high point and all-around award eligibility. Members will be ineligible for division High Point or All-Around awards if they do not complete the written test for the division. All members will be automatically entered and charged for the written test class for each show division they enter in.

The written test is a Colorado State Fair 4-H State Championship Horse Show class and will be treated as such. The written test will be 20 general equine science questions from the manual plus will consist of 5 additional specific questions for each division (English, Western, Ranch, and Gymkhana). The total number of questions will be 25.

To be eligible to take the written test exhibitors must be on time to take the test, have a pencil, bring their exhibitor number, be dressed appropriately (Colorado State 4-H dress code) and include all necessary information on their score sheet (i.e., exhibitor name, 4-H age, exhibitor number).

Written test score sheets missing necessary exhibitor information may be disqualified. If the exhibitor is late to the test, they will forfeit points earned in that class but will still be eligible for c awards. If the exhibitor takes the wrong test, they will receive a zero score

and not be eligible to place, but would still be eligible for all High Points and All Around awards.

See class list for written test start times. Per the competition requirement regarding combining classes, if an exhibitor gets moved to another age group, then that exhibitor will still take the written test in which his or her original entry designates, and that test score will be applied toward their placing.

2. The only adults allowed in the testing area are those proctoring the test. Exhibitors may not talk to other exhibitors and may only direct questions to the test proctors during the written test. Exhibitors may be asked to forfeit their test and leave the area if they talk to, share answers with, or take answers from other exhibitors.
3. Protests: Protest of a question or answer on the written test may only be made by the exhibitor. Once the last exhibitor has completed the written test, the key to the written test will be posted outside the show office. From the time the key is posted, exhibitors will have exactly 1 hour to protest the answer(s) to any question(s). Once the hour has expired, the test results are FINAL, and NO CHANGES will be made under any circumstances. Exhibitors for Division Champion Awards in both English and Western divisions must take the written test and compete in showmanship in both divisions.
4. Ranch Horse Written Test will be scored based on 0-75 points; 75 being a perfect score.

Show Requirements

1. Specific state and national contest rules will be observed in addition to the requirements above. Individual class requirements will follow the 2024 Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rule Book and the addendum.

Zero Score Rule: In Western Horsemanship, Ranch Riding, Hunt Seat Equitation, English Control, Western and Ranch Trail, and Showmanship, failure to complete the pattern will not result in a disqualification but will be scored accordingly. In these classes, Zero Scores are eligible for placing but not above anyone receiving a score above zero. In Reining, Western Riding, Ranch Cutting, and Individual Cow Work, a Zero Score will not be placed on the judge's card.

Off Pattern (OP): In Ranch Riding if an exhibitor goes off pattern, they will be assessed a 20-point penalty per offense.

2. Only contestants can school and ride their horses at any time while at the 4-H State Show.
3. Contestants are not allowed to ride bareback or double at any time while at the Fair.
4. Exhibitor Numbers: Exhibitors must always wear their numbers while in the horse show area. While showing, exhibitors are encouraged to display their number on both sides of the saddle pad rather than on the exhibitor's back (exception for showmanship). Show management will provide two copies of each contestant's number. An exhibitor entering the arena without a number on or who fails to wear the correct back number will be disqualified from that class.
5. Dress Code: Contestants must always follow 4-H dress code (including awards ceremonies) as the 4-H Horse Show is a 4-H event. Contestants will be asked to modify their dress attire to meet the Colorado 4-H Dress Code (which is posted at co4h.colostate.edu). Acceptable dress code rules and exceptions are available through Colorado State Extension.
6. Awards Dress Code: Exhibitors must wear equestrian professional dress to receive an award during any of the awards ceremonies held at the 4-H Horse Show. (Examples: a collared long-sleeve shirt, clean jeans free of holes, long-sleeve or short-sleeve polo shirts, or cardigans.) Exhibitors must always adhere to the 4-H dress code as stated above.
7. Promptness: Exhibitors will be responsible for making it to their class on time. The exhibitor must enter the ring according to the order of go in the time specified by the Show Management. Failure to do so will disqualify the exhibitor from the class. All gate calls are courtesy calls only.
8. Gate or Tack Changes: The time permitted for tack changes will be at the discretion of the paddock master and Show Management. Gate changes are only permitted if they are 4-H Horse Show related.

9. Gate Protocol: All events are required to be held inside a closed arena. During all runs, arena gates will remain closed. Failure to enter and leave the arena, mounted at a walk or trot, will result in a disqualification. Only exhibitors and Show Management should be in the arena.
10. Gymkhana: An exhibitor in gymkhana is considered on course from the time the arena gate closes to the time the arena gate reopens. Gymkhana division rules apply from the time of entry to the time of exit (gate to gate) for every rider.
11. Level II Ranch Cow Work Class: An exhibitor will box for 50 seconds until notified by the announcer, then complete their run. The exhibitor will be allowed a total of 1 ½ minutes.
12. During cattle classes, only the stock contractor, his employees, or Show Management will be allowed in the cattle area. The fair will provide 4 herd helpers for Ranch Cutting. Exhibitors must use the fair-provided herd help for their bottom corners but have the option to pick two 4-H youth ranch horse exhibitors to use as their top two corners help. Rule 1, Rule 20, and Rule 21 in the Colorado 4-H Rule book will be strictly enforced.
13. Exhibitors may not approach a judge under any circumstances. All questions or comments must be directed through the State Fair 4-H Horse Show Superintendents or Show Management.
14. Exhibitors and parents or guardians may be disqualified and excused from the grounds at the discretion of Show Management for any unsportsmanlike conduct or abusive action to a horse. The Exhibitor's animal must always be under control and handled safely. Any exhibitor not adhering to the above requirement may be disqualified and forfeit all fees, prize money, and awards.
15. Show Management reserves the right to amend or change rules, combine classes, and change times of scheduled classes at any time prior to the judging, and due notice will be given to exhibitors of any changes.

Awards

1. Points per class are calculated on a 10-1 scale, except for the Ranch Horse Division, no matter how many exhibitors are in a class. Example: A contestant placing 1st in a class

of three will receive ten points; a contestant placing 2nd will receive nine points; and so on...These points will be tabulated towards any High Point Awards.

2. Overall High Point Calculations: The overall high point will be calculated on raw scores. Overall high points are broken out as Limited Age Division 8-13 High point, Limited Age Division 14-18 High point, Limited Overall High point champion and reserve champion. Advanced Age Division 8-13 High point, Advanced Age Division 14-18 High point, Advanced Overall High point Champion and Reserve Champion.
3. Awards Presentations: The Horse Show Office will be closed for one hour each day after completing the last class. This will allow Show Management to tabulate and double-check all scores and high points. No exhibitors, spectators, or family members will be allowed in the office during this time. After the tabulation of scores by Show Management, the officials will call the exhibitors to the arena for the awards presentations.
4. Ranch Horse Division only: Points per class will be based on the Exhibitor's earned performance score provided by the judge. Example: An exhibitor with a class score of 68 will receive 68 points for that class.
5. Novice Division only: No highpoint awards or premiums offered. Only class awards and ribbons.
6. Awards Presentation: Most class awards will be presented at the arena gate after completing the class. Ribbons not picked up at the gate may be claimed at the 4-H Horse Show announcer booth or at the Horse Show Office. Awards will not be mailed. Division High Point Awards will be presented one hour following the completion of each division. Exhibitors are required to be in proper attire when accepting their awards.

The Colorado State Fair Authority reserves the right to adjust results if Show Management has become aware of an error in the point calculations of results previously announced. In any such case, the Colorado State Fair Authority has the right to take back all prizes distributed before the error and distribute them to the correct recipient. This will enable the Colorado State Fair Authority and Colorado 4-H Extension to continue to offer quality awards for the 4-H Horse Show.

Ties: The written test scores will be used to break all ties. If a tie still exists, placing in the respective showmanship class for English and Western Division will be used. In Ranch Horse, the respective cutting class will be used. If a tie still exists, an official flip of a coin will be used to break the tie.

7. A contestant may enter all classes in a single division that he or she is qualified to enter. To be eligible for the 2024 4-H Division Champion Awards, the 4-H member may compete in the following classes:

 - ii. Western Showmanship
 - iii. Western Horsemanship
 - iv. Trail
 - v. Western Riding
 - vi. Reining
- b. English
 - i. Written Test
 - ii. English Showmanship
 - iii. English Equitation NTJ
 - iv. English Riding Control
 - v. Show Hack
 - vi. *Hunter Hack
- c. Ranch Horse
 - i. Written Test
 - ii. Ranch Trail
 - iii. Ranch Riding
 - iv. Ranch Cow Work
 - v. Ranch Cutting
- d. Gymkhana
 - i. Written Test
 - ii. Barrels
 - iii. Poles
 - iv. Flags

*These classes do not offer a level II option for entry.

8. All-Around Eligibility: Written Test, Showmanship, and Horsemanship/Equitation are required for an exhibitor to be eligible for Western and English Division All-Around Awards. All five classes are required for an exhibitor to be eligible for the Ranch Horse Division All-Around Awards, and the Written Test is required to be eligible for the Gymkhana Division All-Around Awards.

Any exhibitor who has previously won the Limited All-Around or Ranch Horse Saddle Award is not eligible to win the Limited All-Around Saddle in the future (this does not apply to Level III/IV). If you have previously won the Level II saddle in the All-Around or Ranch Horse, this rule applies under the new division name, "Limited."

General

1. All entries in the Horse Show Department are subject to the 2024 Colorado State Fair General Competition & Entry Requirements.
2. Upon entry to the Colorado State Fairgrounds, all horses must have a health certificate.
3. Bedding will be available to purchase. No outside shavings are allowed. A fee will be assessed if the exhibitor brings in outside shavings. See Feed & Bedding requirements outlined in the 2024 Colorado State Fair Horse Show Competition Requirements.
4. Drug Testing: Program Management reserves the right to randomly or directly drug test any horse on the Authority's Grounds at any time for forbidden substances. If forbidden substances are found to be administered to any horse during the 4-H Horse Show, exhibitors and horses will be disqualified from all classes. They will forfeit all premium money and awards. Please refer to the "forbidden substances" section of the 2024 AQHA Rule Book for a list of forbidden substances.
5. The 4-H Code of Conduct Rule will be strictly enforced during the 4-H Horse Show.
6. Video Protests – video protests are not allowed during the Colorado State Fair 4-H State Championship Show.

County Image Award

Judging Criteria

Anonymous judges will circulate during the 4-H Horse Show. A committee will make inspections during the fair to determine the awards, taking into consideration the following points and rating 4-H members and country representatives in the following areas:

1. Horsemanship safety—Judges will penalize exhibitors who exhibit poor safety, including, but not limited to, bareback riding, riding with halter and lead shank, having more than one rider, and other dangerous displays.
2. Stall safety and cleanliness. Decorations are not to count.
3. Good sportsmanship
4. Courtesy to show management, judges, exhibitors, and visitors.
5. The camaraderie among all county representatives.
6. Accuracy in submitting entries
7. Orderliness and cleanliness of stalls, aisles, and animals. Adult help is not permitted.
8. Displaying a sign or banner that designates the county. A "point of contact" for each county must be posted in each county's stalling area and must be on file in the show office. Also, each stall should have signage indicating who the owner is and what county he or she represents.
9. Systematic and neat arrangement of supplies, feed, hay, and straw.
10. Personal appearance, including award presentations and ceremonies.
11. Observance of all competition and other Colorado State Fair Authority requirements.
12. Cooperation with show officials, such as getting entries into the show rings on time.
13. Exhibitors should always wear their exhibitor number to be easily identifiable
14. Parade of Counties: On Friday night at 6:30 p.m. in the Covered Arena during the PRCA Rodeo. Exhibitors will need to be dressed in Western attire for this event. Each County will be presented one at a time and will walk the arena floor to be recognized. County agents can walk in the parade of counties with their contestants.

Top County will receive a Jack Janowitz Memorial Traveling Trophy for one year plus a plaque to stay with their county. Any county winning three consecutive times shall retain possession. Jack Janowitz Memorial Traveling Trophy sponsored by Horse Patch Farms, home of the "Sweet Horses", Mildred & the Jack Janowitz, Franktown, CO.

Special Awards

Colorado State Fair All-Around Advanced Saddle

Awarded to the Advanced exhibitor who accumulates the greatest overall number of points in all three divisions (English, Gymkhana, and Western). Contestants must compete in the Advanced English and Western divisions to be eligible (i.e., contestants competing in Limited Western and

Advanced English are not eligible for this award). Gymkhana points in the contestants' respective age groups will also be counted. The Champion will receive a saddle awarded by the Colorado State Fair Authority. The Colorado State Fair Authority will sponsor the Reserve Champion awards for these All-Around awards.

Colorado State Fair All-Around Limited and Level Advanced Ranch Horse Saddles

The Colorado State Fair Authority is sponsoring these saddles. Reserve winners in both levels will receive awards sponsored by the Colorado State Fair Authority. These awards will go to the individual who accumulates the greatest overall score in all five classes within their designated division of the Ranch Horse Competition. Contestants must compete in all five classes. This includes the written test for the ranch horse division.

Northeastern Junior College Scholarships

The Northeastern Junior College, Sterling, CO, will award a \$1000 scholarship for tuition at NJC to a random exhibitor aged 14-18 who has previously signed up to be eligible for this scholarship. NJC will award one scholarship in the English, Western, and Ranch Horse Divisions. A framed certificate will be presented at the time of the show awards.

Colorado State Fair will put a place on the entry form for all exhibitors aged 14-18 to check if they wish to be eligible to win the NJC Scholarships. All seniors who do not check the box on the entry form will not be eligible to win an NJC Scholarship

Colorado State 4-H Championship Miniature Horse Show

Exhibitor Eligibility and Project Rules

1. Exhibitors competing in the Colorado State Fair 4-H State Championship Miniature Horse Show (4-H Miniature Horse Show) must be members in good standing of a Colorado 4-H Club. Exhibitors who are at least 8 years of age and have not reached their 19th birthday as of December 31st of the previous year are eligible (See Rule 2 in the 2024 4-H Horse Show Rule book).
2. The 4-H Miniature Horse Show is a 4-H show only, not an open or FFA horse show. A 4-H Extension Agent will verify all entry forms to certify that the exhibitor is a member in good standing and enrolled in the Colorado 4-H miniature horse project.
3. Ownership or leasing of miniature horse(s) must be in the name of the exhibitor and the horse ID form must be uploaded to 4H Online by May 1, 2024. Members may not participate in fair-horse events if the miniature horse ID is not on file.
4. Exhibitors may enter classes with miniature horses identified on the horse ID and in their Horse E-Record book as being part of the individual's 4-H project.
5. An exhibitor may not enter more than one miniature horse per class.
6. If a miniature horse(s) cannot compete for any reason, no substitutions will be allowed after the May 1, 2024 Horse ID deadline.

4-H Horse Drug And Medication Rule

1. No horse may be shown in any class at a 4-H show if it has been administered in any manner a forbidden substance. A forbidden substance is any stimulant, depressant or local anesthetic, which might affect the performance of a horse. Stimulants and depressants are defined as medications, which stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous systems.
2. Also prohibited are any drugs, regardless of how harmless or innocuous they might be, which by their very nature might mask or screen the presence of the prohibited drugs or

prevent or delay testing procedures. The use of these drugs will be considered physical abuse and the consequences will be enforced according to the general rules and requirements of the Colorado 4-H Horse Book.

3. The full use of modern therapeutic measures, including phenylbutazone, to improve and protect the horse's health is permitted, unless the treatment may also stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous systems.

Horse Humane Policy Statement

1. It is the responsibility of every 4-H member to ensure that proper care is taken of their horse according to acceptable methods of good equine husbandry, as set forth by CSU and the Colorado Department of Agriculture. A healthy horse requires sufficient food, water, shelter, and correct health care. Cruel and inhumane training methods are inappropriate in the Colorado 4-H Horse Program. Specific equine husbandry guidelines and humane training methods are provided in the Colorado 4-H Horse Project Manual.
2. The management of the State Fair reserves the right to withhold premium awards for violation of any rule governing this department, and to disqualify an exhibitor from participation at this Fair and/or future State Fairs.

Measurements

1. To compete in State Fair Classes, all miniature horses should pass their safety test and be officially measured by the miniature horse project leader. The requirements for obtaining measurements will be followed by the AMHR Rulebook.
2. The miniature horse project leader must re-measure miniature horses under 3 years old every year.
3. Miniature Horses must not exceed 38" inches.
4. If a miniature horse is measured and found to be over 38" inches the Superintendent shall not allow the horse to show.

Show Rules

1. 4-H miniature horse entries, exhibitors, and adults are subject to the 4-H Code of Conduct and the rules published in this document.
2. Miniature horse project members must have shown each project horse they wish to qualify in a qualifying show and taken the written test.
3. Parents/family members and 4-H leaders may, as necessary, assist with minor grooming help with the understanding that the 4-H member should do the majority of the work.
4. The show ring will be under the absolute control of the show management. Only authorized persons will be allowed in the show ring during judging.
5. The State Fair requires all exhibitors to wear proper attire in all horse show classes.
 - a. Proper attire includes a long-sleeved shirt (must be tucked in), long pants, and boots with a heel.
6. All exhibitors are required to take the written test.
7. Any behavior considered negative by the exhibitor, family members of the exhibitor, or leaders directed toward any show official, fair staff, 4-H staff, 4-H exhibitor or their parents will result in disqualification and awards forfeited.
8. All judges' decisions are final.
9. Exhibitors must display a back-tag number while in the show ring.
10. Any exhibitor may wear protective headgear (Certified ASTM/SEI Equine Helmet) in any division or class without penalty from the judge(s).
11. For safety reasons any unruly horse or unsafe equipment may be excused from the ring by the judge, or Superintendent. An exhibitor cannot protest this action.
12. Excessively large classes may be divided by Superintendent or Judge, as conditions warrant.

13. No entry may leave the ring after judging has begun without the permission of the Judge or Superintendent.
14. A horse must be handled and shown through an entire class by the same person. Should an additional handler be required due to physical limitation or emergency, approval must be obtained from the Show Superintendent.
15. Miniature horses may be shown with full mane or mane with bridle path clipped and full tail.
16. Disqualifications: Height more than 38 inches, dwarfism, and unsoundness.
17. All animals must be a year old by October of the current 4-H year for show purposes only. Some classes will have higher age limits.
18. Classes may be dropped, but not added the day of the show. There will be no refunds.
19. Please refer to the 4-H Colorado Miniature Horse Show Rulebook for more in-depth information about the rules of the show, classes and expectations.

Showmanship Division

1. Showmanship at Halter – Showmanship is designed to evaluate the exhibitor's ability to execute, in concert with a well-groomed and conditioned horse, a set of maneuvers prescribed by the judge with precision and smoothness while exhibiting poise and confidence, and maintaining a balanced, functional, and fundamentally correct body position.
2. In Showmanship classes, exhibitors are to show to the presiding (call) Judge only. Only the handler is judged, the horse is merely a prop to show the showmanship ability of the handler.
3. Show management and/or judges define the showmanship pattern.
4. Class Procedures – All exhibitors may enter the ring and then work individually, or each exhibitor may be worked from the gate individually (show and go).
5. The following maneuvers are acceptable for use in the pattern: lead the horse at a walk, trot, extended trot, or back; execute any of the gaits (including back) in straight and/or

curved lines or a combination of straight and curved lines; stop; turn 90, 180, 270, 360 degrees or any combination or multiple of these turns. The pull turn is an unacceptable maneuver. The pattern must require the exhibitor to set the horse up squarely for inspection sometime during the class.

6. Equipment – When showing in Western tack and attire, Western style show halters with lead are to be used. A chain under the chin is allowed, no lip chains or chains over the nose are allowed. When showing in English tack and attire, appropriate English bridle or English style show halter are to be used. Showmanship whips, war bridles or like devices or any type of wire or rope over a horse's head are not permitted.

In Hand Working Performance Division

General Rules

All Obstacle, Jumping, and Hunter Classes

1. A miniature horse can only be shown by one exhibitor per class.
2. The judge and/or Superintendent have the right to alter the course for safety or to meet rule requirements after the course is set and prior to the beginning of the class. Once the first exhibitor has completed the course, no changes may be made. If the same jump set up is used for different classes, and only jump order and/or heights are changed, the judge and Superintendent only need to walk the course one time.
3. Exhibitors will be allowed to walk the course after it has been set and verified by the judge and Superintendent.
4. A hunter/jumper miniature horse must be 3 years and older.

Halter Obstacle

1. To be shown in halter with appropriate lead, chain on lead permitted under the chin of the horse.
2. Horse to be penalized for any unnecessary delay or excessive time at an obstacle. Judge can advance an exhibitor to the next obstacle if a horse is taking excessive time at an obstacle. Maximum time of thirty (30) seconds or two (2) attempts per obstacle.

3. Edible treats are not allowed to encourage an animal to perform one of the obstacles.
4. Whips are not allowed.
5. There must be a minimum of 5 and a maximum of 8 obstacles.

Hunter and Jumper in Hand

- 1) Horses are to be shown in halter or bridle with appropriate lead. Chain on lead permitted under the chin of the horse.
- 2) Hunters and Jumpers may show braided manes and tails in the manner of their larger counterparts.
- 3) Exhibitors are not permitted to go over jumps.
- 4) Whip may not be carried.
- 5) A practice jump of similar construction to the jumps on course will be provided in the warmup area.
- 6) Jump standards may not be taller than 40".
- 7) Jumps must be at least 5 feet wide but no wider than 6 feet.
- 8) There will be a minimum of 4 fences and a maximum of 6 fences.

Jumper Courses

1. Jumper courses should be technically challenging. Jumper courses may consist of lines of fences or single fences, and fences may be placed on straight or curved lines. Multiple turns or changes of direction are encouraged.
2. Fence Heights for Jumpers are: Minimum height 18" Maximum height 33"
3. Jumpers Scoring: Jumpers are scored mathematically on accumulated faults, and on time to complete the course in case of ties. There will be one round which will be both scored for faults and timed. Exhibitors will be placed in order of least faults to most faults, with time utilized to break any ties (i.e. scoring by faults and then by time). There will be no additional rounds. Timing starts when the horse's nose passes the starting line and finishes when the horse's nose passes the finish line.

Hunter Courses

1. Hunter courses are designed to allow the exhibitor to present the horse to its best advantage. Longer distances and wide corners are utilized to enable a smooth presentation. Exhibitors will not be asked for tight turns. Angled jumps must be approached from the long corner, not the short corners.
2. Hunter courses consist of two or three straight or gently curved lines of jumps that do not require turns between them, or single jumps, with room for wide corners between lines and jumps.
3. Fence heights for Hunters are: Minimum height 18" and Maximum height 27".
4. Hunters are not scored mathematically by faults nor by time. Hunters are judged on style and form over fences, manners, way of going and pace in that order. The Judge must penalize unsafe jumping (i.e., charging, refusals) and poor form over fences.
5. Circling once upon entering the ring and once upon leaving the ring is permissible.

Gymkhana Division

General Rules

1. All gymkhana events will be timed.
2. Horses must be under control at all times.
3. Horses must be at least 1 year old for in-hand.
4. Horses are to be shown in a halter with appropriate lead (when in hand). Chain on lead permitted under the chin or over the nose of the horse. A chain is optional. Western, Cable, nylon, and Draft style halters are permitted. Bridles are not allowed.
5. Horses can trot, canter, or gallop for in-hand events.
6. Disqualifications – Any of the following infractions will disqualify an entry.
 - a. Running through the chute or gate to enter the arena.

- b. Failure to begin the course within 1 minute after the ready signal is given.
 - c. A stop or willful refusal to move forward (loss of forward motion).
 - d. Off course, which includes negotiating obstacles in other than the specified order or in the wrong direction. This includes circling, backing or reversing the direction of movement.
 - e. Horse is behaving in an unruly manner or out of control.
 - f. Any kind of cruelty to the horse whether or not specifically mentioned in these rules will disqualify the competitor.
 - g. Striking or beating the horse in any manner whatsoever after entering the arena. Touching the horse will not be considered striking or beating the horse.
 - h. Fall of horse or exhibitor while in the arena.
 - i. Carrying a whip.
7. Timing Procedure – Electric timers are preferred over stopwatches. If an electric timer is used, at least one official should take the time using a stopwatch in case the electric timer fails. If an electric timer is not available, three stopwatches will be used. The median time of the three readings will be the official time. (The median time is the time indicated by two of the three stopwatches if two agree. If no two watches agree, the median time is the time indicated by the watch which indicated neither the fastest nor the slowest time.) All stopwatches must be calibrated to at least one-tenth of a second. The start/finish timing line must be a minimum of 10 feet from the end of the arena. The timing line must be visibly marked in the arena. Contestants are allowed running starts.

In-Hand Barrel Racing

Barrel racing classes can be performed in-hand. These are to be separate classes. Three 55-gallon barrels in safe, usable condition should be used.

1. The size of the pattern (see fig. 22) should be 35 feet between barrels 1 and 2, 40 feet between barrels 2 and 3, 40 feet between barrels 1 and 3, and 25 feet from the timer to the first barrel. The course must be measured exactly. If the course is too large for the available space, then each measurement of the pattern should be reduced 5 feet from

the fence. If the course specified in this rule book is too big for the available space, the distance from barrel 3 to the finish line need to be reduced 15 feet at a time, as long as there is enough room for the horse to stop safely.

2. Knocking Down a barrel will result in a 5 second penalty.

In-Hand Pole Bending

1. The pole bending pattern is run around six poles. The poles are placed in a straight line 10 feet apart. The first pole is to be 10 feet from the starting line. Poles are 6 feet high and set on top of the ground, with bases 10 inches to 14 inches in diameter.
2. Contestants may start on either side of the line of poles. They will cross the starting line, move in an approximately straight line to pole 6 (the farthest pole), make a 180-degree turn around pole 6, pass between pole 6 and pole 5, bend through the poles to pole 1, circle pole 1, bend through the poles to pole 6, make a 180-degree turn around pole 6, and cross the starting line by moving along the poles on the side opposite that on which they first approached pole 6.
3. A 5-second penalty will be assessed for each pole knocked down.

Costume Class

1. General - Costumes must be considered safe.
2. Costume classes are to be judged 75% on originality of costume and 25% on presentation.
3. To be shown at a walk both ways of the arena and lined up in the middle of the arena for final judging.

Point Scoring System

1. Points per class are figured on a 7-2 scale, no matter how many exhibitors are in a class. Example: A child placing 1st in a class of three will receive 7pts, a child placing 2nd would receive 6pts, and so on...

1. Ribbons will be given 1st-6th place in each class.

Event Competition Requirements and Information

General Information

1. Each exhibitor must read and adhere to the Colorado State Fair Competition Requirements adopted by the Colorado State Fair Board of Authority (Board): 2024 General Competition Requirements, 2024 General Horse Show Competition Requirements, and the AQHA and NRCHA rules.
2. When checking in to receive back numbers, exhibitors must bring a copy of their horse papers, all membership cards, and a completed W-9 form to the office.

Class Competition Requirements

1. Open LAE Futurity Classes - If cross-entering with the Open Futurity class, only pay one cattle/office fee and one video fee.
2. Open LAE Derby Classes - If cross-entering with the Open Derby class, only pay one cattle/office fee and one video fee.
3. Non-Pro LAE Futurity & Derby Classes - If cross-entering with the Non-Pro Futurity or Derby classes, only pay one cattle/office fee and one video fee.
4. All Open or Non-Pro Futurity & Derby classes - Can be entered in any combination for which rider and horse are eligible.
5. Classes that run concurrently. When cross-entering, exhibitors pay the highest cattle/office fee.
6. AQHA classes - Exhibitors can only enter an AQHA class once, even though it is offered in multiple class groupings. AQHA classes are double-judged and point-only classes. No awards for these classes.
7. Box Drive - Non-Pros who have earned less than \$750 can enter this class. Rein and Cow work together.

NRCHA And AQHA General Rules

1. Classes close at times posted, and the draw will be posted 30 minutes after the classes close. If you enter after the draw, you will go last in the Herd work, and in all other classes, you will draw in the office for first or last. Draws will be posted on our CSF Facebook Horse Show Group Page!
2. 70% of the entry fees are paid back in Added Money classes, and 100% are paid back in jackpot classes.
3. 3 event classes pay 30% to high go-round scores and 70% to final placements.
4. You must be a member of the NRCHA for all approved classes and a member of AQHA if entering those approved classes. You can join at the show.
5. NRCHA Sliding Scale will be used for all classes.
6. Horses must be shown in order of draw unless there is a conflict with the other arena. All conflicts must inform the announcer and back gate person beforehand.
7. Protests may be filed by NRCHA rules.
8. AQHA rules apply for all AQHA classes offered.
9. NRCHA Show Rep –TBD

\$5,000.00 Added Ultimate Top Hand Challenge (UTHC) Rules

1. All exhibitors must enter the Open or Non-Pro bridle, Spectacular, or the Open or Non-Pro Two Rein Spectacular to be eligible.
2. The Challenge will run concurrently with these classes; therefore, your score from them will be your UTHC score for the herd, rein & fence work.
3. Steer Stopping will run on Saturday after Herd Work. There will be no barrier, but a marker will designate the point at which you can rope the steer.
4. UTHC will have a Non-Pro division and an Open division. \$4,000.00 added to the Open and \$1,000.00 added to the Non-Pro.
5. One horse, one rider, and one bridle throughout the entire 4 classes. It must be legal NRCHA equipment.
6. The exhibitor with the highest score from all 4 events will be crowned the “Open Ultimate Top Hand Champion and Non-Pro Ultimate Top Hand Champion.”
7. Awards will be given to the Open & Non-Pro Champion and Reserve Champion.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

2024 Livestock and Small Animal Competition Requirements

General

- A. The Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, and National Show Ring Code of Ethics will govern all livestock competition events at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”).
- B. **IRS and Colorado Department of Revenue Compliance:** To comply with the Colorado Department of Revenue and the Internal Revenue Service tax-reporting requirements, a properly completed current IRS form W-9 must be submitted for any premium earning of \$600 or more or any monies derived from a sale. Monies won or earned at the Fair will only be paid if the IRS Form W-9 form is correct.
- C. **Premises Identification:** All exhibitors entering Open Livestock or Market Livestock competitions must provide a valid premises identification number (PID) at the time of entry as set forth at 8 CCR 1208-1 Article 8.4(a)(i). To obtain a PID, contact the Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-569-9130 or click on the following link:

- D. **Schedule Of Events:** Authority officials reserve the right to cancel events, change schedules, combine classes, split classes, cancel classes, and adjust premiums if necessary. Officials have the right to combine any classes with five (5) or fewer animals entered at the time of the show.
- E. **Using Animals In Judging Contests:** Exhibitors understand that by entering their livestock into competition at the CSF, the livestock may be used for judging purposes by the members of collegiate judging teams or for the Colorado State Fair Premier Exhibitor Contests. When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for the students to judge in the Dairy or Livestock Judging Contests, he or she is expected to do so. An exhibitor who refuses to allow his or her animal to be used in this manner may be subject to discipline as outlined in Section IV of the General Competition Requirements.

- F. **Clean Up:** All stalls and alleys must be cleaned daily before 10:00 am. Dirty shavings and manure must be piled in the designated area of the barn. No manure should be put into trash cans.

Livestock Pavilion - West End Disposal

Sheep And Swine - Southside Disposal

Anyone found dumping manure or trash in undesignated areas will be subject to a fine of \$100 or disqualification, determined by Authority officials.

- G. **Requesting Of New Breed Show And Infractions Of Existing:** Management will consider requests for new breed shows with a signed request by five potential exhibitors and a payment of \$500, which amount will be applied toward the show's premiums presented to the Livestock and Small Animal Events Coordinator before February 1 of the intended year for such participation.

Breed shows that decrease to less than 10 exhibitors will be placed on a one-year probation period; pending animal numbers for the upcoming year will determine the Authority's right to discontinue that Association's show for the following year. The Authority requires at least 5 exhibitors and not less than 5 animals to be entered and present to conduct a breed show. If those requirements are not met at the time of the show, those animals will be placed in the Other Pure Breed classes.

A Breed association with any debt from the previous CSF year will not be allowed to conduct a breed show in the current year. The full payment in the prior year must be remunerated in cash directly to the Authority's accounting department. The Colorado State Fair Board of Commissioners reserves the right to decide whether to reinstate that breed show for the following year.

- H. **Release of Animals:** Participants must obtain a release form from the species-specific Livestock Superintendent or Department Coordinator to release all their animals, equipment, tack, and feed or bedding before leaving the grounds. Your vehicle and trailers will be checked, and the release will be collected at the exit gate. Animals removed from the Colorado State Fairgrounds without a signed release or before the scheduled release time may be subject to discipline as outlined in the Exhibitor Admission Section of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements and any penalties prescribed by law.

Entry Information

- A. Entries must be submitted online. To submit an entry, visit www.coloradostatefair.com, click “Competitions,” then “Livestock,” and scroll down to the appropriate show.
- B. **Entries:** Exhibitors can enter as many entries in any class as they want, except in Market Classes, which have specific limitations outlined in the Junior Livestock Competition Requirements. All exhibitors must purchase an exhibitor’s pass and bring an International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) National Code of Show Ring Ethics form and Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, which they must sign. Market exhibitors must bring a Quality Assurance Certificate for each animal they will show at the CSF. Exhibitors will not receive credentials or back/ear tags until they submit each form to the Livestock Office.
- C. **Effect Of Entry:** Every exhibitor expressly understands and agrees that an exhibitor’s completed entry form accepts all of the Authority’s competition requirements, whether outlined in a general or a specific rule. The exhibitor further agrees and understands they will abide by the competition requirements at the CSF. Additionally, the exhibitor agrees and understands that failure to comply with the competition requirements may subject them to penalties, including the loss of prize or award money and the return of any other non-monetary awards they may receive.
- D. **Erroneous Entry:** Participants are responsible for their errors and those of their agents and representatives when preparing entries. By applying the participant acknowledges they have read
- Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements
 - Open and Junior Livestock Show Competition Requirements
 - Junior Livestock Sale Competition Requirements
 - Specific or special division Competition Requirements
 - Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct
 - National Show Ring Code of Ethics
 - USDA Wholesome Meat Act

Participants further agree to observe and abide by these competition requirements.

- E. **Objectionable Exhibits:** Management reserves the right to exclude any entry that may be falsely entered from the grounds and also reserves the right to exclude those considered undesirable or objectionable without assigning a reason. Any person or persons who violate any of the competition requirements herein may be subject to discipline as outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements. The Management reserves the right to decline acceptance of entries at any time without a statement of reason.
- F. **Premiums:** There is no limit to the number of animals an exhibitor may enter in a show or in any one class (with the exception of market classes). There is no restriction as to how many places one exhibitor may be paid per class. Premiums will be paid in accordance with the premium schedule listed in each division. Available show premiums are listed under each individual division. Champion classes consist only of those animals that have been awarded first place. Reserve Champion classes consist of the remaining first-place animals and the second-place animal from the class from which the Champion was selected. Ribbons will be awarded through 6th place in all classes. Rosettes or banners will be awarded for champion classes. See individual breeds for special awards.
- G. **Show Photographer:** The exclusive livestock photographer at the CSF is the only entity with the right to sell livestock images. All exceptions must be vetted directly through the official show photographer and the Authority. The name and contact information for the official show photographer will be posted before the start of the 2024 Colorado State Fair.

Parking

- A. Only Official parking permits are allowed on the grounds.
- B. The owners or exhibitors of livestock in illegally parked vehicles may be subject to discipline as outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.
- C. Only 30 minutes of loading and unloading will be allowed inside Gate #4 barn areas.
- D. All vehicle parking credentials are for outside of Gate #4. Overflow parking will be in the South Lot. Otherwise, parking with a fee in public lots will apply. Large trucks and all livestock trailers must park in the secured designated area.
- E. Vehicles parked in unauthorized areas without designated parking passes will be towed at the owner's expense. Anyone refusing to move his or her vehicle out of the loading area upon request by officials will automatically be towed at the owner's expense, and, at that time, the offending individual, their animals, and their tack will be removed from the premises by a Colorado State Fair Authority Public Safety Officer. Further, all pre-paid entry or credential fees and any premiums won at the CSF will be forfeited.

Show Requirements

- A. **Dress Code:** All livestock exhibitors must wear appropriate show attire when competing. Shorts, tank tops, low-cut shirts, sheer blouses, flip flops, t-shirts, shirts with inappropriate messages or logos, ball caps, or bare midriffs are unacceptable and may not be worn during a show event.
- Recommended dress is as follows: long- or short-sleeved, button-down shirt or blouse, clean jeans or slacks with a belt. Hard-soled, closed-toe shoes or boots are recommended to protect the feet.
 - Rabbits and Poultry: jeans or slacks and long-sleeved shirts are preferred for safety.
 - Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats: white shirts and pants are recommended.

Management may refuse entry into the show ring for anyone improperly dressed until said exhibitor is appropriately dressed.

- B. **Show Back Numbers:** Each animal entered is assigned a CSF competition number. Those numbers will be given to each exhibitor as a back number at check-in time. Every back number has the animal's name and class(es) written on the back. The exhibitors must have the correct back number displayed on their back or in a holder attached to the waist before entering the show ring. Not having the correct show animal number displayed coinciding with the original entry on the official judges' sheets may disqualify that animal. Special event hip tag numbers must be displayed on the animal's hip when the animal is in the show ring.

- C. **Unethically Fitted Livestock:** The following are unethical practices and may result in disciplinary action:

1. The injection, use, or administration of any drug or substance that is prohibited by federal, state, or local law or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by federal, state, or local law;
2. The injection (or internal or external administration) of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal for deception, including concealing, enhancing, or

transforming the true conformation, degree of firmness, color, breed, condition of age, or by making the animal appear sounder than otherwise would appear;

3. Cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide, or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter, change, or modify the shape or appearance;
4. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation (i.e., doctoring, doping, tubing, injecting, or lifting or filling under the skin);
5. Any type of injection where oils, glycerin, or like substances are used to alter and change the conformation of an animal;
6. The administration, use, or application of any drug, feed additive, or substance affecting the central nervous system;
7. The administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment, or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal;
8. Any unnatural means of providing an animal feed, water, or other fluids (i.e., stomach pump, I.V.) except for the drenching process;
9. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health and marketability of beef, sheep, swine or goat carcasses or for deception;
10. Artificial color (paint) will be allowed on cattle, but any attempt to change the original color and/or markings of the animal will be prohibited;
11. Prohibited practices also include the use of artificial tail-heads, switches, polls, and hair, as well as any internal or external hoof treatments or artificial substances meant to improve soundness;
12. External application of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause edematous condition; and
13. Use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal.

- D. **Show Ring:** Exhibitors must exhibit and parade their animals in the show ring as directed by the Livestock Program Superintendent. The Livestock Superintendent may exclude stock from competition for unnecessary or upsetting delay on the part of the exhibitors in bringing animals into the show rings. Violation of a Superintendents' directives or of ring steward show ring procedures may result in discipline as outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.

Exhibitor Eligibility and Project Rules

- A. **Health Requirements:** All exhibitors must comply with the respective livestock health requirements, a copy of which can be found at www.coloradostatefair.com. All livestock will be carefully examined at the arrival gate for evidence of infectious or contagious diseases. If, in the opinion of the examining technician, any evidence of infectious or contagious disease is found, Authority Management will consult and follow any necessary procedures outlined in the Animal Welfare Policy.
- B. **Open Division Eligibility:** Open Division eligibility requires all animals to be registered in their respective Breed Association and be owned continuously in the exhibitor's name or Ranch/Farm name since July 20 of the current year. Individual-owned animals cannot be combined with a Ranch/Farm name to accumulate points toward Premier Breeder/Premier Exhibitor awards. Original registration papers and transfers must be available for inspection and comparison with the animal at show time. All Breed Division Special Competition Requirements must be met. Exhibitors entered in the Junior Breeding show may enter the corresponding Open classes upon meeting all requirements and making proper entry and payment by the August entry deadline.
- C. **Check-In Procedure:** All livestock exhibitors must enter through Gate #4, proceed to their load in/out area, and then report to the Livestock Office. Exhibitors must have all necessary paperwork to complete check-in in a timely manner. Entry changes must be made final 12 hours before show time. See individual division for other specifics. Each exhibitor will be required to review entry information and credentials. The exhibitor's signature will constitute the exhibitor's acceptance of entries as recorded in the secretary's record and his or her statement that he or she has observed and will abide by all competition requirements of the

Authority. Any parent, guardian, or other legally responsible person signing for the exhibitor will take full responsibility and liability for the named exhibitor's acceptance of the terms and that the exhibitor has observed and will abide by all competition requirements of the Authority.

- D. **Substitutions:** Open Breeding substitutions of livestock within the same age, class, and owner will be accepted in the Livestock Office up to 24 hours before the respective show. Substitutions not officially recorded in this manner for the secretary's books are invalid. Only one substitution for the original animal will be allowed. No substitutions will be allowed for different age classifications or owners. Substitutions will not be permitted once check-in is completed. This competition requirement pertains to all species.
- E. **Class Descriptions:** Classes with one or two animals making an entry (Cow/Calf, Dam/Daughter, Produce of Dam, and Pair Classes) are considered individual classes and require pre-entry and payment of the regular entry fee. Classes with three or more animals making up an entry are considered group classes. Group Classes require pre-entry by a single identifying exhibitor with no entry fee. There are no group classes offered in Open Breeding Cattle and Open/Jr. Dairy divisions. All animals shown in group or herd classes must have been entered and shown in their respective individual age class. No nurse cows or nurse goats are allowed on the grounds.
- F. **Water:** A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times. NO feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted. At their discretion, CSF Officials reserve the right to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given.

Barn/Stalling Information

- A. **Bedding:** Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the CSF does not include bedding.

Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings through Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding and shavings will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair's website.

Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.

Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

- B. **Generators / Coolers / Fans / Blocking Chutes / Trim Chutes / Trim Tables and Portable Scales:** There will be a \$25 charge for ALL generators payable at the time of entry or added on at the time of check-in. An Authority Livestock Superintendent must approve generators. A permit tag will be assigned after payment is made. Management will move or confiscate Any generator without an Authority permit. Any such confiscation will result in a one-time charge of \$50 and a daily storage fee of \$25 per day until the generator is retrieved from Management and properly located. Please observe all "No Generator Or Cooler" signage. Fans, blocking chutes, generators, trimming chutes, and trim tables are restricted to the individual exhibitor's assigned stalling area so as not to interfere with any other exhibitor's stalling area or aisle ways. Generators and portable coolers are only allowed in the cattle barns.

1. Free-standing fans will not be allowed. Hanging fans will only be allowed when attached to the tie rails or to supports attached to the tie rails. No fans will be allowed to blow from behind an animal, regardless of attachment or location. All fans must be hung above the stalling area.
2. Breeding Beef and Market Beef Exhibitors: One (1) oversized and refrigerated free-standing cooler will be allowed per family. There will be a \$25 fee for ALL oversized and refrigerated coolers payable at entry, or added on at check-in time. A cooler permit tag will be issued after payment is made. Management will move or confiscate any cooler that does not have an Authority permit. Confiscation of coolers

will be handled in the same manner and with the same fees as generator confiscations (see above). All extension cords must be UL approved minimum 16.3.

- C. The CSF Superintendents have the authority to remove any non-approved equipment. Management may charge a one-time fee of \$50 to anyone who has non-approved equipment, including, but not limited to, fans, blocking chutes, generators, trimming chutes, and trim tables. Additionally, anyone using prohibited equipment may be subject to discipline as outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.
- D. No outside scales will be allowed in any barns. Those scales will be provided by the Authority.
- E. **Stalls, Tack Stalls, Pens, and Tie Outs:** All tack stall requests must be submitted in writing and received in the Livestock Office no later than the entry deadline date. There is no guarantee the request can or will be honored. The Authority Superintendents will allocate stall space within the barns when entry fees are completely paid. A cow-calf pair is considered as one (1) entry. A limited number of tie-out stalls are available and will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. Tampering with other exhibitors' stalls, pen assignments, or tie-outs will not be tolerated, resulting in immediate disqualification and immediate removal from the premises. Straw bedding may be used in the cattle tie-out areas. All stalls and tie-outs must be cleaned daily before 10:00 a.m. The Authority is not responsible for any animals in the tie-out area any time of day or night.
- F. **Signs:** A sign may be hung over any animal's stalling area, addressing the owner's name and organization. NO SIGN, which refers in any way to a commercial product, including "For Sale" signs, may be placed anywhere in the Livestock, Sheep/Swine, Goat, or Small Animal barns. Brochure distribution of advertisement is not permitted. Such signs and brochures will be confiscated. Management reserves the right to have objectionable signs removed immediately with no dispute from the distributor.
- G. **Show Photographer:** Beverly Englert Photography is the exclusive livestock photographer at the CSF and the only entity with the right to sell livestock images. All exceptions must be vetted directly through Beverly Englert Photography and the Authority show staff.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

2024 Junior Livestock Competition Requirements

Introductory Provisions

- A. To be considered timely, all livestock entries must be completed online by Monday, July 29, 2024. Entries submitted by mail will not be accepted.
- B. Applicability of these Junior Livestock Competition Requirements:
 - 1. These requirements are specific to the Junior Livestock Competition. These requirements do not supersede or negate the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements or the Colorado State Fair General Livestock Competition Requirements. Market youth exhibitors must read, be familiar with, and sign, where necessary, the IAFE National Show Ring Code of Ethics, the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, Animal Welfare Policy, and the Colorado State Fair Residue Avoidance Guidelines.
 - 2. All exhibitors must be familiar with all Authority competition requirements. Additional requirements for various livestock shows, competitions, and classes supplement these requirements.
- C. No early stall setup will be allowed before scheduled arrival times.

Competition Requirements

Junior Livestock Market Competition Eligibility

- A. Jr. Market livestock exhibitors must be full-time residents of Colorado at the time of nomination and remain full-time residents through the end of the annual Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”).
- B. For purposes of these rules, a “full-time resident” is a person:

1. Whose primary residence at the time of nomination and through the end of the CSF is within the borders of Colorado;
2. who has not lived outside the state of Colorado for more than two consecutive weeks from the time of nomination through the end of the CSF and
3. who has an active membership in a Colorado 4-H or Colorado FFA program.

C. Exhibitors must provide primary care to their livestock.

D. Livestock nominated for the annual fair must reside within the state of Colorado from the time of nomination until the completion of the CSF.

E. Livestock that spend more than two consecutive weeks away from the premise identified on their Nomination Form, whether inside or outside the state of Colorado, between the time of nomination and the end of the annual CSF are not eligible to participate in the Junior Market Livestock Shows.

Nominations

Exhibitors must be members in good standing of a Colorado 4-H or Colorado FFA program at the time of nomination and remain members in good standing of a Colorado 4-H or Colorado FFA program until the completion of the CSF.

1. Exhibitors must be members in good standing of, and enrolled in, a Colorado 4-H Club or a Colorado FFA Chapter and must be active in the project they are exhibiting. 4-H exhibitors must be 8 years of age and have not yet reached their 19th birthday as of December 31 of the previous year to be eligible to compete. FFA exhibitors must be enrolled and active in an approved Vocational Agriculture High School program and not yet have reached their 19th birthday as of December 31 of the previous year to be eligible to compete.

Exhibitors must have met all their county requirements.

2. For 4-H exhibitors, the exhibitor's County Extension Agent must sign a nomination form confirming the following:
 - a. The exhibitor's entry is a bona fide project of Colorado's 4-H program;

- b. The exhibitor is a member in good standing of his or her local 4-H program;
 - c. The animal entered is owned and has been in the continuous possession of the named exhibitor;
 - d. The exhibitor is a resident of the state of Colorado as defined by these requirements, and
 - e. The exhibitor has met all county requirements.
3. By signing the nomination form, the 4-H County Extension Agent confirms:
- a. They have read the General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Market Sale Competition Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, and special Division Competition Requirements;
 - b. They have advised the exhibitor of these competition requirements for the Colorado State Fair and have instructed and cautioned the exhibitor regarding sabotage, tampering, prohibited substances, unethical fitting, and
 - c. The exhibitor has complied with all competition requirements to the extent of the agent's participation.
4. For FFA exhibitors, the exhibitor's Vocational Agriculture Instructor must sign a nomination form confirming the following:
- a. The entry is a bona fide project of Colorado's FFA program;
 - b. The exhibitor is a member in good standing, and
 - c. The animal entered is owned and in the continuous possession of the named participant.
5. By signing the nomination form, the FFA Instructor confirms:
- a. He or she has read the General Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Market Sale Competition Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, and special Division Competition Requirements;
 - b. He or she has advised the exhibitor of these competition requirements for the CSF; has instructed and cautioned the exhibitor regarding sabotage, tampering, prohibited substance, unethical fitting; and

- c. The exhibitor has complied with all competition requirements to the extent of the instructor's participation.
6. The exhibitor's signature and a minor exhibitor's parent's/guardian's signature on the nomination form are required to certify that the entry is a bona fide, enrolled project of a Colorado 4-H or FFA program.
7. By signing the nomination form, the exhibitor, or a minor exhibitor's parent/guardian, certifies that he or she has read and has been advised of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Market Sale Participation Requirements, and special Division Competition Requirements.
8. The exhibitor's signature and the minor exhibitor's parent's/guardian's signature certify that they agree to abide by all competition requirements regarding sabotage, tampering, prohibited substance, and unethical fitting.

Quality Assurance

- A. The exhibitor and the exhibitor's parent/guardian must sign the Quality Assurance Certificate and fully disclose the complete history of all vaccinations, medications, or additives given to the animal while under the exhibitor's control, whether by prescription, over-the-counter or by any other means.
- B. During the market animal inspection, each exhibitor shall submit a Quality Assurance Certificate to the Livestock Office or a superintendent.

Illness, disease, and medications

- A. In the event a market animal exhibits clinical signs of a contagious or infectious disease after it has arrived at the fairgrounds, the exhibitor of the animal (or the exhibitor's parent, a superintendent, or a member of State Fair management on behalf of the exhibitor) must contact a CSF veterinarian for an assessment of the animal, and if deemed appropriate, for treatment of that animal.

- B. If the veterinary diagnosis is that the animal's clinical signs are not due to a contagious or communicable disease, the animal may remain on the fairgrounds and be exhibited upon approval of the veterinarian.
- C. If the affected animal needs medication, the veterinarian will manage the animal's treatment at the exhibitor's expense.
- D. The veterinarian must document the treatment in the exhibitor's packet.
- E. Exhibitors whose animals have received medications at the veterinarian's direction while at the CSF and that have qualified for the Junior Livestock Sale shall disclose all medications administered to determine whether any withdrawal time for said medications used to treat the condition exceeds the withdrawal time, according to the medication's product label for that species.
- F. If an animal is treated with medications while on the fairgrounds, either by a CSF veterinarian as set forth above or by any other party, and if the withdrawal times for the medication(s) administered exceeds the product's label, then in such instance, the Colorado State Fair Authority ("Authority") shall have the right, but not the obligation, to take possession of or slaughter the animal if deemed necessary. In the case of slaughter, CSF Management will determine the procedure for slaughtering said animal.
- G. If at any time during, before, or following the time of the market animal inspection, it is discovered that an animal has received medication in connection with any treatment occurring before arriving at the fairgrounds for competition or exhibition at the CSF and if, according to the medication's product label, the withdrawal time for any such medication used during said treatment surpasses the date upon which the market animal inspection occurs, that animal will not be eligible to compete. The Authority will have the right, but not the obligation, to order that the animal be removed from the Fairgrounds.
- H. Pursuant to the Authority's Junior Livestock Competition requirements, an animal's carcass must contain no trace or residue of any illegal drug or any other substance not approved for administration to such animals under applicable laws or competition

requirements. This means that if positive results are reported to the Authority from its lab, the Authority must investigate to determine what circumstances led to this result.

1. Unapproved drugs are prohibited. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals destined for human consumption. This includes using all products that are not FDA-approved, including, but not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant, or other unapproved medication meant for human usage.
 2. Non-label use of drugs is prohibited. The non-label use of approved drugs is prohibited and may result in an additional investigation around the circumstances and may result in disciplinary action.
 3. Products labeled “all-natural” that are not FDA-approved may contain ingredients that can result in a positive test. It is the exhibitor’s responsibility to know what ingredients are included in products labeled as “all natural.” This includes feed and feed supplements. Every exhibitor is responsible for knowing what is in the feed and supplements provided to the exhibitor’s animals.
- I. The satisfactory completion of the Colorado 4-H Meat Quality Assurance program or the YQCA program is acceptable to the Colorado State Fair.

Junior Livestock Breeding Competition Eligibility

Exhibitor Eligibility

- A. Exhibitors may be from any state except where outlined in individual division competition requirements.
- B. Exhibitors must be members in good standing of and enrolled in a 4-H Club or an FFA Chapter and must be active in the project they are exhibiting. Exhibitors may also be active members of a Junior Breed Association.

Junior Livestock Competition Requirements

1. 4-H exhibitors must be 8 years of age and not yet have reached their 19th birthday as of December 31 of the previous year to be eligible to compete;
 2. FFA exhibitors must be enrolled and active in an approved Vocational Agriculture High School program and not yet have reached their 19th birthday as of December 31 of the previous year to be eligible to compete.
- C. Junior Breed Association members must be at least 8 years of age and not yet have reached their 21st birthday as of December 31 of the previous year to be eligible to compete. Association members must verify membership and age.
- D. Association Membership (such as a photocopy of the current membership card, certificate, or a written verification on the entry card from the Junior Breed Association).
- E. Exhibitor signature certifies he or she agrees to abide by all competition requirements regarding sabotage, tampering, prohibited substances, and unethical fitting, including the
- Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements
 - General Livestock Competition Requirements
 - Junior Livestock Competition Requirements
 - Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct
 - Animal Welfare Policy
 - National Show Ring Code of Ethics will govern all livestock competition events at the Colorado State Fair.

See individual Junior Breeding and Market Show classes for specific or special competition requirements.

Premises Identification: At the time of livestock entry exhibited in any Market competition, the exhibitor shall provide the premises identification number (PID) to identify the premises at which the livestock was raised and maintained throughout any 4-H or FFA project, according to 8 CCR 1208-1 8.4(a)(i). To obtain a PID, contact the Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-869-9130 or use the following link:

Class Eligibility

- A. All Market animal entries must have a nomination form with retinal scan or management approved DNA on file in the Authority's Livestock Office to be eligible to show.
- B. No market entry will be accepted if a nomination form is not on file.
- C. Market animals are not eligible for entry in any breeding show, with the exception of heifers, which may enter and show in the Junior Breeding Heifer Show.
- D. In all Showmanship classes, exhibitors must show their own animals.
- E. The Livestock Superintendents will determine the number of animals in all classes.
- F. Any nominated junior market livestock sold through a private sale, county sale, district sale, or premium sale after the nomination date is not eligible for competition at the current year's CSF. That sale is considered consummated when the animal is sold at auction, regardless of disposition, payment, or delivery of the animal.

Cooperation

All exhibitors and their associates are asked to cooperate with all Authority officials, including office clerks, ground admission, security, and parking personnel while on the fairgrounds.

Family Nominations

Family nominations of Junior. Market Livestock will be accepted. To be eligible for family nominations, the nominated livestock must:

1. Be owned by exhibitors of the same household who reside at the same residence.
2. Be in continuous care of the exhibitors residing at the same residence.
 - a. Must not be sold or transferred out of the exhibitor's custody at any time after the nomination process is complete.
 - b. The Individual who will be showing the family-nominated animal **MUST** be declared at the time of entry. An animal can only be entered by one exhibitor, or the entry is considered invalid, and that animal is not eligible to show.

Proof Of Ownership And Certificates Of Veterinary Inspection

1. A valid brand inspection or a bill of sale is required on all Market Beef dated prior to April 1 of the current year.
2. An ownership certificate is required on all recorded grade junior breeding animals shown.
3. All grade ewes must have a bill of sale or certification of ownership showing the date of sale as of July 20 of the current year.
4. All livestock must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection individually identifying each animal, which must be presented to the Colorado State Veterinarian upon arrival at the fairgrounds.
5. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must be dated at most seven (7) days before the date of arrival.

Registered Animals

1. All registered animals must be registered solely in the junior exhibitor's name.
2. No junior animal that is owned in any type of partnership is allowed to show in the junior livestock division (except FFA and CCI special project heifers).
3. Females shown in this division may be registered or grade animals unless otherwise specified.
4. All male animals must be registered in the respective breed association.

Entries

Market Livestock Entry Limitations

1. An exhibitor may enter for competition as many livestock (animals) as he or she has previously nominated for competition.
2. Of those nominated and entered, the exhibitor will be limited at the time of competition to a total of 4 livestock (animals) in each species.

Entry And Entry Payment

Full payment for every entry made must accompany each entry at the time of application.

Online entries only will be accepted.

Show Requirements

Show Ring

1. Exhibitors are required to show their own animals in the show ring.
2. Should an exhibitor have more than one animal in a class, that exhibitor may have another exhibitor show the additional animal.
3. Additional market animals to be shown in a class must be indicated by a current 4-H/FFA member who is properly entered and exhibiting at the fair.

Unethically Fitted Livestock

The following are deemed unethical practices and may result in disciplinary action:

1. The injection, use, or administration of any drug or substance that is prohibited by federal, state, or local law or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by federal, state, or local law;
2. The injection (or internal or external administration) of any product or material – whether gas, solid, or liquid – to an animal for deception, including concealing, enhancing, or transforming the true conformation, degree of firmness, color, breed, condition of age, or by making the animal appear sounder than otherwise would appear;
3. Cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide, or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter, change, or modify the shape or appearance;
4. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation (i.e., doctoring, doping, tubing, injecting, or lifting or filling under the skin);
5. Any type of injection where oils, glycerin, or like substances are used to alter and change the conformation of an animal;

6. The administration, use, or application of any drug, feed additive, or substance affecting the central nervous system;
7. The administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment, or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal;
8. Any unnatural means of providing an animal feed, water, or other fluids (i.e., stomach pump, I.V.) with the exception of the drenching process;
9. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health and marketability of beef, sheep, swine, or goat carcasses or for deception;
10. Artificial color (paint) will be allowed on cattle, but any attempt to change the original color or markings of the animal will be prohibited;
11. Prohibited practices also include the use of artificial tail-heads, switches, polls, and hair as well as any internal or external hoof treatments or artificial substances meant to improve soundness;
12. External application of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause edematous condition; and
13. Use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal.

Fitting

Fitting Of Animal

1. All junior exhibitors named as owners will accept and acknowledge responsibility for the custody, care, and feeding of their animal(s).
2. Junior exhibitors are expected to participate in preparing their own project animal for exhibition.

3. On the fairgrounds, it is expected that animals exhibited in any junior show should be handled, fitted, dressed, washed, groomed, and shown for show competition by the junior exhibitor.

Assistance With Fitting

1. If a junior exhibitor needs help for safety reasons, he or she may contact the CSF livestock management or livestock superintendent (“Superintendent”) to obtain permission for assistance.
2. Assistance may only be provided by immediate family members (father, mother, stepfather, stepmother, sister, brother, grandparents, or the exhibitor's legal guardian); it does not include hired family employees.
3. The Superintendent must observe the assistance provided, and the junior exhibitor/owner must be present when the family member(s) and Superintendent(s) are assisting with the exhibitor’s animal.
4. Family members can also help with tasks such as verbal support, leading animals, feeding, and watering.
5. Only the junior exhibitor with the animal is allowed in the show ring and photo area.
6. Junior exhibitors are encouraged to provide support for younger exhibitors.

Show Photographer

Beverly Englert Photography is the exclusive livestock photographer at the CSF and the only entity with the right to sell livestock images. All exceptions must be vetted directly through Beverly Englert Photography and the Authority show staff.

Barn/Stalling Information

Bedding

- A. Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding.
- B. Entry into competition at the CSF does not include bedding.
- C. Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings through Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding and shavings will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair's website.
- D. Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.
- E. Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

Generators/Coolers/Fans/Blocking Chutes/Trim Chutes And Portable Scales

- A. There will be a one-time, non-refundable \$25 charge for all generators payable at the time of entry or added on at the time of check-in.
- B. Generators must be approved by a Superintendent.
- C. A permit tag will be assigned after payment is made.
- D. Any generator not having an Authority permit will be moved or confiscated by CSF Management.
- E. Any such confiscation will result in a one-time charge of \$50 and a daily storage fee of \$25 per day until the generator is retrieved from CSF Management and properly located.
- F. Please observe all no generators or cooler signage.
- G. Generators and refrigerated free-standing coolers are not allowed in the Market Lamb barn, the Sheep and Swine barn, or the Goat barn.

- H. Fans, blocking chutes, generators, trimming chutes, and trim tables are restricted to the individual exhibitor's assigned stalling area so as not to interfere with any other exhibitor's stalling area or aisle ways.
- I. Free-standing fans will not be allowed. Hanging fans will only be allowed when attached to the tie rails or to supports attached to the tie rails.
- J. No fans will be allowed to blow from behind an animal, regardless of attachment or location.
- K. All fans must be hung above the stalling area.
- L. All extension cords must be UL approved minimum 16.3.

Market Beef Exhibitor Provisions

1. One (1) oversized and refrigerated free-standing fan will be allowed per family.
2. There will be a \$25 fee for all oversized and refrigerated coolers, payable at the time of entry or added on at the time of check-in.
3. A cooler permit tag will be issued after payment is made.
4. CSF Management will move or confiscate any cooler that does not have an Authority permit.
5. Confiscation of coolers will be handled in the same manner and with the same fees as generator confiscations.
6. Superintendents have the authority to remove any non-approved equipment.
7. CSF management may charge a one-time fee of \$50 to anyone with non-approved equipment, including, but not limited to, fans, coolers, blocking chutes, generators, trimming chutes, and trim tables.
8. Anyone using prohibited equipment may be subject to discipline as outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.
9. No outside scales will be allowed in Market Barns. Those scales will be provided by the Authority.

Stalls, Tack Stalls, Pens And Tie Outs

1. All tack stall requests must be submitted in writing and received in the Livestock Office no later than the entry deadline. There is no guarantee the request can or will be honored.
2. Superintendents will allow 4-foot (4') beef stall space and a pre-set pen for lamb, goats, and hogs within the barns when entry fees are completely paid.
3. Participants will only receive one (1) stall/pen for every animal delivered to the fairgrounds, regardless of the number of entries made for the show.
4. A cow-calf pair is considered as one (1) entry.
5. A limited number of tie-out stalls are available and will be available on a first-come, first-served basis.
6. Tampering with other exhibitors' stall, pen, or tie-out assignments, any misuse of stalls and aisle ways will subject the exhibitor to discipline as set forth in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.
7. Exhibitors must coordinate with the Superintendent on duty for tie-out schedules. All stalls and tie-outs must be cleaned daily before 8:30 a.m.
8. CSF is not responsible for any animals in the tie-out area at any time of day or night.

Barn Security/Restricted Area

For security reasons, all Market Hog, Market Lamb, Market Goat, and Market Beef barns will be locked at 9:00 p.m. every night before the sale date and remain locked until 6:00 a.m. the following morning. Each barn will have Authority Public Safety Officers to secure the area and enforce the nightly lockdown. Exhibitors must confine their animals within their designated stall or pen assignment and wash rack so they do not wander in general public areas.

Clean Up

All stalls and alleys must be cleaned daily before 10:00 a.m. Dirty shavings and manure must be piled in the designated area of the barn. No manure should be put into trash cans.

Livestock Pavilion - West End Disposal

Sheep And Swine - Southside Disposal

Anyone found dumping manure or trash in undesignated areas (including trash cans) will be subject to a fine of \$100 or disqualification, determined by the Authority.

Water

1. A water container, with water, must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times.
2. No feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted.
3. Colorado State Fair Officials (“Officials”) reserve the right, at its discretion, to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given.

Weighing

1. Market beef, lambs, hogs, goats, chicken, turkey and rabbit weights will be nominated by the exhibitor; this will be the official show weight.
2. Weight will be declared at the time of processing and will be the show weight.
3. The CSF reserves the right to re-weigh any and all market beef, market lambs, market hogs, market goats, market chickens, market turkeys and market rabbits immediately following exhibition in the show ring.

4. Beef, lambs, hogs, goats, chickens, turkeys, or rabbits that deviate more than 5 percent from their official nominated weight will be immediately disqualified, and the animal will be marked appropriately.

Objectionable Exhibits, Interpretation, Interference and Testing

Objectionable Exhibits

- A. Management reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any exhibit, animal, or entry that may be falsely entered, those deemed undesirable or objectionable, without assigning a reason.
- B. Persons or persons who violate any of the competition requirements herein may be subject to discipline as outlined in the Determination of Violations Section of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.

Interpretation Or Administration Of Competition Requirements

- A. The Authority reserves to itself the final and absolute right to interpret these competition requirements and to fairly and impartially settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to any competitive event, and the right to amend or add to these competition requirements as its judgment may determine.
- B. The Authority reserves the right to cancel events or change scheduling if deemed necessary.
- C. Specific or special competition requirements or conditions are published in each division where necessary.

Interference With Judging Or Judges

- A. Under no circumstances may any person interfere with any judge during such judge's adjudications.
- B. If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person, by agent or representative, interferes with any judge during that judge's adjudication or behaves in a manner that interferes with any show or with Fair Management, the Authority may immediately remove said exhibitor from the judging area, may disqualify the exhibitor from further competition, may remove the exhibitor from the fairgrounds, and may withhold any prizes that may have been awarded in any other event at the CSF.

Testing And Fees

- A. Management reserves the right to administer random testing, including DNA, urine, tissue, blood, and retinal scanning, for any foreign substances on any animal at any time while that animal is on the fairgrounds.
- B. All Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion animals of each species in the Market divisions will be tested and identification coordinated with the original nomination form. Charges for all testing will be deducted from sales or buyback proceeds.
- C. The Authority will deduct from proceeds as required pertaining to slaughter by state regulations such as, but not limited to: Colorado Beef Board, Colorado Pork Producers' tax, Colorado Brand Board, lamb tax, freight charges, etc.

Using Animals In Judging Contests

- A. Exhibitors understand that by entering their livestock into competition at the CSF, the livestock may be used for judging purposes by the judging teams of Colorado's collegiate judging teams or for the Colorado State Fair Premier Exhibitor Contests. When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for the students to judge in the Dairy or Livestock Judging Contests, he or she is expected to do so.

- B. An exhibitor who refuses to allow his or her animal to be used in this manner may forfeit any prizes he or she has won up to that point.

Animal Carcass

The Authority will take immediate control and possession of any livestock that dies while on the fairgrounds and determine the cause of death and method of disposal per the Colorado State Fair Animal Welfare Policy.

Junior Livestock Sale

Market Animal Disposition

- A. The Authority strives to ensure a fair price for market animal projects.
- B. Buy-back bid prices are subject to the highest local quote from qualified slaughter facilities and the USDA Agri-Marketing Service National Daily Summary.
- C. The Authority is not liable for individual sales conducted through a private party.

Procedures For Selection Of Sale Qualifiers:

- A. The Colorado State Fair Authority Board of Commissioners (“Board”), through its Competitive Exhibits Committee (“Competitive Exhibits Committee”), will select up to 40 Beef, 40 Goats, 40 Hogs, 40 Lambs, 2 Market Chicken Pens, 2 Market Meat Pen of Rabbits, and 2 Turkeys (including Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions) to sell at the 2024 Junior Livestock Sale (“Sale”). No animals lower than 3rd Place will be eligible to qualify for the Sale.
- B. Junior Livestock Sale (“Sale”) qualifiers will be approved, and final decisions will be made under the direction of the Colorado State Fair Board of Commissioners’ Competitive Exhibits Committee (“Competitive Exhibits Committee”). The Competitive Exhibits Committee comprises members from the Board, official General

Superintendents, an official species Superintendent, and a Program Manager. The Sale selection process is as follows:

Grand Champion

Reserve Grand Champion

Top Overall 3 – 5 placing animals

Weight or Breed Division Champions in order of showing

Weight or Breed Division Reserve Champions in order of showing

Continue going through the highest placing in order of showing

In the Market Beef show, a similar percentage of the heifer classes would sell

- A. If all equivalent placing within the species cannot make sale, the eligible participants' names will be put into a drawing and will be selected at random until the maximum numbers are reached.
- B. A tentative sale list will be posted immediately after each Grand Champion drive, listing the maximum allowed sale number for that species (40 Beef, 40 Goats, 40 Hogs, 40 Lambs, 2 Pens of Chickens, 2 Pens of Rabbits, and 2 Turkeys). No alternates will be posted.
- C. Those animals posted will be in the sale. No animal posted will be allowed to leave the fairgrounds, except by movement directly to slaughter after the sale.

Participant Warranties Of Sale/Buy Back Animals

All qualified sale participants warrant:

1. That the carcass of the animal complies with the United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act and is fit for human consumption;
2. That the carcass of such animal contains no trace or residue of any illegal drug or any other substance not approved for administration to such animal under applicable laws or the Authority's competition requirements and regulations;

3. That the carcass of such animal reveals no evidence of any unethical fitting practice, as defined in the Authority's competition requirements and regulations; and
4. That there exists no unusual circumstances or condition of the carcass of such animal that would materially diminish the value of such carcass.

Release Of Animals

- A. Participants must obtain a release form from the species-specific Livestock Superintendent or Program Manager before leaving the grounds to release all their animals, equipment, tack, feed, or bedding. Exhibitors/representatives must provide the Authority ear tag numbers for all Market animals being released.
- B. Your vehicle and trailers will be checked, and the release will be collected at the exit gate.
- C. Animals removed from the fairgrounds without a signed release or prior to scheduled release time may be subject to discipline as set forth in the Exhibitor Admissions Section of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements and any penalties prescribed by law.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

2024 Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements

Selection And Voluntary Withdrawal

- A. The Colorado State Fair Authority Board of Commissioners (“Board”), through its Competitive Exhibits Committee, will select up to 40 Beef, 40 Goats, 40 Hogs, 40 Lambs, 2 Market Chicken Pens, 2 Market Meat Pen of Rabbits, and 2 Turkeys (including Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions) to sell at the 2024 Junior Livestock Sale (“Sale”). No animals lower than 3rd Place will be eligible to qualify for the Sale.
- B. Champion Overall, Reserve Grand Champion Overall, 3rd Overall, 4th Overall, 5th Overall (collectively, “Top 5”), and Division Champions in every species are required to sell in the Sale.
- C. All exhibitors, other than the Top 5 and the Division Champions, who qualify for the Sale may elect to withdraw their animal from the Sale.
- D. Exhibitors who choose to withdraw from the Sale must complete the official 2024 Junior Livestock Sale Exhibitor Withdrawal Form (“Withdrawal Form”) and turn it into the Livestock Office within 30 minutes after the sale qualifiers list has been posted for each respective species.
- E. The withdrawal is final once the Livestock Office has accepted an Exhibitor’s Withdrawal Form. No exhibitor withdrawn from the Sale may reverse that decision after submitting the Withdrawal Form to the Livestock Office.
- F. If an exhibitor qualifies for the Sale with multiple animals within a single species, the exhibitor may choose which animal the exhibitor will sell (unless one of the animals selected is in the Top 5 or is a Division Champion). The exhibitor must report to the Livestock Office immediately following the market show to declare which animal he or she selects to sell.
- G. If an exhibitor qualifies for the Sale with multiple species, the exhibitor may only sell one species (unless the exhibitor has a Top 5 or a Division Champion animal in multiple species).

The exhibitor will be given the choice as to which species the exhibitor chooses to sell. The exhibitor must make this decision and report it to the Livestock Office within 30 minutes after the sale qualifiers list has been posted for the latter qualifying species.

H. There will be no backfilling to any lost sale spots within each respective species.

Introductory Provisions

The Sale is a terminal sale. Every animal that qualifies to be in the Sale and every animal that does sell in the Sale must go directly to slaughter.

- A. Applicability of these Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements:
- B. These requirements are specific to the Sale.
- C. Exhibitors qualified to participate in the Sale shall accept and comply with these requirements.
- D. Any failure to perform in accord with these requirements will subject the exhibitor to discipline as outlined in the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, Section IV, and may result in immediate removal of the exhibitor and his or her animal(s) from the fairgrounds without an opportunity to participate in the Sale.
- E. Participants and exhibitors are expected to perform and conduct themselves with the highest respect for the Sale, its coordinators, the buyers, the other exhibitors, and the livestock involved.
- F. All Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics, Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines, Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements apply equally to the Sale. They will be enforced as part of these specific requirements.
- G. The Authority endorses and supports the United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act as referenced in the Junior Livestock Competition Requirements.
- H. **IRS and Colorado Department Of Revenue Compliance:** To comply with the Colorado Department of Revenue and the Internal Revenue Service tax-reporting requirements, a properly

completed current IRS form W-9 signed by the exhibitor must be submitted for any premium earnings of \$600 or more or any monies derived from a sale. No monies won or earned at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”) will be paid if the IRS Form W-9 form is incorrect. W-9 forms must be turned in to the Livestock Office before the exhibitor enters the sale ring.

- I. Sellers shall comply with the Authority’s requirements for livestock shipping and processing.

Pre-Sale Provisions, Standards, And Requirements

Selection

- A. The Board, through the Competitive Exhibits Committee, will select up to 40 Beef, 40 Goats, 40 Hogs, 40 Lambs, 2 Market Chicken Pens, 2 Market Meat Pen of Rabbits, and 2 Turkeys (including Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions) to sell at the 2024 Sale. All posted animals will sell unless properly withdrawn.
- B. Those posted sale animals will be housed in a designated secured area of the fairgrounds until after sale day.
- C. Any animal posted as a sale qualifier will not be allowed to leave the Authority’s premises except by movement directly to slaughter after the sale.
- D. The sale selection process will be as follows:
 - a. Grand Champion
 - b. Reserve Grand Champion
 - c. Top 3 through 5 Overall of species
 - d. Weight or Breed Division Champions in order of showing
 - e. Weight or Breed Division Reserve Champions in order of showing
 - f. The next highest place in order of showing
 - g. In the Market Beef show, a similar percentage of the heifer classes would sell
 - h. If all equivalent places within the species cannot make the Sale, the eligible participants’ names will be selected from a random drawing until the maximum number is reached.

- i. A sale list will be posted immediately after each Grand Champion drive, listing the maximum allowed sale number for each species: 40 Beef, 40 Hogs, 40 Lambs, 40 Goats, 2 Pens of Chickens, 2 Market Meat Pens of Rabbits, and 2 Turkeys.
 - j. No alternate list will be posted.
- E. The animals posted are the animals that have qualified for and will be in the Sale.
- F. Colorado State Fair Management (Management) has the right to direct any livestock selected for the Sale to be moved to a location other than where the animal boarded prior to its show.
- G. In the event that any animal is disqualified after having qualified for the Sale, the remaining animals will remain in the same place, and no animal will move up to fill any empty place above it.
- H. The Sale is a terminal sale. Every animal that qualifies to be in the Sale and every animal that does sell in the Sale must go directly to slaughter.

Care and Provision of Qualified or Selected Sale Livestock

- A. Junior Market Livestock exhibitors who qualify for Sale will be responsible for caring for, controlling, custody, and feeding their animals until they are loaded for slaughter at the Sale's termination.
- B. If, in the opinion of the Colorado State Fair officials, any livestock is not receiving appropriate care or provision during this period, the General Superintendent may appoint personnel to tend to the livestock at the exhibitor's expense. Any such fees will be deducted from the animal's final sale price before making other payments.
- C. The Authority's officials, Colorado State Veterinarian, or Competitive Exhibits Committee can require or perform examinations or additional testing upon any livestock qualified for Sale.
- D. Management and General Livestock Superintendents reserve the right to mark sale animals before and after the Sale in any manner they desire.

Sale Provisions, Requirements, and Standards

Exhibitor Substitutions

- A. In the event of illness that prevents an exhibitor from showing his or her livestock, which illness is documented by a note from a licensed physician, or if an exhibitor qualifies with more than one Grand or Reserved Grand Champion animal, said exhibitor may petition the Competitive Exhibits Committee to request that a substitute exhibitor stand in for him or her during the Sale.
- B. Any such petition must be in writing and must identify the name of the proposed substitute. Any proposed substitutes must be a youth exhibitor who is also participating in the current fair.
- C. In any such case, both the exhibitor and the proposed substitute may be requested to appear in person before the Competitive Exhibits Committee to receive a final decision from the Competitive Exhibits Committee.

Grooming and Alteration of Livestock

- A. All Junior Livestock Sale animals must be groomed using accepted grooming practices only before entering the sale ring.
- B. No artificial decorations, e.g., lettering, paint, or glitter, of any type will be permitted on any animal entering the sale ring.
- C. No adhesive of any type will be permitted on any animal entering the sale ring.
- D. Authority-sponsored show awards won are allowed.
- E. No livestock groomed or altered in any manner that violates this requirement will enter into the Sale's ring.

Lame, Diseased, Sick, or Deceased Livestock

- A. No animal that is lame, diseased, sick, or deceased may enter the Sale ring.

- B. The Colorado State Fair officials, in consultation with the CSF Veterinarian, shall determine whether an animal may enter the sale ring.
- C. Should an exhibitor's animal become lame, diseased, sick, or deceased after qualifying for the Sale and before commencement of the Sale, then the exhibitor will be allowed to enter the Sale ring without the qualifying animal.
- D. The animal determined to be lame, diseased, sick, or deceased will be purchased from the exhibitor by the Authority at the current year's Sale market buyback price.
- E. The lame, diseased, sick, or deceased animal will thoroughly be inspected by the CSF Veterinarian. The animal will be treated accordingly and, if or when determined safe, will be sold to a processor at fair market value.

Grooming and Dress of Exhibitors

- A. All livestock exhibitors are required to wear appropriate show attire during the Sale. Shorts, tank tops, low-cut shirts, sheer blouses, flip flops, t-shirts, shirts with inappropriate messages or logos, ball caps, or bare midriffs are not acceptable attire and may not be worn during the Sale.
- B. The recommended dress code is a long—or short-sleeved, button-down shirt or blouse, clean jeans or slacks with belt. Hard-soled, closed-toe shoes or boots are recommended to protect the feet.
- C. Rabbits, Chickens, and Turkeys: jeans or slacks and long-sleeved shirts are preferred for safety.
- D. Management may refuse anyone who is improperly dressed to enter the sale ring until said exhibitor is properly dressed.

Post-Sale Provisions, Requirements, and Standards

Direct-to-Slaughter

- A. The Sale is a terminal sale, and all livestock sold will go to slaughter.
- B. Animals going to custom slaughter will be sent to a slaughtering facility designated by the Authority.
- C. No animal will be sent to any other individual packer or slaughterhouse.
- D. The Authority is responsible for the delivery of sale animals to the slaughter-processing facility.

Effect of Condemnation

- A. If for any reason any animal is condemned at slaughter, whether by testing results or by any USDA-inspector condemnation, the Authority may withhold any payment due the exhibitor.
- B. The Authority is not liable for any breaches of contracts between the seller and buyer as a result of any condemnation or any other matter.

Payment

- A. Payment to the exhibitor will not be made until all testing results have been received and declared negative or non-suspect.
- B. Payment to the exhibitor is dependent upon receipt of the purchase price from purchasers to the Authority.
- C. The sale premiums for any sale animal on which a lien has been recorded must be paid directly to the lien holder according to Colorado law.
- D. A seven percent (7%) commission charge of the gross sales price will be assessed against all animals sold in the Sale.
- E. The Authority will additionally withhold from the gross market sale proceeds of each sale animal all fees for testing, trucking, handling charges, taxes, and other prorated deductions.

- F. All sale checks must be cashed or deposited by December 31 of the current year, and no sale checks will be re-issued after that date.

Contract to Buy

- A. The offer to buy is only a guarantee of acceptance at a given price provided the participant has met all other conditions of the competition terms and requirements governing the Sale.

Thank-you Notes to Buyers and Buyers' Groups

- A. The Authority will send the exhibitor his or her buyers' addresses shortly after the conclusion of the fair.
- B. The Authority strongly encourages each exhibitor who sells his or her animal to send thank you notes to his or her respective buyer immediately after receiving the buyer's address.

Discipline

Failure to Show in Sale

- A. Failure to show a qualifying animal in the Junior Livestock Sale will result in the exhibitor forfeiting all awards, recognitions, premiums, and buy-backs earned at the fair.
- B. Said exhibitor will be barred from showing any type of exhibit on the Authority's grounds for three years.

Positive Drug Tests in Carcass, Tissue, or Samples

- A. The test results from the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parents, or legal guardian, even if the exhibitor or the parents or guardians did not administer the drug or foreign substance to the exhibitor's animal. The exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents, or legal guardians, agree that they are responsible for the care and custody of their animal(s) in preparation for and while at the fair.

- B. Exhibitors whose animals test positive for any drug or foreign substance violating these terms and conditions may be disqualified and forfeit all entry and other fees and all premiums, trophies, and awards from the department where the violation occurred.

Result of Violation (any and all penalties may be assessed):

- A. No images of the disqualified exhibitor owned by or in the possession of the Authority may be reproduced at any time in the future or used in any successive publication.
- B. Any disqualified exhibitor may be required to return to the Authority any buckle, banner, or other award received.
- C. No disqualified exhibitor will be recognized for any previously awarded placing in the competition from which he or she was disqualified.
- D. Any disqualified exhibitor may be barred from the competition at the fair for three years.
- E. The General Manager, Department Manager, or Program Manager may determine violations and assess additional penalties outlined in Section IV of the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

2024 Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines for Junior Market Animal Exhibitors, Parents, and 4-H Extension Agents

The Colorado State Fair Authority (“Authority”) would like to review some critical issues. Colorado’s agricultural youth programs are committed to encouraging positive youth development through honest and fair practices regarding junior livestock events. The Authority also continues its commitment to maintaining the integrity of all youth programs. The Authority will continue testing and screening for a broad spectrum of chemical/drug residues at the 2024 Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”).

Strict drug testing and screening will protect the food chain and maintain the high standards of ethics and integrity that the Authority expects from all participants. Drug testing and penalties (including disqualification and forfeiture of awards) for positive drug tests will be strictly enforced.

Why is it important to drug test junior livestock projects?

- To protect the safety of the food supply
- To foster fair competition

What is my responsibility as an exhibitor or parent?

Know the competition requirements before you enter any livestock show. When you enter the CSF Market shows, you agree to read and abide by the Authority’s competition requirements, as set forth at <https://coloradostatefair.com/competition-requirements>.

What are the Colorado State Fair Livestock Show residue avoidance requirements?

According to the Authority's Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, the carcass of an animal must "contain no trace or residue of any illegal drug or any other substance not approved for administration to such animal under applicable laws or Colorado State Fair competition requirements and regulations." If positive results are reported to the Authority from its lab, the Authority must investigate to determine what circumstances led to this result.

- Unapproved drugs are prohibited. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals destined for human consumption. This includes using all products that are not FDA-approved, including, but not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant, or other unapproved medication meant for human usage.
- Non-label use of drugs is prohibited. The non-label use of approved drugs is not permitted and may result in an additional investigation around the circumstances and may result in disciplinary action.
- Products labeled "all-natural" that are not FDA-approved may contain ingredients that can result in a positive test. You must know what ingredients are included in products labeled as "all natural." This includes feed and feed supplements. You are responsible for knowing what is in the feed and supplements you are giving your animals.

What are the best practices for a show animal that falls sick, ill, or injured leading up to the Show?

- Consult with your veterinarian. First and foremost, consult your veterinarian. Do not administer any medications before visiting with your veterinarian. As a part of this conversation, ensure you and the veterinarian know the show's competition requirements. Carefully consider the time before arrival at the show and assume the elimination period is longer than the labeled withdrawal period. From there, you, your family, and your veterinarian should discuss options before making the best decision.

- Make an informed and the best decision possible. The utmost priority should be the animal's welfare. The welfare of the animal should always be a priority over competition. This could result in leaving the animal project at home.
- Document all treatment records. If the animal is treated with an approved drug and withdrawal times are observed, maintain an official record of treatment from the veterinarian, including the date of administration and dosage. That information must be listed on the Quality Assurance form submitted during check-in.

If my livestock project receives a positive test, what should I expect?

- The Authority considers each case on an individual basis. Upon receiving a report that any show animal's blood or urine sample resulted in a positive test, the Authority considers various factors, including whether the substance identified in the testing is prohibited. Should the Authority conclude that discipline is appropriate, you will receive notice by mail, including any required follow-up steps or options you may exercise.

What are the common types of drugs that I may be penalized for?

- Antibacterial Therapeutic Medications – These compounds are used to treat infection, but they don't create a competitive advantage. They can cause food safety concerns if not used according to label directions. Many are only FDA-approved for particular species, meaning that extensive research has been conducted regarding the proper dosage and type of administration to be efficacious in that species and the withdrawal time necessary for meat products to be safe for human consumption.
- Non-Antibiotic Therapeutic Medications – Inclusive of anti-inflammatories, antipyretics, diuretics, and anesthetics, these medications can result in a competitive advantage by altering the physical appearance of the animal or concerns with food safety. Some are available over the counter, and others can only be legally sourced and administered through prescription by a licensed veterinarian. Many are only FDA-approved for a particular species, and use in any other species without a prescription by a veterinarian is illegal.

- Beta-agonists – Originally developed as bronchodilators in humans, large dosages have a growth-promoting effect in animals, resulting in increased muscle and decreased fat. The only beta-agonist that is currently FDA-approved and commercially available for use in livestock production is ractopamine, which is labeled for use in market cattle, market swine, and market turkeys with a zero-day withdrawal (i.e., research indicates that meat products are safe for consumption at any time during the feeding period). Using beta-agonists in species that are not FDA-approved or commercially available creates concerns about food safety or competitive advantage.

The use of all drugs in junior market animals, both unapproved and FDA-approved, is governed by the Authority's Premium Book and the competition requirements located at:

NOTICE

The State Veterinarian may change the requirements if there is a disease risk warranting change in our state or neighboring states.

ALL EXHIBITORS SHOULD CHECK THESE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OFTEN IN THE EVENT OF NEW UPDATES BY THE STATE VETERINARIAN'S OFFICE by visiting the Colorado State Veterinarian's website at: www.colorado.gov/aganimals

General

ALL LIVESTOCK MUST have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or Health Certificate). CVI Requirements:

1. Must be provided to the Colorado State Fair officials at time of arrival.
2. Must be dated **no more than 7 days** from the date of arrival.
3. Must have all animals individually identified, as described below for each species and category
4. Colorado State Fair staff or veterinarians will be checking all CVIs and potentially inspecting every animal. If you do not have an official CVI that was issued within 7 days, an on-site veterinarian will do an inspection at that time and you will be charged accordingly.

All livestock entering this show may be subject to re-inspection by the State Veterinarian or their representative upon entry or during the show. Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination are not permitted to exhibit. Any animals found showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases may be immediately withdrawn from the show and held in isolation at owner's risk and expense. Animals will be held until properly tested, or until released to return to the owner's premises.

All entrants for livestock exhibited in Open, Breed, or Market competitions shall provide a premise identification number at the time of entry.

SWINE:

1. All swine must be accompanied by a CVI issued within 7 days of entry to the fair. All swine must have an ear notch or registered tattoo. If a purebred animal, registration papers must accompany the tattoo.

BEEF and DAIRY CATTLE:

Colorado origin: no testing required, must follow CVI Requirements for all cattle.

Out of state animals, the following apply:

1. **Brucellosis** – Animals may enter the show if they meet the requirements for brucellosis in one of the following ways:
 - a. Originate from a herd not under investigation or from a Brucellosis Class Free State.
 - b. Animals coming from the Designated Surveillance Areas (DSA) of Idaho, Montana and Wyoming must have both:

1. A negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to entry into Colorado or originating from a certified free herd.
 2. Females are officially calfhood vaccinated (OCV).
- 2. Tuberculosis –**
- a. Beef cattle from herds not under quarantine or current investigation for tuberculosis (TB) originating from Tuberculosis Accredited Free-State may enter without a test.
 - b. Animals coming from a less than Free-State status please visit the Colorado State Veterinarian’s website at ag.colorado.gov/animals or call the Colorado State Veterinarian’s office at (303) 869-9130 for complete testing details.
 - c. Dairy Cattle from out of state must have a negative TB test within 60 days.
3. **Trichomoniasis** – Exhibition bulls are exempt from testing as long as no potential breeding contact will occur while in Colorado.
 4. **Official ID** – All exhibition animals from out of state must be officially identified.

GOATS:

1. Must be accompanied by a CVI written within 7 days of entry.
2. All sexually intact goats including market goats must have a Scrapie Premises ID ear tag.
3. Registered meat and dairy goats may use tattoos with breed registration numbers supported by accompanying registration papers in lieu of the tags.
4. Exhibitors with nannies that are close to kidding are strongly advised to leave those animals at home. If those animals kid or show signs of birthing while at the show, they will be isolated and asked to leave the grounds.

SHEEP:

1. Must be accompanied by a CVI written within 7 days of entry.

2. All sexually intact sheep including market lambs must have a Scrapie Premises ID ear tag.
3. All out-of-state rams, 6 months of age or older, must be negative to the ELISA test for *Brucella ovis* within 30 days prior to show or be from a certified *Brucella ovis* free flock.
4. Exhibitors with ewes that are close to lambing are strongly advised to leave those animals at home. If those animals lamb or show signs of birthing while at the show, they will be isolated and asked to leave the grounds.

ALL OUT OF STATE LIVESTOCK must meet Colorado import requirements.

Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition

International Association Of Fairs And Expositions (IAFE) National Code Of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall always deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity in the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior and open-class exhibitors who compete in structured competition classes. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations that they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors must do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds. They shall be prohibited from future exhibitions per the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event that culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than per applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered per federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate. The report from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the animal's condition at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving drugs or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the animal's health shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of

animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. Showing or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair or livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individuals to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, or participant, whether or not they were instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action that contravenes these rules and violates federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Heifers will compete equally with the steers in the Grand Champion Drive.
7. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number. Exhibitors will be provided with entry numbers. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.

8. There will be no official weigh-in of Market Beef. Scales will be available for the exhibitors' use until the deadline for turning in the weight nomination form. The exhibitor must obtain an official weight nomination form when the animal is inspected. The official weight nomination form must be turned in to the Livestock Office no later than the deadline listed above. The weight(s) indicated on the weight nomination form will be the official show weight. There will be no weight changes after the weight nomination form has been turned in.
9. A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times. NO feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted. At its discretion, CSF officials reserve the right to contact an Authority veterinarian to determine if water should be given. Drenching for hydration purposes will be allowed. No stomach pumping will be permitted.
10. Market beef exhibitors may use nose rings or tongs to control their animals.
11. Exhibitors are only allowed in the beef show ring staging areas.
12. After each class of Market Beef has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five animals on the official scale. Market Beef cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight as previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Market Beef is weighed out, it will be disqualified, and the remaining animals will be moved up in placing. The disqualified beef is not eligible for any other class and will not be reweighed.
13. Any violation of the General Livestock Competition Requirements and Junior.

3. During the Market Chicken show, the Authority will have an on-call veterinarian to help monitor the birds' health. Any bird that becomes ill while on the fairgrounds will be immediately

quarantined and reported to the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office. The on-call veterinarian will discuss further steps to be taken with the State Veterinarian's Office at that time.

4. All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements, Health Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, and Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines. Exhibitors in this division must complete a Meat Quality Assurance program and comply with the IAFE Code of Ethics.

8. A scale will be available for exhibitors to weigh before turning in the weight nomination forms. Band numbers must be designated on the card at the time of weight nomination. Each chicken within the pen must have an individual leg band. No leg band numbers or weight changes will be allowed after 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 23, 2024.
9. Market Chicken exhibitors are required to carry their own birds to the judging table and shall remain at the table until their market pen is dismissed by the judge. 6. Due to limited space, no tack pens will be available. All items, e.g., feed, show boxes, trimming stands, are to be placed in areas designated by the Superintendents. Any of these items placed in pens may be removed without warning. DO NOT take pens apart; leave them as assembled. Exhibitors may bring plywood for the top of their pens for storage.
7. Goats must be sheared in designated areas only. Goats must be slick-shorn and of uniform length from the knee and hock up before inspection. “Blocking” or fitting in an attempt to alter or enhance a goat's appearance is not allowed. No shearing will be

12. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number, which will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.
13. A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times. No feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted. At its discretion, CS Fair officials reserve the right to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given. Drenching for hydration purposes will be allowed for Market Goats at the CSF. No stomach-pumping devices will be allowed. Injection, drenching, or application of any substance (including any caustic substance) per rectum is prohibited. Competition Requirements

This show is co-sponsored by the National Junior Swine Association and the Team Purebred Junior Association.

1. All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements. Exhibitors must comply with the Wholesome Meat provisions and the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct. Exhibitors are encouraged to read and be fully informed of the contents of the Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines.
2. All exhibitors in Open, Junior Breeding, and Market shows must submit a premises identification (PID) number at entry. PID may be obtained by contacting the Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-869-9130 or click on the following link:
<https://ag.colorado.gov/animals/colorado-location-identification-lid-registration-premises>
3. Bedding: Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition ("CSF") does not include bedding. Bedding may be pre-purchased at the time of entry.

Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings through Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding and shavings will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair's website.

Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.

Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

4. Market Barrows and Gilts are eligible to show and must weigh no less than 235 pounds and no more than 290 pounds to be eligible to show. Gilts may be entered in only one show, Market or Open Breeding.

5. Pseudorabies test requirements:
 - a. A pig must originate from Colorado or a Pseudorabies Free Status State when purchased for feeding and the exhibitor must provide evidence (bill of sale) of the pig's origin prior to unloading on the fairgrounds.
 - b. Arrive at the fair with a current health certificate.
 - c. If conditions A and B above are met, a Pseudorabies test is not required.
 - d. If condition A above is not met, the pigs must be tested and negative for Pseudorabies before entering the fairgrounds.
6. All purebred hogs must have registration papers that have been transferred to or registered in the name of the junior exhibitor and not in a family or farm name by July 1, 2024. All entries must be owned and have primary care by the exhibitor as of June 1, 2024. Home raised pigs require a statement of such signed by a parent or guardian.
7. Each individual exhibitor will be permitted to bring up to four (4) hogs to the Market Hog Show. If an exhibitor brings 1 or 2 pigs, the exhibitor is allowed only one pen; 3 to 4 pigs are allowed two pens. Members of a family will be required to group two hogs together. If dividers are required within a pen, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to provide the exhibitor's own adjustable panel. No tack pens will be available. The standard pen size is approximately 6'x6'. Any items, such as feed, show boxes, etc., placed in pens not assigned to an exhibitor will be removed without warning. Check with the Superintendent for the availability of space for tack placement. If stalling capacities are reached, entries will be returned to the exhibitor. Exhibitors may bring their own plywood (16"x3') to place over their designated pens only. The Authority does not provide plywood.
8. A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each pen/stall area at all times. Authority Officials reserve the right, at their discretion, to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given. No feeding or watering of animals in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations.
9. Clipping of hogs with cordless clippers will be permitted before inspection.

10. Market Hogs cannot use any compounds, including hairdressing compounds, oils, paints, powders, glitter or other dressings at any time. Water-based conditioning products only. Only oil is allowed on feet. Hogs must have been washed with soap and water only and cleaned for inspection.
11. Any violation of the General Livestock Competition Requirements or Junior Livestock Competition Requirements regarding fitting of livestock may result in disciplinary action:
12. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number, which will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.
13. There will be no official weigh-in of Market Hogs. Scales will be available for the exhibitors' use until the deadline for turning in the weight nomination form. The exhibitor must obtain an official weight nomination form when the animal is inspected. The official weight nomination form must be turned in to the Livestock Office no later than the deadline listed above. The weight(s) indicated on the weight nomination form will be the official show weight. There will be no weight changes after the weight nomination form has been turned in.
14. Classes should be entered by breed classification only. Market classes will be offered in the breed divisions listed, with the order of show from lightweight to heavyweight divisions.
15. Market Hog entries must include ear notch numbers, and the notches should be uniform, healed, and match registration papers per National Swine Registry rules. Any questionable notches will not be allowed to show. NJSA/NSR and Team Purebred personnel will check all hogs entered in breed classes at processing. DNA will not be considered for eligibility when ear notches do not match entry cards. DNA hair samples are required for all hog entries.
16. Crossbred Market Hogs will be entered as Light Crossbred or Dark Crossbred. Crossbred Market Hogs will be inspected at the time of breed classification to determine they are entered in the correct Crossbred division. The following will be used to classify dark and light crossbred hogs:
 17. Dark Cross – to classify as a dark cross, the animal must have black pigment and hair in the same location. Examples: black belted, white hog with black spots, calico with black spots, white hog with a black head.

18. Light Cross – to classify as a light cross, the animal must have white and non-black pigment. Examples: red belts, red roans, blues and blue butts (including blues with black pigment on snout and toes).
19. Market Hogs will be reviewed by breed classification officials on Thursday, August 22nd at the time of inspection. If the breed classification officials determine that an entry in any breed division does not exhibit the characteristics required by that breed association, the entry will be transferred to a crossbred class. If the exhibitor does not accept the transfer, he or she can withdraw his or her entry from the show, but the entry fee for that animal will not be refunded.
20. There must be 15 or more in a breed division to establish individual breed classes. With fewer than 15 in a breed division, breeds will be combined and shown in the other purebred divisions (Dark OPB or White OPB). If there are not enough animals to make the Dark OPB or White OPB classes, those hogs will be shown in a general OPB class.
21. Special purebred classes will be provided for Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, Landrace, Spots, Poland China, Berkshire, Chester White, and Hereford hogs. Purebred classes will be broken by weight, with approximately 15-20 animals per class, depending on the number of entries. All NJSA market hog entries must be registered Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, or Landrace. All Team Purebred market hog entries must be registered Berkshire, Chester White, Poland China, or Spotted market animals.
22. All NJSA market hogs are to be guaranteed negative of the stress gene to be exhibited at an NJSA or NSR event. At a Team Purebred event, all Chester White hogs are guaranteed to be stress-negative. Berkshire hogs must be stress-negative and stress status must be on the pedigree. NSR and NJSA reserve the right to randomly collect a DNA profile on exhibited animals for stress genes, parentage identification, and breed purity at any event where registered animals are exhibited. This collection will be supervised by NSR or NJSA representatives.
23. All NJSA breed Champions, Reserve Champions, or randomly selected market hogs may be blood tested for presence of the stress gene, parentage verification, and breed purity.

24. NJSA and Team Purebred Champion and Reserve Champion overall premiums as well as breed Champion and Reserve Champion premiums will not be awarded until the DNA results are verified at the NSR office.
25. Any NJSA and Team Purebred hogs that fail these DNA tests for the stress gene, parentage verification, or breed purity will be asked to forfeit all show premiums and awards sponsored by NSR. If premiums and awards are not returned to NSR, the exhibitor will not be allowed to compete in future NSR, NJSA, or Team Purebred events.
26. Failed NJSA test results will not be publicized except in the normal listing of canceled pedigrees that is published in the NSR newsletter, For the Record, and the NJSA newsletter. The Pinnacle Photos will also be removed from the NSR website, www.nationalswine.com.
27. Market hogs must meet all registration eligibility requirements of their respective breed associations. NSR and Team Purebred representatives will inspect all purebred hogs for eligibility.
28. Market Hogs will be divided into as near equal classes as feasible by breed and weight.
29. Exhibitors only are allowed in the hog holding or staging pens at any time.
30. After each class of Market Hogs has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five animals on the official scale. Market Hogs cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight as previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Market Hog is weighed out, it will be disqualified, and the remaining animals will be moved up in placing. The disqualified hog is not eligible for any other class and will not be reweighed.
31. Once the sale hogs have been determined, those animals will be moved to an area designated by the Livestock Superintendents. All equipment, except for those items needed to feed and water animals and clean stalls, shall be removed from the barn. All non-sale hogs MUST be removed from the barn by 9:00 P.M. on show day unless the exhibitor has received permission from the Livestock Department.
32. This show is terminal only for the Market Hogs selected for the Junior Livestock Sale ("Sale"). Animals not chosen for the Sale will be released to the exhibitor after the final sale order is

Swine Show Classification Standards

Note: All breeds must have been ear-notched within seven days of birth. Any hog not properly ear-notched or having an ear notch that is not healed completely will be ineligible to show. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors must have completed the Youth Pork Quality-PLUS Certification.

Berkshire

1. The ideal color pattern is black with six white points (face, four socks, tip of tail). Less desirable but acceptable are sandy-colored hair in the areas with white and black borders.
 - a. Color Qualifications for Registration (boars, gilts and barrows must meet the following color requirements to be recorded):
 - b. A Berkshire must have white on the face and tail, unless the tail is docked.
 - c. Three of four legs must be white.
 - d. A Berkshire must not have a spotted or mottling pattern – an intermixture of black and white and/or red hair that is larger than a contiguous 93.5 square inches area anywhere on the body of a mature pig (approximately an 8 ½ x 11 square inch area, on a 50 lb pig, this would be equivalent to 15 square inches, or a 3 x 5 area).
 - e. A Berkshire must not have an area of white skin that exceeds 93.5 square inches of contiguous solid white skin on the upper 2/3 of the body (15 square inches on a 50 lb pig).
 - f. A Berkshire cannot have white skin or hair that continuously encircles the body anywhere between the ear's base and the tail's base. From the base of the ear forward, a Berkshire cannot be solid white.
 - g. A Berkshire cannot have any skin color besides black and white (including red or sandy-colored skin).
2. The ideal ear carriage is ridged and tight. Less desirable but acceptable, ear carriage is:
 - a. ears that are larger than aesthetically pleasing and;
 - b. ear carriage that lacks rigidity.
3. No animal shall be eligible to record unless it is distinctively ear-notched at farrowing time. All pigs from the same litter must carry the same litter notch. When individual ear notches are used, the right ear shall be used for the litter notch and the left ear for an individual notch, per

the official Berkshire ear-notching system. Official ear-notching system is available on request. No two litters on the farm shall be ear-notched the same during the same farrowing season, which may be interpreted as being between January 1 through June 30 and July 1 through December 31 of each year.

4. Disqualification for Registration of Breeding Animals. The presence of one or more of the following are disqualifications for registration:
 - a. less than 6 functional teats on each side,
 - b. the presence of one or more swirls on upper half of the body,
 - c. total blindness,
 - d. rectal or uterine prolapse,
 - e. hermaphroditism,
 - f. atresia ani;
 - g. cryptorchidism or monorchidism;
 - h. scrotal and/or umbilical hernia,
 - i. ear carriage that “breaks” to the point in which ears are continually directed in a downward angle

Chester White

1. Must possess Chester White Breed characteristics.
2. Must be ear notched within 7 days of birth.
3. Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
4. Any skin pigmentation other than white that exceeds five in number are disqualified.
5. Ears must be down and medium size.
6. Any signs of weighed ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.
7. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
8. The Chester White Swine Association requires that all sires used for recorded litters be DNA stress-tested negative before they can be part of the Chester White recording base. Additionally, all sires resulting from a negative-negative mating must be DNA stress-tested negative before being part of the Chester White sire database.

9. All Chester White pigs consigned to national shows/sales or state association events are guaranteed to be stress-negative by the exhibitor.

Duroc:

1. Duroc barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be red in color and possess Duroc breed character. Ears must be down.
 - b. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
 - d. Must NOT have any black hair located on the animal.
 - e. Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin, and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
 - f. Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.
 - g. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - h. Must be stress negative.
 - i. There are no underline requirements to exhibit Duroc barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Duroc boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.i.), along with the following, to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. The United Duroc Swine Registry (UDSR) will allow Durocs to be recorded with less than 12 teats. However, Durocs must possess six or more functional teats on each side of the underline to be exhibited at breeding stock shows. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
 - ii. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis, and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

Hampshire

1. Hampshire barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be black with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body. The animal is eligible if it has a black head and the body is totally white.
 - b. Must possess Hampshire breed character (ears must be erect and not rounded).
 - c. The ear must be notched within seven days of birth.
 - d. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
 - e. Must NOT have any red hair.
 - f. Must NOT have any evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - g. Must be stress-negative.
 - h. There are no underline requirements to exhibit Hampshire barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Hampshire boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.a.), along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. Black in color with a white belt totally encircling the body, including both front legs and feet.
 - ii. Animal can have white on its nose as long as the white does not break the rim of the nose, and when its mouth is closed, the white under the chin can NOT exceed what a U.S. minted quarter will cover.
 - iii. White is allowed on the rear legs as long as it does NOT extend above the tuber calcis bone (knob of the hock).
 - iv. Hampshire swine classified as off-belts may be used for breeding purposes, with offspring eligible for registration with the NSR. Off-belts will continue to be eligible to be shown in market hog classes but will not be eligible for exhibition in breeding swine shows. Due to the Hampshire Swine Registry off-belt requirements, this policy is retroactive and will allow litters that were not eligible previously to be registered.
 - v. Hampshire breeding animals may be recorded with less than 12 teats. However, to be exhibited at breeding stock shows, Hampshires must possess six or more

functional teats on each side of the underline. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.

Hereford

1. Ideal Color Markings

- a. The ideal color markings of all Hereford breeding hogs eligible for registration shall be red, light or dark however, deep red is preferred with a white head, ears, and 4 white legs; whether the underline of the animal is white or red is breeder preference. Ears must be at least broke forward.

2. Breed Definitions

- a. Splash or drip of white- small spot if white not connected to any other patch of white on the body.
- b. The face of the animal- starting at the top of the forehead extending down to and includes the nose, mouth, eyes, and jawbone line.
- c. Blaze Face- a small, narrow strip of white running in between the eyes.
- d. White foot- 1" Above the hoof with the white extending over that entire area at sale or show age. The white must go all the way around the foot.

3. Minimum and Maximum amount of white allowed for breeding stock registration eligibility with the intent to be shown or sold as a show or breeding animal. The body shall be at least 2/3 red, there shall be no white over the back beyond the shoulder blade with the exception of a splash or drip, with no connecting belt anywhere on the body. This does not include the neck. Herefords fitting this category must also have white on at least 2/3 of their face, ears broke forward and possess at least 3 white feet.

- a. 3.1 – Marking and Other for breeding animals. Other disqualifications are more than 5 black spots larger than a U.S. minted .50ct piece on any part of the animal or 1 black spot larger than 4 inches at any point of measurement, erect ears, or where an animal shows evidence of an extra dewclaw, boars with one testicle, less than 6 functional teats on each side of underline, permanent deformities of any kind.

4. Hereford Market Animals. Market animals shall be eligible for registration as off-marked with these requirements: At least 50% of a white face, at least 50% red body, at least 2 white feet. This will be known as the "50-50-50 rule".

- a. Off-marked boars must be registered as barrows. No off-marked males are permitted for breeding purposes or for marking purebred swine.
 - b. Off-marked females must be registered with an OM in front of the registration # or animal's name.
 - c. Off-marked females are only allowed in market swine classes where females are permitted and are in no way eligible to be shown in purebred breeding classes.
 - d. Off-marked females must be registered as market animals. Thus, these market animals must be declared at registration and will receive a pedigree stating. "This animal is a Purebred Hereford Hog meeting minimal requirements governed by The National Hereford Hog Record Assn. to be shown or sold as a market animal only and is not eligible for breeding or breeding swine shows as a purebred Hereford Hog." Due to ineligible color markings or other purebred breeding swine classifications.
5. Reporting of belts and black spots in breeding animals' offspring. Belts and black spots do appear occasionally. It is the job of the breeders and members to do their best to eliminate this from their herds. The National Hereford Hog Record Assn must be informed of any swine-producing belted or black-spotted offspring.

Landrace

1. Landrace barrows and gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be white and possess Landrace breed character (ears must be down). Refer to the ideal Landrace photo.
 - b. The ear must be notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT allow any color hair other than white.
 - d. Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
 - e. Must NOT allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.
 - f. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - g. Must be stress-negative.
 - h. Must not have a hernia or rupture – both scrotal and abdominal.
 - i. Must not have hermaphroditism.
 - j. Must not have cryptorchidism.

- k. Barrows must not have one testicle or any pronounced abdominal condition of the testicles.
 - l. Must have at least six functional udder sections on each side of the underline. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
2. Landrace boars and gilts intended for breeding:
- a. Must meet the above requirements along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

Poland China

1. Must possess Poland China Breed characteristics.
2. Must be ear notched within 7 days of birth.
3. Must be black with six white points (face, feet and switch).
 - a. **Tail docking is permissible.
 - b. **An occasional splash of white on the body is permissible.
 - c. **A hog may not possess more than one (1) solid black leg and be determined as a Poland China.
4. Must have ears down
5. Must not have evidence of a belt formation of either white or white skin encircling and touching the points of the shoulder extending down on both sides of the animal to the depth of the elbow pocket.
6. Cannot have red or sandy hair/and or pigment.
7. Hogs that have weighed ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.
8. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
9. All Poland sires and dams used to record a litter must have a DNA card on file to record a litter.

10. For national shows, all entries must be stress-identified and must be either stress-negative or stress carriers. No stress positives are allowed to be shown or sold.

Spotted Swine

1. Must be black and white.
2. Must possess Spotted Breed characteristics.
3. Must be ear notched within 7 days of birth.
4. Ears cannot be erect.
5. Any red-tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
6. No solid black head from ears forward.
7. No white belt pattern (hair or skin) that encompasses the back 1/3 of both shoulder blades and extends down to the foreleg of the animal. The belt pattern is not completely broken by black. Exception to this rule is a predominately white-bodied individual with a white face.
8. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.
9. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
10. All Spotted sires used for litter recordings must have a DNA card on file to be allowed to register any litter.
11. All Spotted sires must have a stress status identified to be used as a sire, and those sires who are the result of a stress-tested negative (testing paid for by NSSR) if notified that this blood test is required.
12. All Spotted animals entered and exhibited at a national show must be stress-identified and can either be stress-negative or stress-carriers. No stress-positive animals are allowed to be shown or sold.

Yorkshire

1. Yorkshire barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire breed character (ears must be erect).
 - b. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT have any color hair except for white.

- d. Must NOT have more than two pigmentation spots larger than a U.S.-minted dime or one pigmentation spot larger than a U.S.-minted quarter. These pigmentation spots (combined) can NOT exceed a U.S.-minted silver dollar.
 - e. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - f. Must be stress-negative.
 - g. There are no underline requirements to record and exhibit Yorkshire barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Yorkshire boars and gilts intended for breeding:
- a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.g.), along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. Must possess six or more functional teats on each side of the underline to be recorded and exhibited. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
 - ii. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis, and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

Competition Requirements:

1. All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements. Exhibitors must comply with the Wholesome Meat provisions and the

Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct. Exhibitors are encouraged to read and be fully informed of the contents of the Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines.

2. All exhibitors in Open, Junior Breeding, and Market shows must submit a premises identification (PID) number at the time of entry. PID may be obtained by contacting the Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-869-9130 or click on the following link:

3. Bedding: Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”) does not include bedding.

Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings from Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding and shavings will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair’s website.

Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.

Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

4. Purebred, grade, or crossbred wethers or ewe lambs are eligible. All lambs must weigh a minimum of 110 pounds at the weigh-in. Male animals having one or both testicles contained in the body cavity are not eligible to show.
5. No tack pens will be available until all lambs have been stalled. Any items, e.g., feed, show boxes, placed in pens not assigned to the exhibitor will be removed without warning. Check with the superintendent about the availability of space for tack placement.
6. All lambs must be shorn in designated areas only. Lambs must be slick-shorn at time of inspection. Wool foretops and boots may be left on the lamb. No shearing will be allowed after processing. Only hand shearers and cordless clippers may be used to clip legs after processing. Grooming tables may be moved if they are blocking any aisle or walkway.
7. Any violation of the General Livestock Competition Requirements or Junior Livestock Competition Requirements regarding fitting of livestock may result in disciplinary action.

8. Market lamb exhibitors may use meshed or plastic muzzles at the CSF. The muzzle style must allow the lamb to drink water.
9. Market Lambs shall show no evidence of surgical docking, prolapses, purse strings, sutures, etc. If any of these are evident in sheep, that animal will be disqualified from the show.
10. A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times. No feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted. Colorado State Fair Officials reserve the right, at its discretion, to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given. Drenching will be allowed for Market Lambs at the CSF for hydration purposes only. No stomach-pumping devices will be allowed.
11. Breed classification officials will review Market Lambs on Friday, August 25th during inspection. If the breed classification officials determine that an entry in any breed division does not exhibit the characteristics required by that breed association, the entry will be transferred to a crossbred class. If the exhibitor does not accept the transfer, he or she can withdraw his or her entry from the show, but the entry fee for that animal WILL NOT be refunded.
12. No iced or wet towels are allowed in the holding area, and no family members are permitted in any of the lamb-holding or staging pens at any time. No Exceptions.
13. There will be no official weigh-in of Market Lambs. Scales will be available for the exhibitors' use until the deadline for turning in the weight nomination form. The exhibitor must obtain an official weight nomination form when the animal is inspected. The official weight nomination form must be turned in to the Livestock Office no later than the deadline listed above. The weight(s) indicated on the weight nomination form will be the official show weight. There will be no changing of weights or breeds after the weight nomination form has been turned in.
14. Classes will be offered in the breed classifications listed, with a maximum of 25 heads per class and a minimum of 15 heads per class. In the event there are not 15 Dorsets entered, Dorsets will show with Speckled Face. If there are not 15 Wool breeds, those animals will be combined with the Speckled Face. If there are not 15 Southdown entries, those entries will be combined with the Dorsets. If there are not 15 Dorsets, Southdowns, Wool breeds, and Speckled Face combined

entries, those entries will be placed in the Black Face classification. Breeds having only one (1) class of animals will only have the Champion and Reserve Champion qualify for the Junior Livestock Sale.

15. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number, which will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.
16. In all Market Lamb classes, the front feet of the sheep must remain on the show ring floor while being shown. Judges and Superintendents will have the discretion to enforce disqualification.
17. After each class of Market Lambs has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five animals on the official scale. Market Lambs cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Market Lamb is weighed out, it will be disqualified, and the remaining animals will be moved up in placing. The disqualified lamb is not eligible for any other class and will not be reweighed.
18. Once the sale lambs have been determined, those animals will be moved to a showcase area at the time designated by the Livestock Superintendents. All equipment, except those needed to feed and water animals and clean stalls, shall be removed from the barn. The Authority will provide each exhibitor with two (2) bags of shavings for use in the new stalling area.
19. This show is terminal for only those Market Lambs selected for the Junior Livestock Sale. Lambs not selected for the Sale will be released to the exhibitor or may be consigned for a buyback. Market Lamb exhibitors are encouraged to utilize sound biosecurity practices upon departure from the fairgrounds; recommended biosecurity procedures are available in the Livestock Office.

3. Unloading and Pickup of Small Animals: All Small Animals (Rabbits) will be received at the east door of the Small Animal Building. Enter the fairgrounds at Gate #1 (Arroyo Ave). Exhibitor vehicles will receive a 30-minute load/unloading pass at the gate. Exhibitors must unload their rabbits and their vehicles off the grounds by 10:00 A.M on Friday, August 23rd. This time limit will be strictly enforced. To request assistance in the transport of animals from the parking area to the check-in, go to the Small Animal Building and check with the Rabbit staff. Authority personnel will assist in this transport. No exceptions.
4. Market Exhibitors must submit a Quality Assurance form, the Exhibitor Code of Conduct, and the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics form at check-in time. Cooping of rabbits will not be allowed until such time as all forms are turned in.
5. Exhibitors may enter and check-in four rabbits for each pen of three entered, i.e., four rabbit pens may come to the fair.
6. Market Rabbit entries must have been nominated through the Exhibitor's 4-H Extension office. Market entries that have not been nominated are ineligible to show at the fair and will be returned to the exhibitor (no exceptions).
7. By 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 23, 2024, the exhibitor must choose the pen of three to be the Official Pen to be shown. Ear tattoo numbers must be designated on the weight declaration card when turned in to the office. Each rabbit within the pen must have an individual tattoo in the left ear.
8. A scale will be available for exhibitors to weigh before turning in the weight nomination cards. Scale pre-weighs will close at 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 23, 2024.
9. No changes of Ear Tattoo numbers will be allowed after 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 23, 2024. Failure to submit a completed weight nomination form by the specified time will automatically disqualify the exhibitor from competing. Rabbits will need to be removed from the showroom. Any ear tattoo numbers found to be altered or different during judging will disqualify the entire pen.

10. Each pen of three will be weighed only once for official show weight at the time of judging. The American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) licensed judge or a Colorado Department of Agriculture Division of Weights and Measurement representative will record official show weights. No reweighs are allowed.
11. After each class of Market Rabbits has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five pens on the official scale. Market Rabbit pens cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Market Rabbit pen is weighed out, it will be disqualified, and the remaining animals will be moved up in placing. The disqualified pen is not eligible for any other class, including showmanship, and will not be reweighed.
12. Market Rabbit exhibitors must carry their own rabbits to the judging table and shall remain at the table until their market pen is dismissed by the judge(s). Exhibitors with more than one pen in a class may designate another 4H/FFA member in good standing to assist them with their animals. Exhibitors must report this name to the office or the Superintendent at the judging table. No parent or adult can carry market pen rabbits to or from the judging table. Entry will be disqualified if this takes place.
13. Market Rabbit Pens will be judged according to the latest ARBA Standard of Perfection 2021 - 2025. Meat pens shall consist of three rabbits, all of the same breed and variety. If the pen is from a breed having a broken color variety, the entire pen must be of the same color variety. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Age limit of 10 weeks – minimum weight of 3 1/2 pounds each and maximum weight of 5 1/2 pounds each. All rabbits will be weighed in the presence of the judge.
14. Disqualifications From Competition: If any one rabbit in the pen is overweight or underweight, the entire pen is disqualified from competition. ARBA disqualifications from competition and breed disqualifications apply to each meat pen. Exception to disqualification only on the following:
 - a. Body smut on Californian or Himalayan-marked animals.
 - b. Non-descended testicles on bucks.

15. Rabbit Pens Will Be Judged On:

- a. Meat Type 40 Points
- b. Condition of Flesh 30 Points
- c. Uniformity of body and weight 20 Points
- d. Fur 10 Points

16. Junior Livestock Sale Qualifiers: The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit Pens will qualify for the Junior Livestock Sale (“Sale”). This is a terminal sale only for those rabbits that qualify for the Sale. All Junior Livestock Sale Competition Requirements apply to qualifying Market Rabbit pens. Sale qualifiers must attend a meeting on Tuesday, August 27, 2024, at 8:30 a.m. in the Southwest Motors Events Center.

Competition Requirements

1. This show is terminal for all Market Turkeys showing at the 2024 Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“Fair”). The Colorado State Fair Authority (“Authority”) will offer a buyback consignment.
2. ALL Market Turkey exhibitors must provide a health certificate listing all birds brought to the fairgrounds. The health certificate must be dated no more than seven (7) days before the arrival at the fairgrounds. Any bird showing signs of illness or mortality will not be allowed on the fairgrounds.

3. During the Market Turkey show, the Authority will have an on-call veterinarian to help monitor the birds' health. Any bird that becomes ill while on the fairgrounds will be immediately quarantined and reported to the Colorado State Veterinarian's Office. The on-call veterinarian will discuss further steps to be taken with the State Veterinarian's Office at that time.
4. ALL entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Sale Participation Requirements, Animal Welfare Policy, Health Requirements, and Drug Residue Avoidance Guidelines. Exhibitors in this division must complete a Meat Quality Assurance program and comply with the IAFE Code of Ethics.
5. All exhibitors in Open, Junior Breeding, and Market shows must submit a premises identification (PID) number at the time of entry. PID may be obtained by calling 303-869-9130 or clicking on the following link:

6. Turkeys over 30 pounds are ineligible to show in the Market Division.
7. Market Turkey entries must have been nominated through the Exhibitor's 4-H Extension office. Market entries that have not been nominated are ineligible to show at the CSF, and entries will be rejected, and no refund will be issued.
8. Any market animal that has been sold at a county sale, district sale, or premium sale after the specified ownership date is not eligible for competition at the current year's fair. That sale is considered consummated when the animal is sold at auction.
9. Exhibitors may enter and check-in four turkeys for each class entered, i.e., four turkeys per class may come to the fair. The Leg Band number will be placed on Coop Tag at that time.
10. Each bird entered in the Market Turkey Division must have a "numbered" leg or wing band. The band numbers must be listed on all entry forms at the time of online entry submission.
11. A scale will be available for exhibitors to weigh before turning in the Official Weight Nomination Scale. Pre-weighs will close at 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 25, 2023. Band numbers must be designated on the form at the time of weigh-in. Each turkey must have a leg band. No

changes of leg band numbers on the Weight Certification form will be allowed after 5:30 p.m., Friday, August 23, 2024.

12. Market Turkey exhibitors are required to carry their own birds to the judging table and shall remain at the table until their market pen is dismissed by the judge(s). Exhibitors with more than one bird in a class may designate another 4-H/FFA member in good standing to assist them with their animals. Exhibitors must report this name to the office or the Superintendent at the judging table. No parent or adult can carry market pen turkeys to or from the judging table. Entry will be disqualified if this takes place.
13. After birds have been cooped, they cannot be removed from the assigned cage. Birds may be touched, handled, and managed inside the cage only by the owner/exhibitor of the birds or CSF official Poultry Show Staff.
14. An exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents (if the exhibitor is a minor) must fill out a Meat Quality Assurance form, which the exhibitor shall turn in at the time of weight nomination.

Overview Competition Requirements

1. All exhibitors must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Junior Livestock Competition Requirements, Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements.
2. All entrants must be 4-H members (being 8 years of age and not having reached their 19th birthday as of December 31, 2023) or in FFA and active in an approved Vocational Agriculture school program as of January 1, 2024 (not to have reached their 19th birthday as of December 31, 2023).
3. This competition is open only to those junior market exhibitors who successfully enter and compete at the 2024 CSF. In addition, the exhibitor must qualify for the 2024 CSF Junior Livestock Sale (“Sale”). Once the final sale determination has been made for a species, all qualifying exhibitors will automatically be enrolled in the Premier Exhibitor Competition.
4. If an exhibitor qualifies for the Sale with multiple species. That exhibitor will be eligible to compete in all Premier Exhibitor Competitions for each species in which the exhibitor qualifies.
5. The competition comprises four different event categories that earn the exhibitor points towards a final maximum score of 200 points. These categories include Market Class Placing (50 Points Maximum), Market Showmanship Placing (50 Points Maximum), Live Judging Classes (50 Points Maximum), and a Written Exam (50 Points Maximum).
6. To maintain eligibility within the competition, the exhibitor must actively participate in each of the four event categories.

7. Ties of the highest cumulative points will be decided based on scores in individual categories in the following order: first: highest Market Class Placing; second: highest Market Showmanship Placing; and third: highest combination of scores between the “Live Judging Classes” and the “Written Exam.”

Market Class Placing

Live Judging Classes

1. The “Live Judging Classes” will account for 25% of the overall score, earning points ranging from a minimum of 0 points to a maximum of 50 points.

3. Exhibitors will participate in judging two live market animal classes, each with four animals per class, and each class is worth 25 total points. 8. Each “Judging Card” will allow for a maximum score of 50 points. The score registered on the “Judging Card” will then be prorated to a maximum of 25 points.

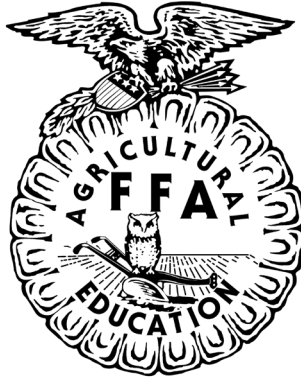

The American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Boulevard, Saint Joseph, MO 64501, will participate in premiums offered in individual classes for Junior Angus heifers, as included in its standard show classifications, according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown.

- The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself.

- The premium assistance should not be used to offset show expenses and shall be included in the premium payments distributed by the show to the exhibitors.
- A minimum of fifteen (15) head must be shown in the junior Angus heifer classes to receive American Angus Association premium participation.
- The show is not required to have all classes to be eligible for premiums.
- Separate classes for bred and owned heifers may be held if the size of the show merits a separate class.
- To be eligible for association premiums the entries must be recorded in the sole name of the junior exhibitor and the issue date on the registration certificate must conform to the individual show's requirements regarding ownership.
- The Association's contribution is included in the total premiums listed in each class.
- Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association.
- All cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums.
- The Association does not pay on premiums offered in championship classes.
- An animal may only be counted one time toward the total count for premium participation by the Association.
- Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate issued by the American Angus Association available for inspection at the show for each animal or other current proof of ownership issued by the American Angus Association pedigree look up.
- Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show.

- Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-identified (tattooed/branded) and rechecked at the show.
- Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have proof of registration at check in. Only one person at a time shall lead an animal into the show ring.
- Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders' Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part Two; Association Rules.
- The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2; Association Rules; Rule 800 Series, including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches.
- The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited.

Competition Requirements

The National Swine Registry (NSR), Certified Pedigreed Swine (CPS), and the American Berkshire Association (ABA) co-sponsor this show.

1. All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements. When applicable, all association rules shall apply.
2. All entrants for livestock exhibited in Open, Breed, or Market Competitions shall provide a premises identification (PID) number at the time of entry. To obtain a PID, contact the

Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-869-9130 or click on the following link:

3. Bedding: Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF” does not include bedding.

Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings through Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair’s website.

Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.

Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

4. Pseudorabies test requirements:
 - a. A pig must originate from Colorado or a Pseudorabies Free Status State when purchased for feeding, and the exhibitor must provide evidence (bill of sale) of the pig’s origin before unloading at the State Fair.
 - b. Arrive at the fair with a current health certificate.
 - i. If conditions A and B above are met, a Pseudorabies test is not required.
 - ii. If condition A above is not met, the pigs must be tested and negative for Pseudorabies before entry into the CSF.
5. Gilts may be entered and shown in only one show, either Market Hogs or Open Breeding Gilts. Gilts cannot show in both shows.
6. Breeding Gilt entries must include ear notch numbers, and the notches should be uniform, healed and match registration papers per National Swine Registry rules. Any questionable notches will not be allowed to show. All hogs entered in breed classes will be checked and processed by NSR and CPS personnel.
7. Any violation of the following competition requirements regarding fitting of livestock will result in automatic disqualification with no recourse:

- a. The natural color of the gilt cannot be altered using any artificial coloring. However, products that match the Hogs must be shown in natural conformation and color, except where stated otherwise in this premium list. Any product used externally to alter the conformation or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, false hair, artificial color, adhesives or other similar substances.
 - b. The natural color of the gilt may be used in the fitting process from the knees and hocks down and on the switch only.
 - c. Any grooming material on any other part of the body not mentioned will be rubbed with a cloth or glove showing evidence of artificial color.
 - d. Any entries adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or any hair or hair-like substance.
 - e. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited.
 - f. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body.
 - g. Any ear tag tampering or removals other than by an Authority official or licensed veterinarian.
8. Each entry will be assigned a number. Entry numbers will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.
 9. There is no limit to the number of animals an exhibitor may enter in this show or in any one class. Premiums will be paid per the premium schedule listed in this division.
 10. Exhibitors only are allowed in the hog holding or staging pens at any time.
 11. Exhibitors must clean pens prior to receiving a release to remove animals or tack from the Colorado State Fair.

Purebred Breeding Gilts

1. Special purebred classes will be provided for Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, Landrace, Spots, Poland China, Berkshire, Chester White, and Hereford hogs. Purebred classes will be broken by age with approximately 15-30 days of age separating the animals in each class. All National Swine Registry (NSR) breeding gilt entries must be registered Duroc, Hampshire,

Yorkshire or Landrace. All Certified Pedigreed Swine (CPS) breeding gilt entries must be registered Chester White, Poland China, Spotted Poland China, or Hereford. All Berkshire breeding gilts must be registered through the American Berkshire Association (ABA).

2. Purebred gilts must have been born on or after December 1, 2023.
3. To be eligible to show, all purebred gilts must be registered in their respective breed associations and bear the proper breed association ear tags.
4. All purebred gilts must have registration papers that have been transferred to or registered in the exhibitor's or farm's name by July 1, 2024. All entries must be owned and have primary care by the exhibitor as of June 1, 2024.
5. Original registration papers or ownership certificates must be available for inspection at the show.
6. Breeding Gilts must meet all registration eligibility requirements of their respective breed associations. The NSR, CPS, and ABA will inspect all purebred hogs for eligibility.
7. All NSR Breeding Gilts are to be guaranteed negative of the stress gene to be exhibited at an NSR event. At a CPS event, all Chester White hogs are guaranteed to be stress-negative. Berkshire hogs must be stress-negative, and stress status must be on the pedigree. NSR reserves the right to randomly collect a DNA profile on exhibited animals for stress gene, parentage identification, and breed purity at any event where registered animals are exhibited. This collection will be supervised by NSR representatives.
8. All applicable NSR, CPS, and ABA Breed Champions, Reserve Breed Champions or randomly selected breeding gilts may be blood tested for presence of the stress gene, parentage verification and breed purity
9. Any NSR, CPS, and ABA hogs that fail these DNA tests for the stress gene, parentage verification, or breed purity will be asked to forfeit all show premiums and awards sponsored by NSR, CPS, or ABA. If premiums and awards are not returned to these associations, the exhibitor will not be allowed to compete in future NSR, CPS, or ABA events.

10. Failed NSR, CPS and ABA test results will not be publicized except in the normal listing of canceled pedigrees that is published in the NSR, CPS, and ABA newsletters.

Crossbred Breeding Gilts

1. All crossbred gilts will be shown by weight. There is no minimum weight limit and a maximum weight limit of 375 pounds.
2. Crossbred Gilts will be entered as Light Crossbred or Dark Crossbred. Crossbred Gilts will be inspected at the time of breed classification to determine they are entered in the correct Crossbred division. The following will be used to classify dark and light crossbred gilts:
3. Dark Cross - to classify as a dark cross, the animal must have black pigment and
4. hair in the same location. Examples: black belted, white gilt with black spots, calico with black spots or white gilt with a black head.
5. Light Cross - to classify as a light cross, the animal must have white and non-black pigment. Examples: red belts, red roans, blues and blue belts (including blues with black pigment on snout and toes).
6. There will be no official weigh-in of Crossbred Breeding Gilts. Scales will be available for the exhibitors' use until the deadline for turning in the weight nomination form. The Exhibitor must obtain an official weight nomination form when the animal is inspected. The official weight nomination form must be turned in to the Livestock Office no later than the above deadline. The weight(s) indicated on the weight nomination form will be the official show weight. There will be no weight changes after the weight nomination form has been turned in.
7. After each Crossbred Breeding Gilt class has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five animals on the official scale. Crossbred Breeding Gilts cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight as previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Crossbred Breeding Gilt is weighed out, it will be disqualified and the remaining animals

will be moved up in placing. The disqualified hog is not eligible for any other class and will not be reweighed.

8. Ribbons and premiums will be awarded 1st through 6th place in all individual classes.

Swine Show Classification Standards

Note: All breeds must have been ear-notched within seven days of birth. Any hog not properly ear-notched or having an ear notch that is not healed completely will be ineligible to show. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors must have completed the Youth Pork Quality-PLUS Certification.

Berkshire

1. The ideal color pattern is black with six white points (face, four socks, tip of tail). Less desirable, but acceptable, are sandy colored hair in the areas where white and black border.
2. Color Qualifications for Registration (boars, gilts, and barrows must meet the following color requirements to be recorded):
3. A Berkshire must have white on the face and tail unless the tail is docked.
4. Three of four legs must be white.
5. A Berkshire must not have a spotted or mottling pattern – an intermixture of black and white and/or red hair that is larger than a contiguous 93.5 square inches area anywhere on the body of a mature pig (approximately a 8 ½ x 11 square inch area, on a 50 lb pig, this would be equivalent to 15 square inches, or a 3 x 5 area).
6. A Berkshire must not have an area of white skin that exceeds 93.5 square inches of contiguous solid white skin on the upper 2/3 of the body (15 square inches on a 50 lb pig).

7. A Berkshire cannot have white skin or hair that continuously encircles the body anywhere between the base of the ear and the base of the tail. From the base of the ear forward, a Berkshire cannot be solid white.
8. A Berkshire cannot have any skin color besides black and white (including red or sandy-colored skin).
9. The ideal ear carriage is ridged and tight. Less desirable but acceptable, ear carriage is:
 - a. ears that are larger than aesthetically pleasing and;
 - b. ear carriage that lacks rigidity.
10. No animal shall be eligible to record unless it is distinctively ear-notched at farrowing time. All pigs from the same litter must carry the same litter notch. When individual ear-notches are used, the right ear shall be used for the litter notch and the left ear for the individual notch, per the official Berkshire ear-notching system. Official ear-notching system is available on request. No two litters on the farm shall be ear-notched the same during the same farrowing season, which may be interpreted as being between January 1 through June 30 and July 1 through December 31 of each year.
11. Disqualification for Registration of Breeding Animals. The presence of one or more of the following are disqualifications for registration:
 - a. less than 6 functional teats on each side,
 - b. the presence of one or more swirls on the upper half of the body,
 - c. total blindness,
 - d. rectal or uterine prolapse,
 - e. hermaphroditism,
 - f. atresia ani;
 - g. cryptorchidism or monorchidism;
 - h. scrotal and/or umbilical hernia,
 - i. ear carriage that “breaks” to the point in which ears are continually directed in a downward angle.

Chester White

1. Must possess Chester White Breed characteristics.
2. Must be ear notched within 7 days of birth.
3. Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
4. Any skin pigmentation other than white that exceeds five in number are disqualified.
5. Ears must be down and medium size.
6. Any signs of weighed ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.
7. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
8. The Chester White Swine Association requires that all sires used for recorded litters be DNA stress-tested negative before they can be part of the Chester White recording base. Additionally, all sires resulting from
9. a negative-negative mating must be DNA stress-tested negative before being part of the Chester White sire database.
10. All Chester White pigs consigned to national shows/sales or state association events are guaranteed to be stress-negative by the exhibitor.

Duroc

1. Duroc barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be red in color and possess Duroc breed character. Ears must be down.
 - b. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
 - d. Must NOT have any black hair located on the animal.
 - e. Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin, and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
 - f. Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.
 - g. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - h. Must be stress-negative.
 - i. There are no underline requirements to exhibit Duroc barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Duroc boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.i.), along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. The United Duroc Swine Registry (UDSR) will allow Durocs to be recorded with less than 12 teats. However, to be exhibited at breeding stock shows, Durocs must possess six or more functional teats on each side of the underline. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
 - ii. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

Hampshire

1. Hampshire barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body. Animal is eligible if it has a black head and the body is totally white.
 - b. Must possess Hampshire breed character (ears must be erect and not rounded).
 - c. The ear must be notched within seven days of birth.
 - d. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
 - e. Must NOT have any red hair.
 - f. Must NOT have any evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - g. Must be stress-negative.
 - h. There are no underline requirements to exhibit Hampshire barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Hampshire boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.a.), along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. Black in color with a white belt totally encircling the body, including both front legs and feet.
 - ii. An animal can have white on its nose as long as the white does not break the rim of the nose, and when its mouth is closed, the white under the chin can NOT exceed what a U.S. minted quarter will cover.
 - iii. White is allowed on the rear legs as long as it does NOT extend above the tuber calis bone (knob of the hock).
 - iv. Hampshire swine classified as off-belts may be used for breeding purposes, with offspring eligible for registration with the NSR. Off-belts will continue to be eligible to be shown in market hog classes, but will not be eligible for exhibition in breeding swine shows. This policy is retro-active and will allow litters to be registered that were not eligible previously due to the Hampshire Swine Registry off-belt requirements.
 - v. Hampshire breeding animals may be recorded with less than 12 teats. However, to be exhibited at breeding stock shows, Hampshires must possess six or more functional teats on each side of the underline. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.

Hereford

1. Ideal Color Markings

- a. The ideal color markings of all Hereford breeding hogs eligible for registration shall be red, light or dark however, deep red is preferred with a white head, ears, and 4 white legs; whether the underline of the animal is white or red is breeder preference. Ears must be at least broke forward.

2. Breed Definitions

- a. Splash or drip of white- small spot if white not connected to any other patch of white on the body.
- b. The face of the animal- starting at the top of the forehead extending down to and including the nose, mouth, eyes, and jaw bone line.
- c. Blaze Face- small, narrow strip of white running in between the eyes.
- d. White foot- 1" Above the hoof with the white extending over that entire area at sale or show age. The white must go all the way around the foot.

3. Minimum and Maximum amount of white allowed for breeding stock registration eligibility with the intent to be shown or sold as a show or breeding animal. Body shall be at least $\frac{2}{3}$ red, there shall be no white over the back beyond the shoulder blade with exception of a splash or drip, with no connecting belt anywhere on the body. This does not include the neck. Herefords fitting this category must also have white on at least $\frac{2}{3}$ of their face, ears broke forward and possess at least 3 white feet.

- a. 3.1 – Marking and Other for breeding animals. Other disqualifications are more than 5 black spots larger a U.S. minted .50ct piece on any part of the animal or and 1 black spot larger than 4 inches at any point of measurement, erect ears; or where an animal shows evidence of an extra dewclaw, boars with one testicle, less than 6 functional teats on each side of underline, permanent deformities of any kind.

4. Hereford Market Animals. Market animals shall be eligible for registration as off-marked with these requirements: At least 50% of a white face, at least 50% red body, at least 2 white feet. This will be known as the "50-50-50 rule".

- a. Off-marked boars must be registered as barrows. No off-marked males are permitted for breeding purposes or for marking purebred swine.
- b. Off-marked females must be registered with an OM before the registration # or animal name.
- c. Off-marked females are only allowed in market swine classes where females are permitted and are in no way eligible to be shown in purebred breeding classes.
- d. Off-marked females must be registered as market animals. Thus, these market animals must be declared at the time of registration and will receive a pedigree stating. "This animal is a Purebred Hereford Hog meeting minimal requirements governed by The National Hereford Hog Record Assn. to be shown or sold as a market animal only and is not eligible for breeding or breeding swine shows as a purebred Hereford Hog." Due to ineligible color markings or other purebred breeding swine classifications.
- e. Reporting of belts and black spots in breeding animals' offspring. Belts and black spots do appear occasionally. It is the job of the breeders and members to do their best to eliminate this from their herds. The National Hereford Hog Record Assn needs to be informed of any swine-producing belted or black-spotted offspring.

Landrace

1. Landrace barrows and gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be white in color and possess Landrace breed character (ears must be down). Refer to the ideal Landrace photo.
 - b. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT allow any color hair other than white.
 - d. Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
 - e. Must NOT allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.
 - f. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - g. Must be stress negative.
 - h. Must not have hernia or rupture – both scrotal and abdominal.
 - i. Must not have hermaphroditism.
 - j. Must not have cryptorchidism.
 - k. Barrows must not have one testicle or any pronounced abdominal condition of the testicles.
 - l. Must have at least six functional udder sections on each side of the underline. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
2. Landrace boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis, and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

Poland China

1. Must possess Poland China Breed characteristics.
2. The ear must be notched within 7 days of birth.
3. Must be black with six white points (face, feet, and switch).
 - a. Tail docking is permissible.
 - b. An occasional splash of white on the body is permissible.
 - c. A hog may not possess more than one (1) solid black leg and be determined as a Poland China.
4. Must have ears down
5. There must not be evidence of a belt formation of either white or white skin encircling and touching the points of the shoulder extending down on both sides of the animal to the depth of the elbow pocket.
6. Cannot have red or sandy hair/and or pigment.
7. Hogs that have weighed ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.
8. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
9. All Poland sires and dams used to record a litter must have a DNA card on file to record a litter.
10. For national shows, all entries must be stress-identified and must be either stress-negative or stress carriers. No stress positives are allowed to be shown or sold.

Spotted Swine

1. Must be black and white.
2. Must possess Spotted Breed characteristics.
3. Must be ear notched within 7 days of birth.
4. Ears cannot be erect.
5. Any red-tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
6. No solid black head from ears forward.
7. No white belt pattern (hair or skin) that encompasses the back 1/3 of both shoulder blades and extends down to the foreleg of the animal. The belt pattern is not completely broken by black. Exception to this rule is a predominately white-bodied individual with a white face.
8. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.
9. All boars and gilts must have six (6) functional teats on each side for exhibition.
10. All Spotted sires used for litter recordings must have a DNA card on file to be allowed to register any litter.
11. All Spotted sires must have a stress status identified to be used as a sire, and those sires who are the result of a stress-tested negative (testing paid for by NSSR) if notified that this blood test is required.
12. All Spotted animals entered and exhibited at a national show must be stress-identified and can either be stress-negative or stress carriers. No stress-positive animals are allowed to be shown or sold.

Yorkshire

1. Yorkshire barrows or gilts exhibited as market animals:
 - a. Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire breed character (ears must be erect).
 - b. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
 - c. Must NOT have any color hair except for white.
 - d. Must have a maximum of two pigmentation spots larger than a U.S.-minted dime or one pigmentation spot larger than a U.S.-minted quarter. These pigmentation spots (combined) can NOT exceed a U.S.-minted silver dollar.
 - e. Must have no evidence of an extra dewclaw.
 - f. Must be stress-negative.
 - g. There are no underline requirements to record and exhibit Yorkshire barrows or gilts as market animals.
2. Yorkshire boars and gilts intended for breeding:
 - a. Must meet the above requirements (except item 1.g.), along with the following to be eligible for recording and exhibition in a breeding animal class:
 - i. Must possess six or more functional teats on each side of the underline to be recorded and exhibited. Pin teats and inverted nipples are not considered functional.
 - ii. A boar must not have a physical defect (including but not limited to an adhered or tied penis, limp penis, infantile penis, and coiling of the penis in the diverticulum), which would hinder proper delivery of semen, and the boar must extend his penis without physical manipulation excluding the expression of the sheath fluid; if a boar cannot meet the above requirements, his pedigree will be canceled.

All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, IAFE National Show Ring Code of Ethics, Animal Welfare Policy, and Health Requirements. Exhibitors must comply with the Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct.
2. All exhibitors in Open, Junior Breeding, and Market shows must submit a premises identification (PID) number at entry. PIDs may be obtained by contacting the Colorado

3. Bedding: Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”) does not include bedding.

Exhibitors may pre-order bedding and shavings through Rustic Ranch Supply or bedding will be available to purchase on-grounds from Rustic Ranch Supply upon arrival. The phone number and order portal will be posted on the Fair’s website.

Straw may only be used for dairy cattle, dairy goats, breeding sheep, and open breeding cattle tie-outs. All other uses of straw are prohibited.

Outside bedding for livestock exhibitors is permitted.

4. Wether does will show by weight. The minimum weight for wether does is 40 lbs. and a maximum weight limit is 225 lbs. for goats. Does may be mouthed for age if necessary. Doe(s) exhibited in the market goat show are not eligible to exhibit in the Junior Wether Doe show.
5. It is up to the exhibitor as to whether does are slick or fitted, they can be shown braced or natural while in the show ring. Participants may use collars or halters with a short lead when showing.
6. Goats must be sheared in designated areas only. Shearing will not be allowed after processing. Only hand shearers and cordless clippers may be used for touch-ups after inspection.
7. Application of any substance per rectum or topically to change the natural position of the tail is prohibited.
8. Wether does may use only rubber mats, netting, or shavings for bedding; no straw, kitty litter, or other absorbent.
9. A water container with water must be visible and available for watering regularly in each penned/stalled area at all times. No feeding or watering of livestock in show rings, holding

pens, or to and from re-weigh stations will be permitted. Colorado State Fair Officials reserve the right, at its discretion, to contact a CSF veterinarian to determine if water should be given. Drenching for hydration purposes will be allowed for Wether Does at the CSF. No stomach-pumping devices will be allowed.

10. Due to limited space, no tack pens will be available. All items, such as feed, show boxes, trimming stands, etc., are to be placed in areas designated by the Superintendents. Any of these items placed in pens may be removed without warning. DO NOT take pens apart; leave them as assembled. Exhibitors may bring plywood for the top of their pens for storage.
11. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number, which will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.
12. There will be no official weigh-in of Wether does. Scales will be available for the exhibitors' use until the deadline for turning in the weight nomination form. The Exhibitor must obtain an official weight nomination form when the animal is inspected. The official weight nomination form must be submitted to the Livestock Office no later than the deadline. The weight(s) indicated on the weight nomination form will be the official show weight. There will be no changing of weights after the weight nomination form has been turned in.
13. After each class of Wether does has been placed, show officials will weigh the top five animals on the official scale. Wether does cannot deviate more than 5% above or below the declared show weight as previously designated by the exhibitor on the weight card. If any Wether doe is weighed out, it will be disqualified, and the remaining animals will be moved up in placing. The disqualified goat is not eligible for any other class and will not be reweighed.
14. Only exhibitors are allowed in the goat holding or staging areas during show hours. Wet or iced towels are not allowed in the holding pens during the goat show.

Classes will be divided evenly into three divisions: Light, Medium, and Heavy. The champion and Reserve in each division will compete for the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Wether Doe.

4. Bedding: Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock bedding. Entry into competition at the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition (“CSF”) does not include bedding.

Stamped duplicates of registration papers will be accepted only on does up to six months of age. Photocopies of registration, recordation, or stamped duplicate will not be accepted at the show.

6. The CSF Dairy Goat Show is not at liberty to change the order of the shows and classes because of the printing of judges’ sheets several days ahead of the show.

7. There is no limit to the number of animals an exhibitor may enter in this show or in any one of these classes. Premiums will be paid per the premium schedule listed in this division.

8. Entry Numbers: Each entry will be assigned a number, which will be provided to all exhibitors. The exhibitor must display these numbers when the animal is in the show ring.

9. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in their respective individual classes.

10. Entries may not be added to or withdrawn from classes without permission from the officials in charge after they are in the ring and the judging has started. The class shall not be reopened after reasons have begun.
11. Does only are eligible. No bucks allowed on the grounds. No animals will be allowed on the grounds unless a class is provided for them and the animal is properly entered in that class.
12. Tattoo identification must be included with all entries. To qualify for the show, exhibitors must present papers to the superintendent to verify registration and tattoos upon arrival.
13. All animals must be entered in the registered owner's name and owned before July 20, of the current year. Proof of ownership shall be the name on the registration or recordation certificate.
14. Any doe under 24 months of age that has never freshened shall compete in the junior doe show. Any doe that has ever freshened, including dry milkers, shall compete in the senior doe division.
15. Permanent Champions may show in either the Champion Challenge Class or their respective regular single-age class. The Champion Challenge Class (entry fee required) will be conducted per A.D.G.A. Competition Requirements.
16. No pre-show milk out will be conducted for the regular shows. Exhibitors should milk out at their own discretion, and dispose of milk in provided barrels.
17. Classes with three (3) or more animals making up an entry will be considered a group class with pre-entry required and no entry fee paid. Classes with one (1) or two (2) animals making an entry will be considered an individual class with pre entry and regular entry fee required.
18. No horned goats allowed - all goats must be dehorned.
19. All Open Dairy Goats must have individual identification for Scrapie Premise ID tag.

7. All sheep will be inspected for general health. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases will be rejected. Bellies, heads, lower legs, and dock area may have wool of any length preferred by Exhibitor, but wool must not be trimmed or blocked to unequal lengths on the chest, back, shoulder, sides, or britch area. Wool must be free of excessive contamination, manure, paint, permanent stains, wool rot, breaks or tenderness, and coting. These problems will be penalized according to their severity. Category II sheep (which includes Fine and Medium breeds) may be fitted to breeder preference while maintaining the quality of the fleece to be evaluated.

Competition Requirements

1. All entrants must have read and be familiar with the Colorado State Fair General Competition Requirements, General Livestock Competition Requirements, Colorado State Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct, and Health Requirements. When applicable, all association rules shall apply.
2. All entrants for livestock exhibited in Open, Breed, or Market competitions must provide a premises identification (PID) number at entry. To obtain a PID, contact the Colorado Department of Agriculture at 303-869-9130 or click on the following link:

3. Any wool grower is eligible to enter fleeces; however, fleeces must be entered in the grower's name.

4. Fleeces may be delivered or shipped pre-paid any time after August 19th and will be stored at no charge to exhibitors. Early fleece deliveries are encouraged. All fleece must be on the grounds by Friday, August 23rd, at 12:00 noon.
5. Entry fees must accompany entry. There is no limit to the number of fleeces an exhibitor may enter in this show or in any one of these classes. Premiums will be paid according to the premium schedule listed in this division. No fleece may be shown in more than one class. Wool exhibitors who will not attend the show are not required to buy exhibitor passes.
6. Eligible fleeces must:
 - a. Be fleeces shorn in 2023/2024
 - b. Represent not more than a 12-month growth, except that in the case of yearlings, a 16-month growth will be allowed. Management reserves the right to inspect any fleece to determine eligibility. Fleeces determined to be over-age or containing parts of other fleeces will be disqualified, and exhibitors will forfeit entry fees.
7. Penalties will be assessed against qualifying fleeces if any of the following are found:
 - a. Showing any paint or tar brands (soluble branding fluids permitted)
 - b. Showing excessive dung locks or tags
 - c. Discolored by excessive moisture or cotted
 - d. Showing a weak staple or break in the fiber
 - e. Contains excessive burrs or other vegetable matter.
8. Prepared fleeces should be rolled flesh side out so that they can be handled without falling apart. Exhibitors should pack fleeces rather loosely in clear plastic bags so as not to impair their character or attractiveness.
9. Each fleece received must be tagged with the following information: name and address of exhibitor, breed, number of months' growth, and division.
10. No early releases will be permitted. The sale and release of wools will be handled as follows:

- a. Bids will be received on white wools, acceptable to the commercial wool trade as a group and sold based on grade. Wool will be shipped following the show, and the proceeds will be returned to the exhibitor.
 - b. White Handspinning wool fleeces may be sold individually by the exhibitor and released at the close of the show to the exhibitor or the purchaser ONLY with the properly signed statement of sale and approval of release by the exhibitor;
 - c. All wools marked "Not for Sale" on entry and any other fleeces unacceptable to the commercial wool trade will be released to the exhibitor at the show's close. Wool must be picked up by Tuesday, September 3rd. Contact the Livestock office for details.
11. Management reserves the right to combine classes if the number of entries in any individual class does not warrant a separate class and to place entries in appropriate classes and divisions as necessary.
12. Ribbons awarded in each class 1st through 6th place.
13. Remember: When entering fleeces, designate only the Division number, the class number and sex: (Example: Division 11 class 3960 Ewe or Ram). The Superintendents will classify according to the classes listed below before the day of show.
